*** EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Background

Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science and Late N. P. Commerce College, Armori was established on June 4, 1981 under the flagship of Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Armori. Presently, it is affiliated to the Gondwana University Gadchiroli, most backward and naxal infested area of Maharashtra. It is recognized by UGC under sections 2(f) and 12(B). At present, our college has added challenge of catering education primarily to the economically under privileged section. Our task is to offer quality education with social, moral and ecological codes to the rural and underprivileged students of this region. More specifically our vision is to lead and guide our students in their path of success and progress set on prosperity and posterity.

Faculty

This is a multi-disciplinary institution with Arts, Science, Commerce and Home Science programs. In the Academic session 2015-16 with 2106 students strength, 28 permanent teachers, 51 temporary teachers and 19 non-teaching staff, ours is the largest and Top Ranked (By NAAC) Institution in the Gondwana University. Faculty forms the backbone of any academic institution. 12 of our teachers have Ph. D., 03 have submitted their Ph.D. thesis for evaluation, and 10 are pursuing Ph.D. 20 teachers have received funds from UGC to undertake minor research project while 01 received for major research project.

Education Programs

We offer four UG programs i.e. B.A. with 09 courses, B.Sc. with 08 courses, B.Com., and B.Sc. (Home Science), 04 P.G. in Arts faculty (self-financed courses), 04 P.G. in Science faculty (self-financed courses), Gondwana University approved 04 Research Centers for Ph.D. Under skill initiative, UGC sanctioned Community College with Diploma and Advanced Diploma Course in Dress Designing and Tailoring specially for women students and 06 career-oriented courses, Gandhian and Ambedkar Study & Research Centers and UGC sponsored Human Rights Center.

The college was last accredited by NAAC in 2012 with GRADE 'B', having obtained a CGPA score of 2.88 on a four point scale. We are now moving towards our 3rd cycle of accreditation. Adhering to our vision and mission and bearing in mind the recommendations of the NAAC Peer Team, the college has implemented various programmes to enhance the quality and mitigate the weaknesses present in the system.

A summary of the criterion-wise analysis of the college in the last five years is given below.

***** Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The institution follows student admission procedure as prescribed by the Government of Maharashtra and the affiliating Gondwana University. The college follows semesterwise grade system for all U.G. and P.G. Programs. The college offers 04 under graduate B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. and B.Sc. (Home-Science) and 08 post-graduate programmes M.A. (Economics), M.A. (History), M.A. (Sociology), M.A. (Marathi) and M.Sc. (Chemistry), M.Sc. (Mathematics), M.Sc. (Zoology), M.Sc. (Geology), University

approved 04 research centers for Ph.D. in Mathematics, Sociology, Marathi and History. With skill initiative, 06 UGC sponsored career oriented courses like Certificate Course in Herbal Medicine, Human Rights, Communicative English, Office Automation, Maintenance of Home Appliances and Tribal Tourism. UGC sponsored Community College in Dress Designing and Tailoring. Distance Learning Center under Yashvantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University offers B.A., B.Com., M.A. (English), M.A. (Marathi). Value Added Courses under UGC EPOCH Gandhi Study & Research Center and Ambedkar Study & Research Center. The college also runs UGC- Human Rights Center. UGC Funded NET/SET Coaching Center, Competitive Examination Coaching Classes, Remedial Coaching Classes and Equal Opportunity Center.

The college has introduced 01 new Programs i.e. B.Sc. (Home Science) specially for women students in U.G., 05 new programs in P.G, 04 University approved Research Centers for Ph.D., B.Sc. with Hindi, B.A. with Music, under skill initiative UGC sanctioned a Community College with Diploma and Advanced Diploma Course in Dress Designing and Tailoring specially for women students and 01 new Career Oriented Course after our second accreditation.

The College facilitates innovative teaching-learning process through seminars / workshops based on the curriculum, audio-visual mode of teaching, study tour/excursion/field-work, project-work, survey-work, up-gradation of ICT based learning resources, use of library and modernization and up-gradation of laboratories. Eleven (11) staff members are on Board of Studies and 11 in syllabus restructure committee of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

There is an effective feedback system from all stakeholders to guarantee the proper implementation of the asserted quality-policy, thereby fulfilling the needs of students from diverse social, cultural, religious or economic backgrounds and those of the society as well.

***** Criterion II: Teaching-Learning And Evaluation

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation is perhaps the most crucial measure by which an institution of higher education may be gauged. The college offers opportunities to SC/ST/OBC/women/differently-abled/economically weaker sections/minority communities abiding by the directives of the Govt. of Maharashtra and the Gondwana University. The college also provides remedial coaching classes for SC, ST, OBC, Minority and economically backward students to better their academic performance level. Free-ships and other concessions are available to the economically weaker sections.

We are affiliated to the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and follow stated policies, but we try to provide student-centric learning. For effective implementation of the curriculum, the college deploys the following action plans.

- Each faculty member submits an academic plan at the beginning of the semester to the Principal.
- An academic calendar is prepared in advance and published in the college prospectus. At the end of the year, a calendar mentioning the monthwise and departmentwise activities is also prepared and displayed on notice board & website.
- Every department submits an activity calendar for the month. The activities enhance and supplement the academic plan.
- The progress of the department is maintained through regular tests, presentations and

semester end exams.

- The Principal conducts meetings, Staff Council meetings with all faculty members at the beginning and end of every semester to assess the progress made by the institution.
- Time tables are prepared in advance and made available before the commencement of each semester.
- Remedial classes and tutorials are conducted for the weaker students.
- Five Students sign a copy of the syllabus completion, for each paper, at the end of the semester verifying that the portion is completed.

To make our teaching student-centric, the teachers prepare micro and macro teaching plans in Academic & Co-curricular Diary and execute them effectively, supplement them with unit tests, home assignments, student-seminars, guest-lecture series; use modern teaching aids and use feedback mechanism for corrective action. To keep abreast of recent developments, the teachers participate in seminars/ conferences in large numbers, use internet facilities. During last four years 12 National Level and 01 State Level seminars/ conferences were organized.

The IQAC actively supervises the teaching-learning process through suggestions regarding improvement and expansion of existing infrastructure. This college has been one of the first in the District to introduce computers on a large scale and encouraged both students and teachers to take advantage of the nascent technological revolution. Both students and teachers are provided with free internet facilities by the college during college hours. Teachers today use various audio-visual aids like LCD projectors, Power Point Presentations in ICT equipped classrooms to complement conventional teaching methods.

Workshops were organized, first, to familiarize teachers with the new technology, and later to update them with recent equipment and gadgets. The partially computerized college library, equipped with E-resources and reprography facilities and a handful of enthusiastic and helpful staff is an asset for teacher and student alike. Faculty members are actively urged to undertake research projects with the help of this infrastructure. Members of the faculty attend the UGC sponsored Orientation Programmes and Refresher Courses periodically. Almost all the experienced teachers of the college are actively involved in the evaluation process of the university. The college results have consistently been found better than university results. Ten (10) UG and PG students secured merit position in the University results. The students showing excellence in academics are awarded with endowment prizes and certificates sponsored by our teaching staff and other stake-holders.

❖ Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Research

As part of fostering research tradition the college has a research committee to help teachers organize and participate in state and national level Seminars /Conferences/Workshops, apply for Major / Minor Research Projects, publish papers and enhance the quality of research. Such research projects are generally sponsored by the UGC in the form of grants. Moreover, the co-operative society of the college provides educational loans for teachers in case of urgency.

The institution has 04 University approved Centers for Higher Learning and Research in Mathematics, Sociology, History, Marathi. Presently, 80% teachers involved in active research work in the institution. 20 Minor Research Projects and one Major Research

Project have completed so far. During the last four years the college has organized 12 national and 01state level UGC/Institute sponsored seminar. At the institutional level 16 workshops were organized by various departments. Six days Research Methodology workshop was organized for research scholars. Beside this, inter-university seminar competitions were also organized. The students also participate in 'Avishkar' an intercollegiate Research Convention initiated by Gondwana University held annually. Financial provisions are made by the institution for the student research activity, in particular, PG students and students participating at university and state level research events are supported.

To encourage research, teachers are given study leave for FDP, duty leave for attending and financial support for presenting papers in conferences. They are exhorted to avail of research schemes offered by UGC (01 Major & 08 Minor Research Projects are completed and 03 Minor Research Projects are ongoing). 07 faculty members are recognized Ph.D. supervisors. At present 10 faculty members are enrolled in different universities of the state for their Ph.D. work. Faculty have published and presented a large number of research papers in various National/International seminars in their individual capacity and in collaboration with associates leading to publication of 179 research papers in National/International journals and seminar proceedings; 12 books and 01 chapter in edited book are published by the faculty over last four years, out of which 4 books of principal Dr. Khalsa published in Germany. A textbook for PG in YCMOU, Nasik by a faculty is under publication.

During the post accreditation period, the faculties have produced 102 publications in peer reviewed journals of which more than 21 have been listed in International database. These publications have obtained 12 citations, total impact factor of 69.333. One teacher availed study leave under faculty development programme of UGC. 02 teachers availed UGC assistance for presenting paper in international conference in abroad

Consultancy And Collaboration

The college has carried out the following collaborative and consultancy work:

- 1) Microbiology Department, Sanjivani pathology and Government Rural Hospital working on Hematology, Serology.
- 2) Environment study committee and *Amhi Amchya Arogyasathi, Kurkheda* village based NGO working on various environmental issues on People's Biodiversity Register.
- 3) Dr. V. I. Kahalkar, Department of Botany and Wild Life Institute of India Jointly working on Vegetation recovery at village translocation sites and vegetation studies on sites of Tadoba Andhari Tiger Reserve (TATR). Also, Dr. V. I. Kahalkar and Department of Forest (Wild life) Government of Maharashtra jointly working on study of Vegetation in Kolamarka Wild life reserve sanctuary.
- 4) Dr. U.T. Kamble, Department of commerce providing consultancy on Taxation guidance and Income Tax Return filing.
- 5) Dr. Vasanta Kahalkar, Department of Botany providing consultancies on identification of distinct fauna of plants /shrubs/ medicinal plants, etc. to the mining companies as well as Government Department.
- 6) Department of Zoology and Government Sericulture Department working on Reproductive Cycle and Seed Production of *Antheria mylita* (Tussar Silk).

- 7) Department of Geology providing consultancies to local residents and industries for detection of ground water table, mining research, soil sampling & testing.
- 8) Dr. V. H. Raiwatkar, Department of Marathi is providing consultancy for proof reading, editing & drafting.
- 9) Mr. G.P. Juare, Department of Chemistry is a panel member of Lok Nyayalaya (Mobile Court) and providing the expertise to resolve disputes among the civilians.

Extension

The college boasts of excellent record of accomplishment with respect to extension activities in the different categories such as NSS Units organize extension programmes like cleaning, plantation, literacy mission, community health, blood donation camps, prevention against drug addiction, women and childcare, Sadbhavana rally, National Youth Day, Human rights programme, gender sensitization, etc. The Women's Cell addresses issues regarding women staff/students, primarily fostering their social responsibilities and imparting information about sexual harassment. It takes initiatives for guidance/counselling of women students. Empowerment of Girls (EOG), a three days workshop was organized in association with Bhartiya Jain Sanghatan, Pune where more than 50 girl students of the college actively participated and benefited from the workshop. Mahila Raj is one of the prime activities of women empowerment program. It is our special privilege that in the year 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 our college was awarded by Maharashtra Government for the effective implementation of Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan (Campaign for Women Empowerment). The college received award in 2013-2014 which includes Rs. 2,00,000 (Rs. Two Lakh), momento and certificate of appreciation. The award is also received in 2012-2013 from the Government of Maharashtra. It includes Rs. 50,000/- (Rs. Fifty Thousand), momento and certificate of appreciation. The college strives to infuse civic responsibility among the young minds of students through various extensions & outreach programmes so that they develop into sensitized, socially responsible citizen.

To sensitize the students and staff regarding road safety, the college organized a variety of activities under Road Safety and Traffic Awareness Campaign. The college feels proud that the activity has struck a deep root as we are in the fourth year of the practice. For effective implication of Road Safety Campaign the college was awarded by the state level award - 2013 with the cash prize Rs. 12,500, momento, and certificate of appreciation; also University Level First and State Level Award- 2014 (25,000 Cash, Momento and Certificate of Appreciation) at the hands of Hon'ble Devendraji Fadanvis, Chief Minister of Maharashtra in a programme held at Nagpur.

People's Biodiversity Register programme pursued by us is a unique one in environmental studies in the University. The program of People's Biodiversity Registers is an attempt to promote folk ecological knowledge and wisdom. Various surveys based on social, economic, educational, health status done by different departments integrate our extension activities with the curricula.

Certificate course in Herbal medicine under the UGC scheme of career oriented programme is running by the college.

Medicinal Plants Survey

Our Gadchiroli District is tribal area rich in medicinal plants, special focus is to be given to document the resources and its current use pattern. Based on the results of the documentation we are in the position to determine the resource potential, prospects of cultivation, sustainable use and trading.

Many of our extension activities are through collaboration with NGOs, local bodies & Govt. agencies.

Agriculture is the backbone of India. The best agricultural practices will combine traditional agricultural methods reinforced by modern technology and innovations. Youth are the primary productive human resource of socio-economic development. It is therefore, essential to locate the role of youth in main stream development. It is in this context that the workshop on the *Role of Youth in Agriculture: Challenges and Opportunity* was organized. The current focus is on how to make agriculture more attractive and rewarding to the younger generation.

Our College has adopted the backward and rural/tribal village *Kasvi* about 15 km away from the Tehsil head quarter. Population of the village is 937 in which male 497 and female 440. Literacy rate of the village is 36.70 % and total house holders are 155. Action plan for the socio-economic development of the village and educational progress can be achieved with support of student, staff, alumni association, parent association, government agencies, private sector and some NGOs. The necessity of confronting community issues and taking them seriously, as well as forcing the participants to apply, adapt, and reflect on ideas and theories found in the classroom. We will prepare students for today's global society by developing a strong sense of civic responsibility, accompanied by a better understanding of self, one's own resources, the links between individual and community, and the relevance of classroom concepts and theories.

***** Criteria IV: Infrastructure And Learning Resources

Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal is committed to providing the best possible infrastructure and ambience to facilitate the ideal teaching-learning process. The campus is spread over an area of 14892.43 Sq. mtr. (3.68 acres) and a built up area of 8050.66 Sq. mtr. The college has developed 3407.55 Sq. mtr. infrastructure during the last four years (2012-16) and spent Rs. 1,47,28,281.00 for construction of classrooms/laboratories/indoor stadium/seminar hall/and ladies toilet. Hostel facility is available for girls. The construction of women's hostel was done under UGC XI-plan.

The college has 28 clean and spacious classrooms out of them 05 are equipped with audio-visual facilities in the form of fixed LCD projectors for convenient screening of power point presentations, short videos, films and documentories to enliven and enrich the classroom experience, 12 laboratories, gymnasium, girl's common room, there are 75 computers used as learning resource, English Language Laboratory, Network Resource Center with internet facility. The college has a Career Guidance Cell which imparts employable skills to the students. The college has grounds for volleyball, Kabbadi, Kho-Kho and basketball and for other outdoor games we hire grounds of sports associations and government. Also we have facilities for indoor games such as table-tennis, badminton, chess, yoga and gymnasium.

The library of the college has a good collection of 17497 books out of which 12839 textbooks, 4189 reference books and 48 subscribed journals, on various subjects. The amount spent for procuring the books, journals and other resources during the last four years is Rs. 10,16,300/-. The institution has made provision of INFLIBNET facility. The library is partially computerized with the application of bar-code technology. The students have an access through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) .A separate Wi-Fi facility has been installed there. The Library Committee plays a vital role in planning and executing the activities of the Library - purchase of books / journals / CDs and cassettes / online resources / furniture / reprographic facility / programmes for Library Association / conduct of the Certificate Course in 'Library and Information Science'. The oral and written feedback of the students and the staff has helped in making the Library user friendly.

The institution is extremely pro-active in up-gradation and modernization of infrastructure by installing the latest hardware and software. In case of a power failure there are in-house generators which swing into action within minutes, thus hardly affecting any academic activity. Uninterrupted water supply is also ensured by setting up two tube wells within the campus to supplement the water provided by the local municipality. Routine checks are carried out to ensure that the equipments are always in perfect working condition. The college has additional facilities for students such as the co-operative store and canteen.

❖ Criterion –V: Student Support and Progression

Almost 95% of the college students get scholarships from the government as they belong to underprivileged sections. During 2012-2016, the college students got scholarships/freeships from government and financial aid from institution of Rs. 95,10,446/-. The Institution started providing training for competitive examinations from the year 2013-14 to help students preparing for UPSC and MPSC examinations. Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners, learning disability and academically weak students.

Various departments conduct educational trips to non-governmental organizations and industrial visits to reputed institutes of learning. The college plans and organizes extra and co-curricular activities throughout the year to realize our vision and mission goals and provide students with a holistic development.

The soft, communication and organizational skills offered by the Placement and Career Guidance Cell prepare students for employment and provide them with job opportunities through the Campus Drives. Considerable contribution is made by the alumni of the college for curriculum and skill development for higher studies and placement. The dissatisfaction, grievances and requests of the stakeholders are addressed by the Grievance Redressal Cell. The Anti-Ragging Cell publicizes its stand against it in the campus to curb ragging. Grievance and Anti-Raging Cell, Care Taker Committee look after students complaints.

For keeping a track of the performance of students periodic parent-teacher meetings are also held in some sections. Each of the endeavors is ultimately aimed at skill-enhancement and, needless to say, perhaps, all are primarily student-centric, whether it is intended to boost the academic proficiency of students or to encourage the cultivation of a latent inborn talent.

Women empowerment and gender sensitization are the activities of our special privilege and pride. For this, our college regularly organizes women empowerment programmes throughout each academic session. Its our aim and objective to sensitize students and staff regarding women empowerment and gender sensitization. The college is proud that these women empowerment activities have been deeply rooted in our institution as we are in the fourth year of this practice.

Encouragement for students participation in games / matches / tournaments / seminars at state / national levels, cultural, co-curricular / extra-curricular activities and competitions in and out of the college, has brought laurels to the individuals and the institution. Feedback from students is validated by revising the syllabi and teaching techniques and planning for skill enhancement programmes. Students are motivated to present and publish their articles in college magazine.

Criterion- VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The Management and trustees of our college take a keen interest in the working of the institution and keep abreast by holding regular and periodical meetings with the Principal and Staff. They are also members of IQAC and LMC.

The Principal plays the leading role in the governance and management of the institution, ensuring transparency in the functioning of the college and maintaining core values, on being facilitated by the Governing Body and supported by the staff. The college has an efficient co-ordination/internal management system under the leadership of the Principal for designing and implementing its policies/and plans effectively, through committees of teaching, non-teaching staff and students constituted by the GB. All the stakeholders — students, parents, local community, government/non-government bodies actively participate in preparing institutional plans abiding by the stipulated norms and conditions. Teamwork leads to the best practices of the institution. Thus, empowerment through total decentralization of the administrative system promotes co-operation, sharing of knowledge and innovations. The development, supervised by the management, comprises extension of building, providing additional facilities, introduction of new courses, inclusion of new faculty, employing visiting teachers, etc. All permanent staff comes under the GPF/DCPS and Group Insurance Schemes. Gratuity is paid on the date of retirement. Loans from PF are easily available as per the extant rules. Those who are employed on ad-hoc/contractual basis are offered worthwhile pay-scales and job assurance. 100% staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years. Funds are allocated/grants are applied, as per UGC schemes for the building/development projects of the institution. Income/expenditure are closely monitored by the accountant and overseen by the Principal. Judicious expenditure of funds involving proper procedure for purchases by the Purchase Committee with regular audit (internal and external) of the budget indicates transparency in financial affairs.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices.

1. Title of the Practice: Fostering Social Responsibility

a) Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization programme as a brainstorming activity for students and staff.

About 65% of students are girls and the institution provides them unrestricted support to come forward in every walk of life

Goal

Women empowerment and gender sensitization are the activities of our special privilege and pride. For this, our college regularly organizes women empowerment programmes throughout each academic session. Its our aim and objective to sensitize students and staff regarding women empowerment and gender sensitization. The college is proud that these women empowerment activities have been deeply rooted in our institution as we are in the fourth year of this practice.

Context

At the beginning of the academic year Women Development Cell was formed. This cell prepared their annual plan which had its focus on girl students, their empowerment and their curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular development.

The Practice

The practice 'Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization' has been introduced since four years. Therefore it is in its mature stage. In order to sensitize students, staff and society the college organized a variety of activities. Programmes held were:

- Formation of Women Development Cell.
- Women Governance Day (*Mahil Raj*).
- Savitribai Phule Birth and Death anniversary programmes.
- Three days workshop on 'Empowerment of Girls (EOG)'.

Women Development Cell organized 'Mahila Raj (Women's Governance) where the girl students conducted the teaching and administrative work the whole day. Empowerment of Girls (EOG), a three days workshop was organized in association with Bhartiya Jain Sanghatan, Pune where more than 50 girl students of college actively participated and benefited from the workshop. A great social reformer Savitribai Phule's birth and death anniversary programmes were organized by the women development cell.

Evidence of Success

Its our special privilege that in the year 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 our college was awarded by Maharashtra Govt. for the effective implementation of *Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan* (Campaign for Women Empowerment).

b) Road Safety and Traffic Awareness Campaign: -

To sensitize the students and the staff regarding road safety, the college organized a variety of activities under 'Road Safety and Traffic Awareness Campaign'. The college

feels proud that the activity has struck a deep root. For effective implementation of the Road Safety Campaign, the college was awarded by state level prize during 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 by Road Traffic and Police Department, Maharashtra State.

c) Adoption of Tribal Village Kasvi: -

Our college is committed to community service and has adopted a rural, tribal and backward village *Kasvi* for development through the commensal of staff, students, civilians, government agencies and NGOs. The village is located about 15 km away from the taluka head quarter having population of 937 in which males are 497 and females are 440.

Action plan for the socio-economic development of the village and educational progress can be achieved with support of staff, student, staff, alumni association, parent association, government agencies, private sector and some NGOs. The necessity of confronting community issues and taking them seriously, as well as forcing the participants to apply, adapt, and reflect on ideas and theories found in the classroom. We will better prepare students for today's global society by developing a strong sense of civic responsibility, accompanied by a better understanding of self, one's own resources, the links between individual and community, and the relevance of classroom concepts and theories.

2. Environment conservation: -

This is one of the best practices of the college for environment conservation and awareness working on People's Biodiversity Register.

Title of Practice - Environment Consciousness through the People's Biodiversity Register with the concept of New Meanings for Old Knowledge

The Goal

Documentation of Traditional Knowledge related to biodiversity. Preparation of Biodiversity Register is an attempt to realize the biodiversity at local Self-Government level, and the whole country.

Medicinal Plants Survey

Our Gadchiroli District is tribal area rich in medicinal plants, special focus is to be given to document the resources and its current use pattern. Based on the results of the documentation we are in the position to determine the resource potential, prospects of cultivation, sustainable use and trading.

Knowledge Sharing & Knowledge Mobilisation.

Linking research with community knowledge.

Involving students in research:

Accessing local knowledge, identifying local issues/problems for study. It cocreates new knowledge through partnerships among college (academics), communities (civil society) and government (policy-makers) leading to new capacities; new solutions to

pressing problems related to sustainability, social and economic disparities, cultural exclusion, mistrust and conflict; generates awareness among policy makers. Under this, one village *Kasvi* is adopted by the college for over-all study and integrated development. There were groups formed by students and they visited adopted villages on Sundays.

3. Entrepreneurial skill training

Increase potential of students to be job giver than job seeker, equip students with managerial skills to accept risk and uncertainty, take decision, communicate clearly and effectively, develop broad vision about business and learn compliance with law provides various modes of interaction with entrepreneurs. India's population is now considered to be her biggest strength and is expected to be a source of competitive advantage. Our population is primarily young; of its more than 1.26 billion-strong population, close to 600 million are below the age of 35. If we can effectively capitalize on this 'demographic dividend', it can bring us great returns, economic growth and prosperity. But only if we can successfully put in place and execute a countrywide vocational or skills education strategy. Understanding the need of skill development program in this rural and tribal area we decided promote skill based program through various skill based Certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma courses in various sector skill. We have already successfully conducted a skill based course in Dress Designing under Community College Scheme.

4. Workshop Role of Youth in Agriculture: Challenges and Opportunities

Agriculture is the backbone of India. The best agricultural practices will combine traditional agricultural methods reinforced by modern technology and innovations. Youth are the primary productive human resource of socio-economic development. It is therefore, essential to locate the role of youth in main stream development. It is in this context that the workshop on 'Role of Youth in Agriculture: Challenges and Opportunities' was organized.

The current focus is on how to make agriculture more attractive and rewarding to the younger generation. Agriculture continues to be at the mercy of the monsoon and the markets. Over the next two decades the agriculture sector in India will undergo significant transformation which will result in both challenges and opportunities for young people, depending on who and where they are. We must create an atmosphere for the youth to be inspired to stay in villages, as the heart and soul of India, to quote Gandhiji, lies in the villages. Nowadays, youngsters constitute only13-19% of farmers. It is imperative to make agriculture a lucrative and profitable occupation in order to increase that number. Such a steady income can be achieved only by combining hard work with modern technology.

5. <u>Career guidance for competitive examinations organizing seminar</u> <u>and coaching classes</u>

The institution has Career Counselling cum Placement Cell which exploits every possibility to impart proper Counselling to the students. Career Guidance Cell engages classes on soft skill development by utilizing the services of both the members of the faculty as well as the experts from various fields. It is training the students for face to face and Group Discussion types of interviews. Thus the Placement Cell is promoting students' accessibility to campus interview opportunities.

Coaching classes are being conducted for the final UG and PG students in order to enable them to appear NET/SET under UGC fund. Coaching classes for other competitive examinations are also conducted under UGC assistance. The coaching classes for competitive examinations aim to train the students in specific ways of acquiring communicative skills, soft skills and interview skills and to motivate the final UG students to take interest in competitive examinations. Numerical aptitude, logical reasoning and language aptitude are some of the components taught to the students appearing for clerical examinations (IBPS& SSC).

Spardharatna (Competitive Exam) is organized for all level students and among them winners get 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize cash, certificate and momento. OMR sheets are used and computerized evaluation is done. This exam receives good response of the students.

Workshop is organized on Retail Training programme, professional computer training workshop for new technologies and their information given which will help the students in their computer based professional career. In this workshop mostly internet, DTP, Online Banking, shopping, paying various bill using internet, scanning, e-mail IDs points are focussed.

The model questionnaire issued by the NAAC serves as the basis for obtaining feedback about teaching-learning opportunities offered by the college from students. The work of the library has also improved following automation and installation of OPAC. With grant from the UGC, remedial coaching classes for the students of backward classes/communities have been introduced. Lectures, seminars and workshops are regularly organized by various departments. Field work is conducted by the Depts. of History, Geography, Geology, Commerce, and Community College. Health awareness field work is done by the Dept. of Microbiology.

The large family of students, teachers, non-teaching staff, alumni, parents and well-wishers of Mahatma Gandhi College, headed by the principal, share their best efforts towards realizing the vision of the founder of the college.

- To provide holistic education and allow the each student to realize his/her complete potential through academic and co-curricular activities.
- To encourage the students to be global citizens with an awareness of environmental issues, women sensitization and human rights, etc.
- ❖ To infuse our students with philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar.
- To communicate the vision and mission to stakeholders, these are highlighted upon the website and prospectus.
- These are also displayed at strategic points such as Principal's office, staff room, IQAC office, library and on the board at prominent places in the college.
- In addition to this the same are communicated to the students and the stakeholders through address of the President of the society and the Principal on various function and meetings.

1.1.2. How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college strictly follows the curriculum designed by the university. The college meticulously develops action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. The academic calendar issued by the affiliating University is the blue print for the development of the college level action plan. The college level action plan is developed and deployed as under:

- At the beginning and end of each academic year, the Principal of the college conducts meetings with HODs and the staff members of various departments to develop various strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum. Academic Calendar is prepared by the Institution on the suggestion of IQAC and is strictly implemented.
- Academic and Co-curricular diary is provided to every teacher. Teaching & activities
 plan is written in these diaries and these diaries are checked by IQAC members and the
 Principal at the end of every week.
- The faculty in-charge is appointed who monitors day to day activities of all the classes, whose report is assessed by the Principal.
- The Principal monitors the actual syllabus taught by faculty at the mid semester through the information collected from the faculty and students.
- Through the suggestion box the Principal is made aware of problems.
- Remedial classes and tutorials are conducted for the weaker students.

1.1.3. What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The faculty of the college can discuss their issues or problems, if any, in the meetings of the Board of Studies, Academic Council of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.
- BOS faculty members participate in the meetings conducted by the University for syllabus revision and revised syllabus is implemented in the curriculum. The faculty suggests some changes in the subject topics if necessary.
- The College also encourages and sanctions Duty Leaves to the teachers to participate in the Orientation/ Refresher Courses/ Workshops/ Seminars organized by the affiliating University/ other Universities to update their knowledge and to improve their teaching practices.
- Special attention is given by the institute and management to provide infrastructural facilities with special emphasis on ICT-enabled tools to improve the teaching-learning practices in the institution.
- The Principal held regular meetings with heads of the departments for improving the teaching practices.
- The college library has a vast collection of books, also e facilities such as INFLIBNET which makes research journals and other reputed reference publications available to teachers.

Efforts are made to ensure that the curriculum is implemented efficiently and innovatively. - Organizing industrial visits, study tours.

- Organizing workshops, seminars, conferences.
- Organizing inter-disciplinary and inter-departmental programmes.
- Curriculums are made available in the college library for teachers and students.
- Book Bank facility is available for the financially backward students.
- Principal of the college seeks report on the progress of syllabus completion from the heads of the departments.
- All departments have created answer sheets of previous university examinations and are made available for the use of students.
- All the latest books are made available in the library to the faculty and the students for their reference.
- The staff is deputed to attend & organize workshops on curriculum in the concerned subject.
- Feedback is obtained from the students on the curriculum delivery and transaction.
- For effective curriculum delivery, the college has got the provision of well structured UGC Sponsored Remedial Coaching Center for slow learners.
- No free hours is strictly implemented.
- MOUs & linkages with Pathology Lab, Rural Hospital, and respective industries are signed by the college for hands-on practice to the students & the faculty.
- Linkage was developed with an NGO, Amhi Amchya Arogyasathi, to run a career oriented course on Herbal Medicine.
- Besides the chalk and talk method, ICT enabled teaching learning process is adopted for effective curriculum delivery.
- Peoples Biodiversity Register (PBR) is prepared by second year students as a part of Environment Study in the curriculum.

We have a closer linkage with industries and promote research suited to industry need, use of the industrial laboratories by the college, research guidance from Industry, solution for field problems, short term training programme and sponsored industrial research and placement.

- Weak/ Advanced learners students are identified and remedial classes/ special tests are arranged.
- Rewards and prizes have been instituted not only for academics but also for extracurricular activities and sports.
- Regular meetings of the Principal with the teaching staff are held for effective implementation.
- Environmental Issues and Women Empowerment programmes, etc. are arranged and interlinked with curriculum in respective subjects.

1.2. Academic Flexibility

1.2.1. Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The college aims at providing job oriented, work related and skill based education to empower, develop sense of self-reliance among the disadvantaged and underprivileged students. Skill development leads to gainful employment in collaboration with local industry and community.

- 1. Diploma course in Dress Designing under Community College This course has been started particularly for girl students with the stipend from UGC, New Delhi to increase the employability of girl students and encourage them for self-employment.
- 2. Certificate course in Tribal Tourism Gadchiroli district is surrounded by very deep forest which contains many natural and beautiful spots uninterrupted by the human activities. There is a lot of scope for the tourism in this area but till now it is unnoticed. This certificate course gives self-employment to the students from this rural and tribal area.
- 3. Certificate course in Herbal Medicine The institution belongs to rural and tribal area enriched with deep forest and full of biodiversity. Many medicinal plants are found in this forest. Therefore, to enable the students for self-employment, the college has started this course.

- 4. Certificate Course in Communicative English Nowadays, English language has became essential to aspire the career/job opportunities. This course was started with the objective to improve the communication skills in English among the students.
- 5. Certificate course in Office Automation This course enables students to handle various devices like computer, xerox machine, printer, scanner, etc. and MS-office used to automate the office.
- 6. Certificate course in Maintenance of Domestic Home Appliances The course enables the students for the self-employment as well as enable to repair the various home appliances used in their homes on their own.

The certificate courses are having practicability which will definitely cater to market and industrial needs which will create employability.

1.2.2. Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

- There are certificate/ Diploma/ Advanced Diploma courses, these add-on courses can be done alongwith the B.A, B.Com and B.Sc. degree. But can obtain the degree in distance education in Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU), Nasik, and the college is the study center. It offers degree programme in B.A., B.Com. M.A. (Marathi), M.A. (English).
- Community College offers Certificate/Diploma/Advanced Diploma course in Dress Designing along with regular programmes.
- Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Center of the college offers a certificate course in Gandhian Thought.
- 1.2.3. Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability.
 - The college gives freedom to the students that they can choose the subjects of their choices among the group of subjects. This gives an opportunity to the students to study the subjects of their interest which increase the potential for employability.
 - Academic flexibility is also ensured by introducing skill development Career Oriented courses, Dress Designing course under Community College alongwith regular courses which improve the employability of the students.
 - Along with regular courses Mahatma Gandhi Study Center conducts a certificate course which increases the value of truth and non-violence in students' life.

Admission procedure, curriculum & fee structure of these courses are same as that of the aided courses & it is as per the university norms.

The qualification of the teachers for these self-financed programmes are as per the university norms. Salary of the teachers is fixed and given as per the university norms. Remuneration of teaching and nonteaching staff is decided by the management of the college.

1.2.5. Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If "yes" provide details of such programmes and the beneficiaries.

Yes. The college is located in rural and tribal area affected by *Naxal movements*. Because of this, people in this area are lacking in the employment. The college has taken into consideration this problem and started career oriented programmes. These programmes develop skills among the students which ultimately increase the potential for the employability and self-employment.

- Certificate course in Herbal Medicine It deals with the study of medicinal plants and making of herbal medicine from these plants. It is knowledge sharing and knowledge mobilization related to medicinal plants. The beneficiaries of this course are regular students.
- Certificate course in Tribal Tourism- The college is located in tribal and rural region surrounded by very deep forest unaffected by the human activities. There is a lot of scope for tourism in this area. The course will help the students for self-employment. It is also beneficial to the community.
- Certificate course in Maintenance of Domestic Home Appliances this course enables students to maintain electric home appliances and enable them for self-employment.
- Certificate course in Spoken English Special classes are taken for enhancing communication skills taking into considerations the rural backgrounds of the students. Language Lab is created for developing communication skills in English.
- Certificate course in Office Automation This course creates computer literacy among the students.
- Certificate/ Diploma/ Advanced Diploma course in Dress Designing Modern lifestyle has given a lot of scope to the field of dress designing. To enable our students for selfemployment and to enhance the potential for employment, the college has started a course in Dress Designing under Community College. Students are the beneficiaries of this course.
- 1.2.6. Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional faceto-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If "yes", how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

Institution has a study center of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. Here, at UG level programmes viz. B.A. & B.Com. whereas, at PG level M.A. – Marathi & M.A. – English programmes are offered.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The college being affiliated to the university does not has the option of formulating its own curriculum. Keeping in mind the vision & mission of the institution, efforts are made by the college to open the portals of higher education to rural and tribal students and mould them into a good human being through various activities conducted.

- The basic sciences such as Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Zoology, Botany, Geology, Microbiology and Computer Science make our students eligible to compete with city bred students at national level; humanities- Marathi and English Literature, Economics, Commerce, History, Political Science and Music make our students sensitive to national and global issues /interests.
- Career Oriented courses meet the local/ regional needs.
- At the beginning of the session plan of various activities to be conducted throughout the year is prepared and circulated among all departments and committees.
- Career Oriented courses are started by considering the need of skill development and personality development of the students.
- To build the character of the students and promote the national integrity among the students, Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Center conducts a certificate course every year. Also celebrates birth anniversaries of proud of the nation like Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, Shivaji Maharaj, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj, Sardar Patel, etc. ensuring the students' involvement.
- Coaching classes for competitive examinations are conducted.
- A competitive examination 'SPARDHARATNA' is conducted every year.
- Three days workshop on Girl's Empowerment was conducted in collaboration with *Bhartiya Jain Sanghathan* (BJS) and Gondwana University for the self-reliance and personality development among the girl students.
- Organized 'Jagar Janivancha' (Women Empowerment Campaign).
- The college regularly organizes Road Safety Campaign.
- The college organizes 'Sadbhavana Daud' (Cross Country Running Competition) every year to promote communal harmony.
- The college has adopted a rural & tribal village *Kasvi* for the development. An integrated plan is developed over the five years.
- NSS provides the social responsibilities and community orientation amongst the students.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

• Based on the feedback of various stakeholders, the college makes efforts to enrich the curriculum to enhance the students' learning experience and understand the employment market.

- A new innovative activity, *Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme*, has been started by the college through which students sell various types of goods/ hand made goods and toys inside the college campus on every Wednesday of the week. This gives hands-on experience about the business to the students.
- The college regularly interacts with the nearby industries and collects first-hand information about the demands and expectations of the corporate sector regarding skill requirements among the student sets. Efforts are made to enhance the skills of the students to meet the market requirement such as introduction of career oriented courses in Herbal Medicine, Tribal Tourism, Office Automation, Maintenance of Domestic Home Appliances, Human Rights, Spoken English and Dress Designing under Community College; imparting computer & internet knowledge, etc.
- Various departments arrange field visits and study tours.
- Started coaching classes for competitive examinations and also for NET/SET.
- The college arranges a competitive examination 'SPARDHARATNA', for the preparation of competitive examination.
- Department of English runs Spoken English course to enable the students to converse in English.
- Students' seminars are arranged to develop confidence among the students.
- Special guidance programme was organized by the Department of Commerce on Enhancement of Employability in 2015- 2016.

- Assigning the women faculties on the various academic and administrative bodies of the institution.
- Encouraging and promoting the girl students to participate in university/ state/ national level sports/ cultural competitions.
- Orienting and convincing the parents of girl students for higher education.

- Providing full security in campus and care taker of outstation girl students by Care Taker Committee; providing residential facilities.
- Facility of Girls' Common Room.
- To enhance the employability of girl students, college started Diploma/ Advanced Diploma course in Dress Designing under Community College.
- The college has one of the best practices of environmental conservation and awareness. Working on innovative practice People's Biodiversity Register (PBR), it is an attempt to realize the biodiversity at institutional, community and governmental level.

 - 2) Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Study & Research Center

Various activities have been organized by these two centers to develop moral and ethical values among the students as well as among other stakeholders. The details are given below:

- i. Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Center offers a certificate course aiming to spread and develop values of non-violence & truth.
- ii. Organized cleanliness drive on the campus and in the Armori village on the eve of birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi.
- iii. Celebrate birth anniversaries of Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. B.R. Ambedkar and talks of the experts were organized every year.
- International Yoga Day was observed to spread the awareness about Yoga which helps to overcome many health problems and fill the mind with positive energy.
- Lectures of Jain Muni Shri Ratnasundarji Maharaj were organized.
- Various days and anniversaries are celebrated in the college.
- Guest lectures by experts are organized to inculcate moral and ethical values in students.
- Organized 'Sadbhavana Daud' (cross country running competition) every year to develop national integrity among the students.
- Celebrated Teachers Day, Science Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, etc.
- Adopted rural and tribal village *Kasvi* to infuse social responsibility among the students.
- Conducts various NSS activities of social interest.
- Started course on Human Rights.

Employable and life skills and better career options:

- The college has active Employment & Guidance bureau which offers career counseling for the students which give better opportunities for employment and higher studies.
- The college has developed Industry-Institution linkage.
- Industry visits and hands-on training are organized.
- Conducts coaching classes for the preparation of competitive examinations like MPSC, UPSC, SSC, etc. Also classes were organized for the preparation of NET/SET Examinations.
- Competitive examinations are organized.
- Career Oriented courses develop skills among the students. These programmes ensure better career options to students.
- Organized placement camps.
- Regularly conducts students' seminars and various competitions and train the students in presentation skills.
- Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars, workshops, etc. In this way they improve their team building and organizational skills.
- Students are encouraged to participate in inter-collegiate programmes organized by other colleges which provide them opportunity to interact with fellow students and assimilate new knowledge. Some of our students bagged prizes in competitions.
- Started Diploma/ Advanced Diploma course in Dress Designing under Community College.

Community orientation:

- NSS camps conduct in nearby villages where people are provided awareness on various social, moral, ethical principles and ways of life among the villagers. A spirit of service is fostered among the students through various activities.
- Orientation talks are organized on special occasions like birth anniversaries of great leaders.
- Always create community orientation among the students by organizing programmes like road safety campaign, voter's rally, various Women Empowerment programmes, save girl child rally, cleanliness drive, blood donation camp, etc.
- Adopted tribal & backward village *Kasvi* for development. Socio-economic baseline survey of the village and formulating integrated development plan for the adopted village.
- Organized workshop on Agriculture.
- Showed movies on the lives of great leaders, talks on motivational, local issues and activities for conservation of social harmony, etc.
- Organized Anti Naxal and Anti AIDS rallies.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college regularly interacts with the stakeholders through meetings and feedback mechanism. Feedbacks are taken from the alumni, parents, employers, and the students. Feedback from teachers is elicited largely at Staff Council meetings and result improvement committee meetings. The IQAC analyses the feedback and relevant feedbacks are informed to the university authorities during interface meetings (BOS, Academic Council, and Senate) of the faculty at the time of restructuring the curriculum.

As a result of the feedback mechanism following activities are initiated.

- Started career oriented programmes on Tribal Tourism, Dress Design, Herbal Medicine,
 Office Automation, Maintenance of Domestic Home Appliances, Spoken English and
 Human Rights.
- Started PG programmes in M.A. Marathi and M.A. English in YCMOU.
- Started M.Sc. in Zoology.
- Started Gondwana University affiliated Centers for Higher Learning & Research in Mathematics, Marathi, History and Sociology.
- Conducted workshop on Agriculture.

1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmers?

- IQAC frequently monitors & evaluates the quality of enrichment programmes.
- A strong feedback mechanism is in place in the college. The college takes feedback from various stakeholders as well as from guests visited to the college in various enrichment programmes. A teacher also gives their feedback through interaction in staff council meetings and other meetings.
- Feedbacks from industries and NGOs are taken.

- Seeking suggestions on various enrichment programmes through the website/ e-mail/ SMS portal of the college.
- The analysis of feedback then communicated to the Managing Committee from time to time and modifies the enrichment programmes to meet the desired objective.
- Implementing the various directives of the government.
- Organized workshop on New Education Policy in 2015.

1.4. Feedback System

1.4.1. What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

- Many of our faculty members are chairman or members of Board of Studies of Gondwana University. They give their suggestions while designing & developing the curriculum. Apart from this, many teachers participated in the workshops on curriculum and designed the scope of the syllabus.
- Teachers & students feedbacks are communicated to university.
- Organizes workshop on New Syllabus at UG & PG level.

1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes, there is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students, stakeholders and guests.

- Formats have been designed by the IQAC for the feedback from stakeholders. It contains some questions related to the curriculum. The college collects feedback from the students at the end of the each academic year, from alumni & parents at the time of the meetings. Feedback is also taken from the employers of nearby industries.
- In informal feedback, the teachers always interact with the students through the Students' Council, meetings of other associations and farewells. Students also give feedback through suggestion box.
- These feedbacks then analyzed, and suggestions communicated to the university when staff members and the head of the institution interact with the Board of Studies meeting convened by the university.

Some of the programmes introduced from the suggestions given in the feedback are as follow:


- Career oriented courses introduced from the suggestions given in the feedback.

CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Teaching learning and evaluation is the substratum of the holistic development of the students. The college has systematically incorporated effective and innovative tools and techniques of Teaching, Learning and Evaluation.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college constitutes an Admission Committee which looks after the whole admission process.

i) Publicity in the admission process:

The college was established in 1981. Hence it has a long history of progress in the field of providing quality education especially for tribal & economically weaker section. The college has effective planning of publicity.

- Prospectus giving all the academic, administrative and financial aspects related to admission process is made available to the students.
- The college publishes handouts and pamphlets containing information about admission & courses offered and distributes through newspapers and in the nearby villages hand to hand to give wide publicity.
- The college has its website: http://www.mgcollegearmori.org. All the information regarding admission is displayed on the website. Also notifications about admission are displayed on the website time to time. The notification contains detailed information about number and range of courses, eligibility, process of admission and academic as well as support facilities.
- A dedicated SMS portal is available for the publicity and sending necessary information.
- The alumni of the college play a vital role in promoting the college and in helping social network.
- The Management, faculty members, parents, students, and alumni, serve as ambassadors of the institution effectively facilitating its publicity.
- Faculty members conduct orientation programmes in selected schools in and around the district.
- Our teachers approach prospective students and their parents informing & counseling them of the course, the admission process and financial assistance available to poor students
- Publicity Flexes were placed at the college entrance and important junctions in and around the Armori town.

ii) Transparency in the admission process:

- The college follows academic calendar provided by Gondwana University in respect of admission.
- Admission Committee processes the applications and come out with a list of selected candidates and a waiting list, based on the marks scored in the qualifying examination.
- Names of the selected candidates are displayed on the notice board with the percentage of marks scored and the admission criteria followed (reservation category).

- Transparency is ensured from the stage of notification till the completion of admission process.
- In case of any grievance, the aggrieved student may approach the college Principal for readdressal.
- On completion of the admission process, necessary information along with the relevant records is sent to the university for approval.

The extent of transparency which the college maintains in this regard may be inferred from the fact that there has been no complaint about any aspect of the admission procedures in the last several years.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

According to our vision our portals are open in principle to all those desirous of continuing their studies. But, in UG courses, when the number of aspirants exceeds the number of seats allotted to different programmes, we screen the aspirants by adopting merit system (based on the percentage of marks obtained by the candidate in the qualifying examination subject to a minimum of 35% of marks.)

For the PG courses the admission is based on merit & interview. For Career Oriented programmes we follow merit-criteria. The reservation policy of the government of Maharashtra/India is applied in admission to all courses.





Yes. The college reviews admission process, mid admission process and soon after admissions are concluded. The admission committee monitors the admission process with the assistance of office staff and maintains its record with the office. A detailed review of the admission process is carried out and is placed before the Administrative Committee. The review includes the entire admission process, selection criteria, application received, total number of admissions in each course, gender wise and category wise admission analysis, admission counseling, adherence to the government norms, the difficulties faced and mechanism to address the problems. The graphical representation of the admitted students for the session 2015-2016 is given below.





Outcomes:

- The review of admission process is very helpful for the systematic and smooth conduct of the admission process.
- Providing security and extra facilities to the girl students coming from outstation.
- Counselling to the students & their parents from remote areas.
- Considering social and economic profile of the students, waive in admission fee, scholarships are provided; some of the students are adopted by the faculties.
- Started SMS service.
- Care Taker Committee is established particularly for girl students.
- Sport students are identified and motivated.
- To help the students admission process is simplified.
- Photocopying and other facilities are provided for admission related documents.
- Online admission is provided.
- Wide publicity to admission.
- Extended office hours during admission process.
- Due to this the admissions in several courses have been increased to a great extent since last four years.




SC 15 %, ST 7.5%, OBC 19%, SBC 2%, NT / VJ 11%, Women 33%.



• Women: There is no need to reserve seats for women, as they outnumber men students, on merit, in several of the courses. Over the years the ratio of male to female has been increasing in favour of female. The number of female students admitted compare to male students over last four years is shown in graph.



- **Differently abled:** We follow the government directives that reserves 3 % seats to such students. Apart from this we make their stay in the campus comfortable by shifting their classes to the ground floor.
- **Economically weaker students:** The government pays tuition fees of students coming from economically weaker sections. These students are advised to apply for fees concession, scholarships, EBC within time. They are given admission on the minimum fees of Rs. 365, but, the students from this tribal area are very poor, therefore these are also exempted from the minimum fees.
- **Minority community:** Reservation for the students from minority community is as per the state government/university norms. Minority students are provided with minority scholarship. Number of students availed this scholarship are 08. Number of minority students admitted year wise are as follows:

- Admissions to B.Sc. programme are highly attracted.
- Admissions to PG courses are highly attracted.
- In most of the programmes girl students are highly increased. This is due to facilities provided by the college frequently.
- Number of students admitted is increased over the years. The trend shows that the demand ratio for most of the programmes is increased. To attract more and more students, the college is striving to improve upon quality with the introduction of ICT enabled teaching, hands-on training in industries, availing various facilities to the students.
- Looking into number of students admitted to career oriented programmes & Community College; some needful skill based courses will be introduced in future.
- Looking into number of admitted students to PG courses, university authorized centers for Higher Learning & Research in Geology, Zoology and Chemistry are to be established.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?
 - Priority based admission & reservation to differently-abled students is provided at the time of admissions as per the policy of state government.
 - Time-table is adjusted in such a manner that most of the Orthopedically Handicapped/Locomotor disability students have their classes on the ground floor.
 - Making the campus accessible for students on wheel chairs by construction of ramps, etc.
 - The institution motivates the other fellow students to take care of differently-abled students in their campus life.
 - Friendly infrastructure facilities viz. administrative office, drinking water, washroom, library, ramp, etc. are provided.
 - The generous financial help provided to such students in the form of fee waivers and scholarships.
 - During Examinations differently-abled students are given additional time of 30 minutes, separate seating arrangement and provide writers/ scribes for the examinations as per the rules.
- Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills 2.2.2 before the commencement of the programmes? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the institute assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills through the following process:

- During the admission process members of the admission committee and all teachers meet the students and their parents. They assess their academic as well as economic background through the interaction with students and determine the needs of the students helping them to select appropriate subject combination.
- Teachers also determine the need of the students' in terms of skills and give them information about various skill development programmes available in the college.
- In the first (entry) year, during the initial two weeks of commencement of the academic year, subject teachers are instructed to take special efforts to take an overview of the background of the subjects the students have learnt in Std. XII. Revising the basics of these subjects help in bridging the knowledge gap and bring weaker students on par with others.
- Teachers update the teaching plan so as to cater to the needs of the students.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?
 - Teachers take initial classes at the beginning of the session towards further assessing and bridging the knowledge gap of the enrolled students by taking classes on the basics of the subject.
 - Remedial coaching is given to slow learners, academically weak students or those who are continuing their education after a gap.
 - Students with inadequate language skills are asked to join Spoken English programmes.

- Department of Botany conducts course in Herbal Medicine which enhances the basic knowledge of the students.
- IT classes are organized for students.
- Workshop on Research Methodology & Computer Application in Research was organized for PG and aspirant students.
- To give hands-on experience, industrial linkages are developed and industrial visits, study tours, field visits, etc. are organized.
- Classes for competitive examination and NET/SET examination are conducted.
- Special attention is given to needy and deserving students by the individual teachers.
- There is a provision for tutorials in compulsory languages and science subjects to help them cope with the difficulties.
- Meritorious students are encouraged to help slow learners.
- Teachers supplies simplified notes and recommended simplified version of books to slow learners or/and below-average students.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Basically the college works with the vision for gender sensitization, environment conservation and inclusion. These are the best and rewarded activities of the college.

Gender Sensitization:

- The college has Women's Development Committee which conducts various programmes throughout the year to sensitize gender issues. Prominent programmes are as follows:
- a) Organized three days Women Empowerment programme, 'Empowerment of Girls,' in association with *Bhartiya Jain Sanghatan* (BJS), Pune.
- b) Training for female staff members as a Master Trainer.
- c) Two times state level award winning 'Jagar Janivancha' (Women Sensitizing Campaign) under this various programmes were conducted to create awareness about equality and empowerment of the women.
- d) Organized 'Mahila Raj' (Girls Governance Day) where girl students play role model of Principal, Teacher and Non-teaching staff for a day.
- e) Organized Cookery show, Anand Melava, Dish Docaration Competition.
- f) Self Defence (Karate) Training Camp for girls.
- g) 'Chetna Rally', awareness rally for crime against women.
- h) Health counseling programe for girl students in association with NGO SEARCH.
- i) *'Yuvati Sunwai'* a programme to discuss women's problems.
- Display Boards regarding "Zero tolerance towards sexual harassment" and guidelines on making the college campus eco-friendly are exhibited at prominent locations on the college campus.
- Sexual Harassment Cell is also there in the college to deal with the case of harassment of women staff/girl students & diagnosis if any.
- Under the regular health checkup programme, advice of qualified doctors is provided to female students on issues related to the process of maturation, hemoglobin and sexuality.

- Every year college organizes Cross Country Running Competition for girl students.
- Expert talks on various gender related issues were organized.
- Promoting the girl students to take part in cultural, sports, curricular and co-curricular activities.
- Providing girl facilitated infrastructure i.e. washroom, napkin vendor machine, girls' common room.
- CCTV survivelance on the campus.
- Specially constituted Care Taker Committee.
- Counselling with the parents.
- Providing administrative/academic headship to the women staff members.

Inclusion:

- Differently-abled, SC/ST/Minority students are provided with special facilities, scholarship, etc. and at the same time encouraged to be a part of main stream activities.
- Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Study & Research Center specially concentrates on issues of SC/ST students by organizing expert lectures, seminar/ conferences.
- Information is provided regarding various scholarships and employment.
- UGC sponsored Equal Opportunity Cell is functioning in the institute.

Environment:

To create environmental awareness following prominent activities are organized.

- To create environmental awareness organizes programmes on Ozone Day, Geography Day, tree plantation, snake awareness programme, conservation & identification of medicinal/endangered plants, etc.
- A career oriented course on Herbal Medicine has been conducting.

People's Biodiversity Register (PBR)

Documentation of traditional knowledge related to biodiversity. It is an attempt to promote folk ecological knowledge & wisdom. It is undertaken in participatory mode involving various sections of the village society. An attempt is made to realize the biodiversity through the partnership among the college (Academics), communities (civil society) and government (policy makers). We attempt to access local knowledge, identifying local issues/ problems for the conservation of environment.

Second year UG students make PBR under the guidance of the teachers for which they visit nearby villages and jungles through which they getting oriented about changes in the environment taking place.

- Effort is to make campus green and beautiful. For this Campus Beautification Committee is constituted.
- Vermicompost for waste & bio-composting project. The Community is directly benefited by application of Vermicompost & Vermiwash for improving crop productivity at rural and tribal level. It attempts to create clean, green atmosphere in the college.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are identified through the following methods:

- From the continuous comprehensive evaluation process.
- Interactive classroom teaching and classroom discussions. Various methods of evaluation are also used for the purpose: viz. question-answer sessions, problem solving sessions, home assignments, group discussions and seminars.
- Conducting class tests and term tests.
- Assessing the marks obtained in semester end examinations.

The institute responds to special educational / learning needs of the advanced learners by taking the following steps:

- Recommending reference books and journals for in-depth study.
- Class seminars.
- Network Resource Center is made available.
- Achievements of the meritorious students are displayed in prominent places in campus.
- Felicitation of meritorious students.
- Such students are also encouraged to participate in symposium, paper presentation, poster presentation, quiz contest, etc.
- Counseling is given to the advanced learners regarding preparation for different examinations such as JAM, GATE, NET, SET, PET, MPSC, Banking, etc.
- They have given additional tasks like making paper solutions, seminars, searching the latest development in the subject, etc.
- They are encouraged to appear for national level scholarship tests like KVPY, INSPIRE.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
 - The faculty members evaluate the academic performance of the students. The heads of the various departments collects feedback from the faculty on the enrolment, attendance, punctuality and reasons for absenteeism for regular classes as well as for internal examinations to identify the students at a risk of drop-out.
 - After declaration of results by the university, results of every class and all subjects are analyzed. An interface meeting of each faculty member with principal is conducted to discuss the academic performance of the students and decides the measures that are to be taken to enhance the academic performance.
 - The students who are failed are advised to apply for supplementary examination. Counseling is done by the teachers. The institution gives the facility to borrow the necessary books from the library.
 - Some needy and deserving students are given financial aid at the time of admission.
 - Remedial classes are arranged for disadvantaged section of society and slow learners.

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- University examination paper solutions are provided to the students to get an idea to write answer.
- College sends SMS to the parents of those students who do not attend the classes regularly. Teachers discuss the problems of the students with their parents and help them accordingly.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Every year the college plans teaching, learning and evaluation schedules along with the plans of curricular and extension activities at the beginning of the academic year.

Academic Calendar

- The academic calendar is prepared by individual department with their faculties and head of the department. The committee considers the feedback from stakeholders, directions of the management and principal of the college. The committee follows UGC/ University guidelines/circulars regarding academic working days.
- The academic calendar contains a plan of various academic events to be organized during the year considering the teaching learning days. It consists of schedule of internal assessment activities like unit test, seminars, assignments, various curricular activities.
- Extra lectures and remedial classes are made available on holidays and Sundays to complete the syllabus.
- This academic calendar also available on the website.
- At the end of each academic session each department submit their annual reports and discuss the future academic plan in the meeting headed by the principal.

Teaching Plan

- Faculty wise time table is prepared by the time table committee at the beginning of the academic year. It is circulated among the faculty and displayed on notice board.
- The size and schedule for department-wise batches is fixed and distributed to respective departments.
- A meeting of all the faculty members of a particular department is called by the head of the department to discuss the courses/syllabus for the following semester/ session. During this meeting, the distribution of the syllabi and workload among the faculty members based on their preference/interest/expertise is finalized.
- Each faculty member is provided by the curricular & co-curricular diary in the beginning of the academic year. The content of the diary is: personal time table, teaching plan, curricular activities, extension activities, research activities, record of internal assessment, record of university results, leave record, etc. They prepare comprehensive teaching plan for their respective courses for the current semester.
- These diaries are weekly assessed by the IQAC and the principal.

Evaluation Blue Print

• The students' knowledge is evaluated on the basis of various internal assessment activities like unit tests, seminars, assignments, oral tests, practical works, project works and attendance.

- Evaluation policy and schedule of internal assessment for each course is fixed well in advance and is communicated to students at the beginning of every academic year.
- The result of internal examinations is orally communicated to students and necessary suggestions are given to the students.
- The weightage of evaluation for all programmes is: 20% weightage for internal examinations and 80% for external examinations.
- The semester end evaluation is done by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli who displays the semester end examination schedule well in advanced.

2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC plays a major role in overall development of the institution. A quality teaching-learning process is the main objective of an institution. IQAC plays an important role towards realization of the goals of quality enhancement. IQAC takes the following measures towards the improvement of the teaching-learning process:

- Prepare portfolio of various committees.
- Conducts meeting with the Principal and various departments, committees to prepare academic, co-curricular & extra-curricular calendar and to develop quality benchmarks/parameters of various activities to support teaching-learning process.
- Suggesting the Principal for enhancing the infrastructure in terms of space, smart classrooms equipped with modern ICT gadgets, laboratory equipment, library facilities, etc.
- Encourage the faculty members to adopt innovative methods of teaching and ICT through the use of modern gadgets.
- Organized training programmes for teachers & students to enhance the use of ICT facilities, digital gadgets, software to improve teaching-learning.
- Suggest faculty members to prepare classroom teaching videos, soft copy of study materials, paper solutions of previous university examinations, etc. ensuring all these materials are available on college website for students.
- One Day Workshop was organized on the occasion of World Youth Skill Day by NSDC, Kolkata training partner Mr. Bapchi.
- Ensuring the availability of computers, internet, e-resources and computer aided packages for the faculty & students.
- Motivating the faculty members to organize & attend research related programmes like Major/Minor Research Projects, pursuing Ph. D., organizing & attending conferences /seminars /workshops, faculty development programmes, and inter-disciplinary programmes.
- Arrangement of feedback from students and other stakeholders on the classroom teaching, institution and curriculum. After analysis it is communicated to the concerned teacher.
- Analyze semester end examination results and conducts results improvement committee
 meetings in which members interact with each teachers about their difficulties and give
 suggestions for effective teaching-learning.
- Motivate various departments to organize field visits, educational tours, industrial visits, etc. to inculcate practical approach among the students and to make teaching-learning more learners oriented.
- Provides academic and co-curricular diary to each faculty member and verified weekly.

2.3.3. How learning is made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Learning process of the college has always been learner oriented. Learning is made more student-centric by giving emphasis on making it more participatory and interactive through various activities.

We elaborately use explanation of the text. It is supplemented with project works, assignments, group discussions, student seminars, and essay competitions. Teaching sessions outside classrooms (visits to local industries, forest nurseries, local wildlife sanctuaries, study tours, and PBR studies) demand greater participation of students in gathering information on their own. In such sessions teachers remain as observers/supervisors. In programmes like PBR (People's Biodiversity Register) students in groups are entrusted with the task of collecting data related to environment/ecology.

To develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students, teachers are supported in the following ways:

- To become teaching-learning process more interactive classrooms are made equipped with modern teaching-learning aids like projector, image viewer, etc.
- Computer with internet facility is available in every department which enables teachers to access online e-resources.
- Well-equipped laboratories.
- Well-furnished and updated central library with adequate number of research journals and reprographic facility.
- INFLIBNET in addition to avail the excellent library resources.
- Seminar hall.
- Language lab.
- Making of stuffed specimens for Museum in Zoology Department & Herbarium in Botany Department.
- Started Career Oriented Programmes & Community College to enhance the skills among the students.
- Final year students of UG & PG courses are assigned project works.
- Teachers have liberty to develop their own study materials in the form of notes, power point presentations, sharing e-resources. These are made available on the college website.
- Teachers have freedom to arrange expert lectures to deliver deep knowledge to the students.
- Field visits, industrial visits, socio-economic surveys, educational tours are conducted to develop interactive, collaborative and independent learning among the students.
- Hands-on training camp of sellmanship/ retail management at college campus organized by the Department of Commerce on every Saturday.
- Expert lectures are regularly organized for enhancing the learning attitude of the students.
- Interaction with the entrepreneur to link learners with the industries, use of industrial workshops for the learning, solutions for field problems.
- On the occasion of Girls Governance Day, girls are given an opportunity to get the experience of actual teaching in the classroom.

- Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various curricular and co-curricular programmes which develops sense of collaborative learning.
- Advanced learner students prepare paper solutions of university previous examinations which are used as study materials helping weaker students.
- Organizing science exhibitions, transparencies, model & charts are prepared by students.

2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

To promote critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students, college conducts various activities.

- Annual cultural & sport events and other various events provides a platform to the students to bring out their leadership, managerial skill, cultural skill, sport talent, creativity and other hidden skills.
- Creative assignments: slogan writing, essay writing on current issues, poster competition, various activities like science exhibition, debate competition, tree plantation, celebrating National Science Day, seminars, etc. evoke creativity and scientific temper inside the students.
- Writing in College Magazine enhances critical thinking and creativity.
- Project based work like PBR, socio-economic survey, etc. develops critical thinking and scientific temper among the students.
- Students are encouraged to participate in inter-collegiate academic, cultural and sports competitions to foster the students.
- NSS activities nurture creativity and team sprit among the students.
- Study tours, industrial visits, and field visits are also organized by different departments for the students.
- Coaching classes for competitive examinations are conducted and the students are motivated to appear in competitive examinations like SET, NET, GATE, MPSC, and UPSC.
- Participating in national/international level seminars/workshops/conferences.
- Students are given adequate opportunity to have interactions in classroom by involving them in group discussion and reasoning.
- Promote the creativity amongst students by encouraging them and providing opportunities to them to do event management of various programmes and events that are held in the college premises like Annual Cultural and sports event, Teacher's Day, *Mahila Raj* (Women Governance Day), etc.
- Central library has subscription of various national/ international magazines and research journals. Students have full access to these magazines, research journals and books.
- Project work assigned to the UG & PG students develop critical thinking and scientific temper.
- Sophisticated laboratories with modern equipment help the students for developing critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students.
- Course on dress designing of Community College supports the students to transform them into lifelong learners & innovators.

- Organizing examinations on Gandhian Studies, *Pragyashodh* examination encouraging the students for lifelong learning.
- 2.3.5. What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The college has added following technologies and facilities for effective teaching:

- Video recorder is available to record teaching videos.
- Teachers are encouraged to participate in special training programmes and visiting fellowships at various reputed institutions to enhance the skills.

2.3.6. How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced levels of knowledge and skills? (Blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops, etc.)?

To expose the students and faculty to advanced level of knowledge and skills the initiatives taken by the institution are as follows:

Blended Learning:

Computer and internet assisted learning is made available to the students and faculty so that they can learn through open educational resources.

In addition to this teacher provides digital materials to the students to support classroom teaching-learning process.

Expert Lectures:

Some of the renowned and expert personalities are invited to deliver advanced level of knowledge and skill to the faculty members and students.

- Dynamics & diversity of migratory birds in Waghala village.

- Collecting & analyzing Socio-economics Data by the students of Humanities Departments in the months of September to February every year.

Other:

- INFLIBNET is subscribed by the college.
- 48 Journals & periodicals are available in the Library to update knowledge about recent developments in research.
- Central library subscribes above 17000 Reference & Text Books, 11 newspapers (Marathi and English), and magazines to update students on latest global advancements.
- Field visits and educational excursions to various places of academic interest are arranged throughout the year by various departments.

Academic & Professional Guidance:

- The institution always strives to provide support to the students on various aspects like academic, employment, personal and psycho-social.

Personal and Psycho-Social Support:

- Care Taker Committee: A care taker committee is constituted to look after the problems facing by the outstation students.
- Admission Committee members visit the students and their parents from nearby villages for the admission counseling. They provide academic advice right from the choice of the subjects to the various scholarships available. Financially weaker students are provided financial support by the faculty and fee waived by the institution at the time of admission.

- Motivating parents of girl students to allow them to participate in various activities.
- Providing financial assistance to poor, needy bright students in academic/sport.
- 2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Innovative Teaching Approaches/Methods:

To make teaching-learning more effective, institution has adopted some innovative teaching methods as follows:

- PBR is regular activity for all second year students.
- Sharing of video recordings of the lectures.
- Interactive classroom teaching to make it more students friendly.
- Sharing of teaching videos delivered by eminent personalities.
- Paper solutions of the previous examinations are prepared by the students under the guidance of teacher and are kept in the library for the students' accession.

Efforts Made By the Institution:

The institution always makes efforts to encourage the faculty to adopt new innovative approaches. The efforts are as below:

- The Principal encourages and give suggestions on the use of ICT in teaching in the meetings held at various occasions.
- The Principal verify time to time, the use of ICT by the faculty and give proper suggestions.

These innovative approaches/methods create a great impact on the students.

- The students are highly benefited showing more interest in the learning process.
- These innovative methods help to get deep understanding of the subject and its intricacies.
- Making learning an enjoyable experience.
- It gives practical & hands-on experience resulting in skill development.

2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library resources are used to augment teaching-learning process in the following manner:

- The college has fully automated central library having more than 17000 Reference & Textbooks, 48 journals & periodicals, 11 newspapers (Marathi and English), and magazines to update students on latest global advancements, adequate number of books for competitive examinations and e-resources like audio/video CDs / DVDs.
- The college has membership of online resource INFLIBNET that offers large number of e-books and e-journals in full text forms. OPAC and CMS facility is available.
- Dedicated UGC Network Resource Center is available.
- All the PG departments and some UG departments have their departmental library containing reference & textbooks. The departmental libraries also maintain project reports, M.Phil. and Ph.D. dissertations, research journals and reports.
- Internet and reprographic facilities are available in the central library. Teachers & students have access to these facilities.
- Book Bank facility for the students.
- Cash deposit scheme is available to the students.
- Extra books are made available to bright students on the recommendation of the concerned teacher.
- The library has a well-furnished reading room for the students.

- Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university with question-wise division of marks etc. is also made available to students.
- Sets of previous examination question papers and its solutions are made available for the students.
- The books for competitive examination are made available to the regular students as well as alumni of the college.
- The central library functions on all working days from 7.30 am to 3.00 pm with flexible hours of working as per the need of the students & faculty.
- Open access is allowed for few UG, PG students and Research Scholars.
- To improve upon the facilities suggestions from the stakeholders are welcome, for this suggestion box is installed inside the library.
- Organized Book Exhibition.
- Displaying new arrivals in the library facility for faculty & students.
- Every year the best reader award is given to promote effective utilization of library.

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If "yes", elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes. Though, at the beginning of the academic year, the college prepares academic plan & calendar to complete curriculum with planned time frame but sometimes due to late declaration of results by the university, unexpected loss of working days, sometimes because of *Bandh* declared by political parties, etc. institution faces challenges in completing the curriculum.

To overcome these challenges teachers take extra & remedial classes on holidays.

2.3.11. How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The teaching learning process is monitored regularly by the incharge Principal and the Principal of the college by personal round & CCTV vigilance.
- The quality of teaching and learning is accessed by analyzing and synthesizing the results of individual subjects at the end of every semester by result improvement committee under the guidance of the Principal and IQAC.
- Faculty members submit their academic & co-curricular diaries on every Saturday. IQAC members & the Principal check these diaries and give remarks on it.
- The quality of teaching learning is monitored through periodic meetings by the head of the department & Principal.
- Students' attendance in the class is regularly monitored and sends alert message to the parents of irregular students.
- The feedback taken from students and parents is shared with teachers through interactive meetings where shortcomings/problems are discussed.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1. Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resources (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

Recruitment

Since the college is affiliated to the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli it follows the rules and regulations laid down by the UGC/state government for the recruitment of the faculty. The policy of the recruitment is transparent. The human resource recruitment strategies adopted by the college are as follows:


- Access the need of faculty from various departments on the basis of workload.
- Vacancy is then communicated to Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal's (MSPM) Governing Body through the Principal.
- The institution submits the proposal to the university and the government (Joint Director of Higher Education, Nagpur) for approval.
- The roster of reservation of seats is then approved from the university and the government.
- On getting the approval form both to go ahead, the post is advertised in national and regional newspapers (English and Marathi), website of Director of Employment & Self Employment, Government of Maharashtra and also on college website with full details regarding required educational qualification, nature of the vacancy and salary.
- Applications received are scrutinized and applicants are shortlisted supplemented with the names of eligible candidates supplied by the Government Employment Office.
- A selection committee is constituted as per the UGC, the government and the Gondwana University rules/stipulations.
- Date of personal interviews is fixed and call letters are sent to shortlisted candidates, giving them reasonable time, asking them to appear for an interview.
- The selected candidates are appointed on a temporary basis, and their documents along with the selection committee's minutes are sent to the university and the government for approval. On getting the approvals appointment is finalized.


Retention

To retain adequate and well qualified faculty following strategies are adopted by the college:

- Recruited staff is confirmed as per the State Government/ UGC regulations.
- Teachers are granted special study leave to upgrade their qualification by perusing Ph.D.
- Duty leave is granted to attend orientation and refresher courses.
- Duty leave is sanctioned for attending seminars, conferences and workshops.
- The faculty members are encouraged to do the research work by undertaking Major and Minor Research Projects, for which laboratories and infrastructure are made available as per their requirement.

2.4.2. How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The college has introduced new PG courses, add-on course i.e. Community College and Tribal Tourism. It also runs professional course like Computer Science and Microbiology. These courses need inputs from experts from relevant field. The college made the efforts to cope with the growing demand of qualified faculty as follows:

- The add-on courses like Community College and Tribal Tourism have well established departments equipped with experienced staff. Teaching is supplemented by experts in the field. For this, MOUs has been signed with three industrial partners.
- For the professional course like Computer Science and Microbiology, the faculty is appointed on contract basis. The faculty also has technical background; they have wide experience of the field.
- For PG courses, expert faculties from nearby institution are invited.
- Moreover, guest lectures of experts from the relevent field are also arranged.
- These efforts are resulted into the enhancement of knowledge and skills of students in tune with recent updates and advancements in respective subjects/ fields.

2.4.3. Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years, elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

a) Nomination to staff development programmes

The college always encourages the faculty to participate in various faculty development programmes like Refresher course, Orientation course, Summer School programmes, Winter School programmes, etc. The details are given below:

b) Research & Development Committee:

A dedicated Research & Development committee is constituted to monitor and address the issue of research in the college. The objective of the research committee is to promote research culture in the college.

The committee motivate and guides teachers in presenting papers, publishing in journals, registering for Ph. D., preparing & submitting the proposal of Major & Minor Research Projects and sending progress report to the funding agencies, promoting collaborative work, consultancy work, establishing linkages and signing MOUs with various nearby Industries, NGOs.

Research & Development Committee organized six days workshop on 'Research Methodology and Computer Applications in Research'. This workshop covered sessions on modern tools like SPSS, Mathematica, Mathcad and Minitab. It also covered presentation tools and techniques.

c) Faculty Training programmes organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning.

A workshop on Digital India was organized in which teachers and students are made aware about new technologies and they are encouraged to use computer and internet to improve teaching learning process.

- The Department of Computer Science regularly organizes Training programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff of the college to make them aware of the new technology.
- The Department of Mathematics conducted workshop on New Syllabus.

Teaching learning methods/approaches

The college motivates the teachers to prepare computer aided teaching learning materials and power point presentations. The teachers use LCD projector, OHP, visualizer for teaching.

Handling new curriculum

If there is change in the syllabus initiated by our university, the same is conveyed to the faculty and we have experienced and qualified faculty to handle the new curriculum with ease.

Content / knowledge management

Faculties are encouraged to attend the workshops on syllabus. The equipments and technologies are purchased as per new syllabus.

Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

The teachers of our college are given free access to internet. This helps them to collect enrichment materials from the internet. The college has a well-developed library which contains books of various subjects and various journals & periodicals.

Assessment

The following criteria are used for assessment of teachers.

- IQAC assesses self-assessment report (PBAS) of teachers and submitted to the Principal.
- Participation in co-curriculum & extra-curricular activities by the teachers.
- Participation in the seminars, conferences, workshops.
- Attending orientation & refresher courses in due time.
- Undertaking research projects & publishing papers.
- Performing the assigned duties promptly.

Cross cutting issues

- The cross cutting issues like gender sensitizing (like EOG workshop organized), environmental studies (PBR) are given much attention.
- Through NSS various activities in adopted village and for awareness towards environmental issues are organized.

Audio visual aids/multimedia

The college is well equipped with LCD projectors, computers, image visualizer, laptops, video CDs. The college has provided computers with internet browsing facilities to the faculty members for preparation of teaching learning materials.

Teaching-learning material development, selection and use.

The teachers develop their own material for teaching. Faculty prepares power point presentations for their subject.

- Organized national conferences by providing seed money from the UGC grants.
- Encourage teachers to take up major/ minor research projects with UGC and other agency's financial assistance.
- Motivates teachers to participate in training workshops on syllabus.
- Special allocation is made in the college annual budget for promoting research.
- Promote faculty exchange programme.
- Create awareness amongst teachers regarding various databases, citation index, h-index, SNIP and SJR.

Providing technical & financial assistance and administrative co-operation for promoting excellence in teaching. Assigning the faculties on various responsible & significant academic and administrative portfolios.

2.4.6. Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teachinglearning process?

Yes. The institution has evaluation mechanism of teachers by the students and external peers by the means of feedback collected through various means.

- 1. Periodic students' oral & written feedbacks on course content and teaching were received through feedback form and suggestion box.
- 2. API/ Self-Appraisal Reports submitted by the faculty evaluated by the Principal and expert committees constituted by the university.
- 3. Obtained oral & written feedback from parents in parent teacher meeting.
- 4. Result analysis by Result Improvement Committee.
- 5. Feedback obtained from alumni through the email/college website.
- 6. Monitoring of teaching through CCTV.

On the basis of these feedbacks, the Principal interacts with teachers and gives suggestions on improving teaching-learning process in staff council meeting and Result Improvement Committee meeting.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1. How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The institution displays the university notification/notice regarding the course, examination pattern, maximum marks, time allotted and the minimum marks required for passing the examination.
- For references, an updated examination manual is available at the office.
- Internal examinations, home assignment are conducted as per the schedule and are evaluated and assessed the answer books and students are informed about their mistakes; their doubts are cleared and suggested them for better performance.
- The previous university examination question papers and their model solutions are made available to the students in the library and the departments.
- A record of university examination result is maintained in the college office and every department. Record of internal examination result is also maintained.
- Result improvement committee & the Principal analyze and discuss the results at the start of each academic year in the meeting.
- The Principal and concerned staff attended the training workshop on Online Evaluation System conducted by the University.

2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Evaluation reforms of the university:

- Presently the university adopted Credit Based System and going to introduce Choice Based Credit System.
- The university results will be announced within the stipulated period of 45 days.
- All examination and evaluation related works are made online.
- Internal assessment examination.

- Availability of photo copies of the answer books to students for review of the result and apply for revaluation.
- University examination and its valuation for some of the courses/subjects are conducted online.

Reforms initiated by the institution:

- Continuous and comprehensive evaluation of the students by the institution through unit tests, assignments, seminars, students' classroom attendance, oral, project work, etc.
- The institution takes into consideration students' performance in co/extra-curricular activities also, such as sports and games, and other socio-cultural/literary activities.
- The answer books of the internal examinations are in a single booklet, which helps for easy recording and easy perusal for the students to review.
- PBR are made as a part of environmental study for UG second year students.
- Institution made available all the necessary facilities to the students related to evaluation.
- In the Community College, institution introduced multiple entry and exit point evaluation system.

2.5.3. How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college follows the evaluation reforms of the university and its own.

- The college conducts university examinations. The faculty is assigned supervision duty for the examination. For online examination, necessary arrangement is done by the college.
- The college provides necessary training to the staff for effective implementation of online evaluation system initiated by the university.
- Students approach to the concerned faculty for the review of photocopies of the answer books.
- Institution allows the students to attain the classes till university revaluation results are declared.
- At the beginning of academic year, every teacher submit schedule of internal assessment and evaluation pattern to the Principal.
- Principal monitors the conduct of internal assessment with the help of the heads of the departments.
- A special committee is formed to conduct PBR Project work and UG/PG seminars.
- Teachers are made mandatory to give their contact details during vacation for any emergency concerning examination / marks entry.

2.5.4. Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Students are assessed on the basis of the following formative and summative approaches:

Method of Formative Evaluation:

- Each department conducts unit tests on each unit, seminar presentations, assignment, oral examination, problem solution, project work like PBR for UG and mini research projects for PG students.
- Various competitions are organized by the cultural department, NSS, science association and different departments such as essay competition, debate competition, elocution competition, poster competition, quiz competition, etc. as well as various games & sports events to evaluate the skills of the students.

Method of Summative Evaluation:

• Summative evaluation is carried out by the university. For this, the marks obtained in the university examination are considered. This evaluation is carried out by the examiners appointed by the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

Impact of Formative and Summative Evaluation:

- As a result of these formative and summative assessment students get thorough understanding of the subject. Students can optimally express their knowledge and this enhances their confidence. Students learn valuable life-long skills such as self-evaluation, self-assessment and goal setting.
- 2.5.5. Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)
 - Each department conducts unit tests, seminars, oral tests, assignments, project works, study tours, etc. as a part of internal assessment. These activities and test enhance independent learning and communication skills of the students.
 - Behavioral aspects and independent learning are assessed on the basis of NSS activities, co-curricular, cultural & sports activities, essay competition, elocution competition, debate competition, class attendance, punctuality, conduct of the students in campus, etc.
 - After evaluation, the answer sheets are shown to the students. The mark list prepared of the internal assessment is then shown to the students helps in maintaining transparency.
 - Different departments have assigned different weightages for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills, etc.

2.5.6. What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Scientific temper, Self-confidence, self-employability, ethical values, communication skills, team work, leadership qualities, and social responsibilities are some of the graduate attributes specified by the college.

- The college provides opportunities to students for effective learning abilities through seminars.
- The academic calendar is strictly followed. The teachers make use of ICT to create interest about the subject among the students. The teachers always try to improve the results and enhance the intellectual level of the students.

- The college organizes many different cultural and sport activities, NSS activities which help in overall development of the students.
 Study tours industrial visits are also arranged. The students are encouraged to
- Study tours, industrial visits are also arranged. The students are encouraged to participate in various events. All this helps to attain the graduate attributes among the students.
- The college takes initiative for skill education by introducing some skill based and vocational courses like Dress Designing, Tribal Tourism, Herbal Medicine, Office Automation, Maintenance of Home Appliances, Communicative English, and Human Rights.
- To ensure the leadership and social responsibility among the students college has adopted a rural tribal village (*Kasvi*) for the overall development.

2.5.7. What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

College Level:

The college has a Grievance & Redressal Cell headed by the Principal. The students can ask their doubts related to evaluation of Internal Assessment to the concerned teachers and teachers resolve these doubts. If any grievances remain unresolved students can apply to Grievance & Redressal Cell of the college which redresses the grievances.

• University Level:

If students have any doubts regarding evaluation at university level, they can obtain photocopy of answer sheets of desired subject after filling on-line application on the university website within seven days and submitting the hardcopy of this application with necessary fee to the university through the college. The students get the photocopy within 8 to 10 days.

If student desires revaluation of the answer sheet then he/she needs to apply by filling the on-line form on the university website and forwarded through the college with prescribed fee. After revaluation, the university communicates the result to the student.

2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1. Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?


Yes. The college has clearly stated learning outcomes in its vision and mission and college is fully committed to achieve it. The details are given below:

- The teachers formulate learning outcomes for each course and these are communicated to the students. These learning outcomes are displayed in the respective departments.
- Well-functioning Employment Guidance Bureau & Placement Cell regularly organizes various learning outcome awareness programmes. Some prominent activities are *SPARDHARATNA* (Competitive Examination), organizing placement programmes of various companies, special lectures on career opportunities, inviting alumni to share their own experiences, Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme, etc.

- Industrial visits, field visits, training programmes are arranged by the college. For this, MOUs has been signed with nearby industries.
- Every year Academic Excellence Awards are given to the students who have delivered outstanding performance in academics.
- 2.6.2. Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme.  - The institution monitors the performance of the students by assessing their activity in the class/campus: comprehensive question/ answer sessions, class/home assignments, project work, unit tests, seminars and by assessing their performance in other college activities such as extension, cultural and literary activities.
 - The teachers conduct Internal Assessment of the students and shows the marks obtained in the Internal Assessment to the students.
 - Answer sheets of unit tests, assignments with comments/ suggestions on how to improve are shown to the students after evaluation.
 - The departments also prepare subject/paper wise result sheets with all details after the university results are declared.
 - Every year, parent, students and teachers meetings are organized in the college; parents freely discuss the performance of students and suggestions are submitted to committee and the Principal.

2.6.3. How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution are structured in order to facilitate the achievement of learning outcomes to be seen among the students such as knowledge, understanding, practical skill, communication skill, social responsiveness, and scientific temper.

***** Teaching

- The Principal conducts regular meetings with the faculty and the departments, prepare its own plans to get learning outcomes through overall development of students.
- The faculty prepares their individual teaching plan, paper solutions, laboratory manuals and other study materials as per the intended learning outcomes.
- Various ICT enabled teaching gadgets like LCD projector; image viewer, etc. are available in the institution. Classrooms are equipped with LCD projector and necessary facility.
- Teachers suggest open sources available on the internet and reference books available in the library for updating the knowledge & the deep understanding of the subject.
- The guest lectures on various aspects of curriculum are organized for students.

Learning

- Supporting learning activities such as seminars, group discussions, industrial visits, field visits, practices, assignments, etc. helps to achieve the intended learning outcomes.
- Remedial classes are also arranged for the slow learners.

Assessment

- Continuous evaluation of students performance through unit tests, seminars, assignments, oral/viva voce, project works, field visits, study tours, co-curricular & extra-curricular activities, group discussion, etc. are conducted for the assessment of the students through which intended learning outcomes can be achieved.
- The meritorious students are felicitated with cash prize, certificate and medals given by the faculty members.

2.6.4. What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students, etc.) of the courses offered?

The measures taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance of the course are as given below:

Student placements:

- Employment & Guidance bureau conducts coaching classes for competitive examinations like UPSC, MPSC. It guides the students for the preparation of NET and SET examinations.
- It offers placement assistance to students and prepares them to face interviews. Companies like *Bhartiya Suraksha Dakshata Parishad* New Delhi, S.I.S. Hyderabad, Reliance, Tata Consultancies Services (TCS), A.A. Industries Desaiganj, Ramdeobaba Solvent Ltd. Bramhapuri, etc. are invited for the placement.
- Student placement for teaching post is done in the institutions belong to our parent society.
- A competitive examination, *SPARDHARATNA*, is conducted every year to prepare the students for competitive examination.

Entrepreneurship Skill Development:

- Placement Cell invites entrepreneurs and alumni, who shares their own experiences and motivates to be a successful entrepreneur. Career counselling programmes are also conducted.
- The college has started a noble activity, *Entrepreneur Skill Development Programme* to promote entrepreneurship skills among the students.
- Recently, the college has established Industry-Institute interaction by signing MOUs
 with nearby industries like A.A. Industries, Ramdeobaba Solvent Industries, Regional
 Tassar Center which provides a platform for students and industry experts to interact
 and share experiences.
- A Workshop on Retail Training was organized by Department of Computer Science in December 2013.
- Expert talk of Mr. Krishna S. Bahadure, Manager, Bank of Maharashtra on *Prime Minister Mudra Yojana* was organized on 10/02/2016.
- Department of Commerce organized Employability Skill Development Programme in 2015-2016.

Social Responsibility: Strategies & Action

- To enhance the social relevance students are encouraged to participate in NSS activities. NSS conducts various social activities. Every year, it organizes a camp in nearby villages through which activities like cleanliness drive, digging sanitation holes, making roads, creating awareness about health & hygiene and against addiction through rallies, experts talk & cultural programmes. As a part of social responsibility it organized blood donation camp.
- Apart from this NSS and other committees like Women Development Cell, Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Center, Dr. Ambedkar Study & Research Center, Science Association, Environment Study Committee, etc. also conduct various programmes. They conduct cleanliness drive in Armori village and on the college campus on the eve

of *Gandhi Jayanti*. Conducts elocution competition, debate competition, campaigns on various health, gender, sexual abuse, superstition and environmental issues. These types of joint ventures have helped the college/students in understanding the needs of society in general and created awareness among students in particular.

Gender Sensitization:

- Women Empowerment is the activity of our privilege and pride. Our college regularly organizes women empowerment programmes. The college had organized a three days workshop on Empowerment of Girls (EOG), *Mahila Raj* (Women Governance Day), elocution, debate, essay competition, etc. to spread awareness about gender sensitization in the society.
- Our 'Women Empowerment' activity is highly appreciated by the government. The college received award for these activities in 2013-2014 from Government of Maharashtra. The award includes Rs. 2,00,000 (Rs. Two Lakh), momento and certificate of appreciation.
- The award is also received in 2012-2013 from the Government of Maharashtra. It includes Rs. 50,000/- (Rs. Fifty Thousand), certificate of appreciation and momento.

Road Safety Campaign:

- The college regularly conducts Road Safety Campaign as a social responsibility by organizing various activities. For effective implication of Road Safety Campaign the college was awarded by Government of Maharashtra in 2013-2014 by awarding cash prize Rs. 25,000/- (Rs. Twenty Five Thousand), momento and certificate of appreciation at the hands of Hon'ble Devendraji Fadanvis, Chief Minister of Maharashtra.
- Also the campaign was awarded by Government of Maharashtra in 2012-2013. The award includes cash prize Rs. 12,500/- (Rs. Twelve Thousand Five Hundred), momento and certificate of appreciation. This campaign was also appreciated by District Police Office, Chandrapur by awarding Rs. 10,000/- and certificate.
- The college has adopted a rural & tribal village *Kasvi* as commitment to community and to develop strong sense of civic responsibility among the students. The development of this village will be done over the five years with support of staff, students, alumni association, government agencies, private sectors, civilians and NGOs. Various activities are organized for the development of this village.

Research Attitude:

- To develop research attitude among the students, the college has started a noble activity in the form of People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) as a part of environmental studies for second year UG courses. It is an attempt to promote folk ecological knowledge and wisdom. Under this activity students visit nearby village & jungle and collects relevant information. This information is then analyzed and presented in the form of report.
- Students are encouraged to participate in research festivals like 'Avishkar'.
- The college organizes national level seminars, conferences and workshops every year to promote the research activity.

Collection and analysis of data:

- Subject/ paper wise result analysis of the university results showing comparative performance of students are prepared.
- This analysis helps to understand the academic weaknesses of the students.
- Feedbacks from the stakeholders are analyzed and synthesized.
- The Principal and IQAC then interact with the teachers about the results and feedback collected.
- Teachers are then advised to make teaching methods more learners oriented.

Steps to overcome barriers of learning:

 Providing question bank to students, paper solutions of previous university examination papers, remedial classes for weaker students, special guidance to advanced learners, ICT enabled teaching, counselling to students to minimize absentee.

2.6.6. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The institution monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcome by undertaking following measures:

- The Principal collects information about syllabus taught time to time.
- The Principal suggests teachers to adopt learner centric teaching methods.
- Attendance is compulsorily taken in every lecture and practical.
- Students performance in university examination is monitored by Result Improvement Committee.
- The absentee and performance in the examination are informed to their parents through alert SMS.
- Remedial measures like remedial classes, student seminars, assignments, paper solutions, counseling to weaker students, etc. are taken.
- Students are encouraged to participate in curricular, co-curricular and extension activities inside as well as outside the college.
- Students' seminars of UG & PG are organized.
- Monitoring their progress at every class unit test, home assignment and semester end examinations.
- To know the students interest in academic activity, monitoring library book issue register is done.
- Rank holders in the university are felicitated in the college function by subject faculty.

Yes. The institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.

- The internal assessment marks allotted on the basis of their performance in class unit tests, seminars, home assignments and projects, participation in study tours and industrial visits.
- The assessment of students' performance also done on the basis of co-curricular and extra curricular activities. Attendance record lead to the regularity of students in classes.
- The NSS, cultural and sports students are also given due advantages in assessment as an additional weightage.
- Tutorials, discussions, interactions and remedial coaching for the students.
- Personal, academic counseling to the students.
- Subject/paper wise result analysis is prepared by institution and departments. This data helps in understanding academic weaknesses of the students. The students are counselled to seek improvement. All this process resulted in more learner oriented teaching.

Examples

- Colour holder in sport activities: On the basis of assessment, the students are recommended to participate in games and sports at various levels and achieved colour holder of the university.
- National scholarship INSPIRE: The college student Ku. Apurwa Anil Lohe recommended for national scholarship like INSPIRE. She got the amount Rs. 2,40,000 for the period of three years.
- The result of university semester examination as well as university toppers & merit list stiffly increased.

- Encourage faculty members to apply for Major and Minor Research Projects to various funding agencies.
- Conducts research methodology course for the research students.
- Establish industry-institution linkage.
- Organize as well as participate in seminars/conferences/workshops.
- Make the provision for research fund by the institute in institutional annual budget.
- Encourage individual departments to actively promote consultancy service.
- Faculty should publish books, research papers/articles, etc.

Impact of Recommendations:

Four Departments (Mathematics, Marathi, History and Sociology) are upgraded as Higher Learning & Research Centers recognized by the Gondwana University.

- Almost all faculty members are actively engaged in research activity. 12 faculty members are with Ph. D. degree (43%), 03 have submitted Ph. D. Thesis to the university and 10 faculty members are registered for Ph. D.
- 01 faculty member Mr. S.B. Gedam is availed study leave under FDP to pursue doctoral degree.
- Substantial increase in major and minor research projects. 03 Minor Research Projects are ongoing, 03 faculty members have submitted proposals of Major Research Projects and 06 faculty members have submitted proposals of Minor Research Projects to UGC for financial assistance. 01Major Research Project and 10 Minor research Projects are completed during 2012-2015.
- Conducted a six days workshop on Research Methodology and Computer Applications in Research during 25th to 30th Sept., 2015.
- Linkages have been established & MOUs are signed with nearby industries like A.A. Energies Desaiganj, Ramdeobaba Solvent Brahapuri, etc.
- Organized national level conferences/ workshops every year. 08 national seminar/conferences were organized in last four years.
- Every faculty member participates and publishes research papers in national/ international conference/seminar/workshop.
- Special provision of Research Fund of Rs. 1,00,000/- (Rs. One Lakh) is made in the institutional annual budget.
- Some of the faculty members are rendering consultancy facilities to community.
- 07 faculty members are recognized Ph. D. supervisors.

The college always encourages faculty members to take up research projects sponsored by various funding agencies. The following measures are taken to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research projects.

a) Autonomy to the principal investigator

The Institution offers autonomy to the principal investigator regarding the optimum utilization of the grants sanctioned by the funding agencies as per the guidelines provided. Freedom is given to the principal investigator to purchase equipments and instruments as per his/her needs.

b) Timely availability or release of resources

The grants to the principal investigator are released as soon as they are credited by the funding agency into the college account. In some cases principal investigators are given advance against the respective heads if they wish.

c) Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The college has well established infrastructure available for research. It has well equipped laboratories, a central library with adequate number of research journals & INFLIBNET with large number of e-journals & e-books, ICT facility and high speed 4G internet facility. All these facilities are provided to the researcher. Investigators can use the human resources available in the college if they want to.

d) Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave, etc. to teachers

Duty leave is sanctioned to undertake field work and to present their findings in conferences/seminars as per the state government & university norms. Teaching load is also reduced if needed.

e) Support in terms of technology and information needs

The college provides computers and high speed 4G internet connectivity to all the departments & library which help the researcher to gain information and knowledge required in their respective areas of interest. Researchers are also provided with ICT gadgets and instruments needed. Central Library has subscription to national/ international journals and INFLIBNET through which e-journals are made available.

- f) Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding agencies.
- g) Encourage teachers to take up full time research under FDP.

The efforts are made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture among the students as follows:

- Conducts various activities under science association viz. each one plant one (tree plantation), cleanliness drive, hygiene awareness programme, seminar competition, poster competition, essay competition, blood donation camp, hematological test, science exhibition, video clip show - Amazing Sound of Birds and their communication, etc.
- Conducts Career Oriented Course on Herbal Medicine to spread awareness about medicinal plants.
- Observe National Science Day, Geography Day & Ozone Day.
- Organizes seminars & workshops by the faculty on various topics such as soil testing, green chemistry, food adulteration, drugs: its uses & side effects, remote sensing, eradication of superstition, etc.
- Organizes national level conferences/seminars and encourages the students to participate in these events to develop research aptitude & culture among the students. They are also motivated and guided to present poster in such events.
- Organizes field visits, industry visits, and study tours.
- Reputed national/ international journals and INFLIBNET is subscribed in the central

- Every year PBR (People's Biodiversity Register) projects are undertaken by U.G. second year students for environmental studies.
- Interaction was arranged during the national conferences in Agriculture, Geology, Chemistry, Botany, Geography, Marathi, Library Science, Commerce and Physical Education on futuristic materials to share scientific knowledge.
- Established linkages with local industries viz. A. A. Energies, Ramdeobaba solvent Ltd., Government Hospital, Pathology Laboratory, Tehasil Agriculture Office Armori, and Tussar Center Armori to facilitate researchers.
- Free and paid consultancies are provided by the faculties.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of 3.2.1 major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The institution has a provision of Rs. 1,00,000 for research from its own sources. Apart from this, the institution receives grant for research activities like Major/ Minor Research Project, organizing conferences/ seminars/ workshops, purchasing research books & journals, research fellowship. But, since all these funds are uncertain, provision of Rs. 1,00,000 is considered in the total budget and percentage of the budget earmarked for research is small. However, the college procures journals and books suggested by the faculty for undertaking research activities.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

• The teachers interact with other faculty members to undertake interdisciplinary research. They are presenting research papers on various topics with an interdisciplinary approach. Some of the teachers published the outcomes of their interdisciplinary research in the form of research paper in national/ international journals/ conference proceedings.

- All Second year UG students carry out interdisciplinary research project as People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) under the guidance of Environment Study Committee members. Since, it is mandatory for all second year UG students to carry out environmental study, students undertake PBR irrespective of their subjects. The topics covered under PBR are as follow:
- 1. Diversity of Invertebrate/Vertebrate Animals
- 2. Study of Benthos
- 3. Survey and Sampling/testing of Water & Soil
- 4. Geological Mapping
- 5. Socio-economic Survey

Challenges:

The students belonging to Arts and Commerce do not have sufficient science background and face difficulties in assigning scientific zoological or botanical names to different species.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

- The Institution encourages its staff and students to make optimal use of the equipment and research facilities of the institution. The college has various equipments available for its staff and students as central facility, such as computer and internet facility in Network Resource Center, Laptops, LCD Projectors, Image Viewer, DVD Player, Video Recorder, Digital Camera, Xerox Machine, Printer, Scanner, etc.
- As per the requirement, equipments of office and IQAC are also used by staff & students.
- The equipments are well maintained by the individual departments.
- The institution has a well-equipped library with over 17,000 reference & textbooks, 48 research journals & periodicals, spacious reading room. Also, library has a very good collection of educational CDs and DVDs.
- N-list INFLIBNET is available in central library and for the optimal utilization passwords are accessible to all.
- These equipments and facilities are easily accessible to the staff and students. Whenever required, these equipments and other facilities available in the institution are used by the faculty and students.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

Yes. The college receives funding under various schemes from government agency UGC. The Forest (Wildlife) Department, Government of Maharashtra, also sanctioned a Minor Research Project through which research facilities are enhanced. - Uninterrupted power supplied to all departments through electricity generator in campus.
- The college has a central library and the departments have their own individual libraries with adequate research facilities.

- People's Biodiversity Register is regular project activity for UG students. It is a documentation of folk knowledge & wisdom. Groups of students collect information of the biodiversity and preserve it in the form of report.
- Department of Chemistry regularly conducts water analysis of well & tube well water of nearby villages. The information generated from this analysis will be beneficial for making remedies for purifying water and securing public health.
- Department of Geography & Economics carry out socio-economic survey of nearby villages every year. It will help in generating social and economic status of the society which contributes to social development.
- Department of Marathi has carried out survey on languages spoken by local people and folk songs known by local community.
- Faculty and students of Department of Marathi are also collecting the scripts of local drama which are unpublished. These efforts will help to preserve undocumented literature of the local community.
- UG & PG students of Department of Geology have carried out project on soil sampling at Kasvi village. This project is beneficial for the farmers of the village to enhance soil quality of their farms and yield suitable crop.
- Department of Zoology carried out study of Migratory Birds from Waghala village.

Research inputs contributing to new initiatives and social development:

- On the basis of socio-economic survey done, a rural & tribal village named Kasvi is adopted by the college for five years. Various activities have been organized for the development of this village through the support of Government agencies, civilians, students, staff, private firms and NGOs.
- Some of the faculty members provide consultancy services on the topics like Tussar Silk, Income Tax, Floral Survey & Identification of Tree Species, Water & Soil Sampling, Detection of Ground Water Table, Mining Research, Proof Reading, Editing & Drafting, etc. All these services help for the betterment of the society.
- Outcomes of Minor & Major Research Projects carried out by the faculties will also contribute to new initiatives in respective fields and intern will contribute to social development.



3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

- The college always tries to develop institute industry linkage to bridge the gap between academic institutes and industries.
- To establish institute-industry interface, a committee of some of the faculty member viz. Dr. C.P. Dorlikar, Prof. S.B. Gedam, Prof. J.N. Papadkar was constituted. They visited nearby industries and interact with the industry personnel. A report was prepared by this committee.
- MOUs are signed & linkages are developed with Sanjivani Pathology Laboratory, Sub-District Rural Hospital Armori, and nearby industries like A.A. Energies Desaiganj, Ramdeobaba Solvent Ltd. Bramhapuri, etc. are signed by the college for establishing institute-industry interface.
- Students & teachers can get their expertise and use facilities available in their research laboratories for research.
- UG & PG students get hands-on training in these industries.
- National seminar forms a common platform for interaction among faculty, students and research scholars with experts/ industry persons resulting in research & development.
- Regarding MOU, periodic visit to industries arranged by the college.
- Field visits of the students are arranged for industry-institute interaction.
- The placement cell of the college initiates the interface talk with the industries as well as training institutes oriented towards the technical skills set and soft skill improvements of the students so as to improve their employability skill.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

- The institution encourages the faculty members to carry out the consultancy services with well-developed infrastructure available on the campus for the benefit of the society to fulfill our vision.
- The expertise available on the campus is publicized through the institutional website and display boards on the campus.
- Department of Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Geology, Commerce and Marathi offers consultancy services on paid as well as free of cost basis.
- The responsibility of payment of any taxes (income/service etc.) shall rest entirely with the person/s working as consultant.
- The permission shall be granted subject to the condition that the work as consultant shall in no way affect the work at the college.
- The report of consultancy work carried out is prepared and submitted to the corresponding agency. However, the college does not formally advocate or publicize this.

• The Principal of the college regularly conducts meeting with the faculty encouraging and guiding them to utilize their expertise for the benefit of society by rendering consultancy services.

- The college sanctions duty leave to carry out consultancy work.

- Granting permission to the faculty to receive remuneration for the service that they render in consultancy.
- The college recognizes and acknowledges the staff for their consultancy works in Staff Council meeting.

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

Most of the faculty members render their consultancy services on honorary basis. Therefore, revenue generated through consultancy is very small. Whatever revenue generated through consultancy work it is given to the corresponding faculty. If large amount of revenue generates then 70% of revenue will be given to concerned expert and remaining revenue will be used for development of infrastructural facilities.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

- 3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?
 - The institution is always committed to holistic & integrated education that aims to make students intellectually sharp, social responsible, culturally creative and

- physically strong. Institution involves faculty and students in community services. In the following manner the college promotes institution-neighborhood-community network and student engagement:
- We have a contingent of 200 NSS volunteers. It organizes seven days residential camp at nearby villages and adopted village KASVI. All NSS/Extension activities are done in collaboration with the villagers where such camps/activities are held. Villagers give logistic support to programmes/camps and they even host a dinner on the final day of the NSS camp in honour of the campers/institution. They also volunteer to do manual work in the camp. In holding these programmes our students are in the forefront; with teachers giving logistic support, giving students the responsibility of conducting surveys/programmes. It gives students a chance to cultivate leadership and culture solidarity with the villagers and sensitivity to their needs.
- The institution has adopted a rural & tribal village KASVI. Development of the village is planned to done over five years (2015 - 2019) by the participation of students, staff, alumni association, government agencies, private firms, civilians and NGOs. NSS special residential camps have been organized regularly in this village. It has facilitated roads and sanitation. Various activities through NSS camps like blood testing & blood donation, development work, etc. Socio-economic survey, computer literacy, PBR, soil & water testing, awareness activities, health checkup camp, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, guiding about animal care, tree plantation, road safety activities, women empowerment workshop, evil effects of liquor, tobacco and other psychotropic substances upon the general health of the society, etc. are organized for the development of the village. In such programmes, guest speakers are invited from outside to impact the villagers. Students' participation in these activities is ensured.
- Department of Sociology organized one day camp at Deulgaon, Injewari and Dongarsawangi in 2013. Various social awareness activities like save girl child, awareness against dowry, eradication of superstition, women empowerment, etc. were conducted through cultural programmes and expert talks.
- The college has started documentation of folk knowledge & wisdom through People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) with the help of villagers. Second year UG students participate in this activity collecting biodiversity information, water resources information, etc. from nearby villages and jungle.
- The Department of Marathi carried out study of local languages spoken by the people of this area.
- Faculties of Department of Marathi interact with people and carry out work of collection of folk songs sung by the local people of this area. Also made the collection of local (ZADIPATTI) drama script which are written by the local artists but are not formally published.
- Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Center and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Study & Research Center organize various extension programmes.
- Social activities like blood donation camp, health checkup camp, hematological testing camp, tree plantation and cleanliness drive are organized by the students with the help of Sub-District Rural Hospital, Forest Department, Police Station and Nagar Panchyat, Armori.

- Conducted survey on alcohol consumption in Gadchiroli district and expenditure on it by NSS in association with Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and SEARCH (NGO), Chatgaon, Dist. Gadchiroli during 2nd & 3rd Feb., 2015 and 27th to 29th March, 2015.
- Workshop on 'Empowerment of Girls (EOG)' in association with Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and *Bhartiya Jain Sanghatan* (BJS), Pune during 30th Jan., to 1st Feb., 2015.
- Screening of motivational movies at rural area.
- Essay Competition on the topic 'Role of Students for Social Harmony' on the eve of Social Harmony week on 14th Sept., 2013.
- Organized Cyber Crime Programme in collaboration with Police Station, Armori on 13th Oct. 2015.
- Organized an awareness rally on Lok Mahiti Abhiyan on 27th Jan., 2016 with the help of Tehsil Office, Armori.
- Organized rally to create voting awareness among citizens in association with Tehsil Office on 25th Jan., 2014.
- The college organizes Sadbhavana Daud (Cross Country Running Competition) every year with the help of Police Station Armori and Sub-District Rural Hospital, Armori.
- The institution also plans and organizes its extension and outreach programmes like environment awareness by conducting programmes like Ozone Day, Geography Day, AIDS awareness, elocution & debate competition, poster competition on various social issues, Human Rights awareness, etc. through various portfolios of the institution.
- University level Skit Competition was organized in 2012-2013 & 2015-2016 in collaboration with Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.
- Student help group has been constituted to help police leads to good citizenship.
- Students are encouraged to participate in university/ state/ national level NSS camps.
- Two students were sent for Republic Day Parade at Mumbai in 2015.
- Important days like Gandhi Jayanti, Gandhi Punyatithi, Dr. Ambedkar Jayanti, Sarva Sant Smruti Din (Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj death anniversary), Shivaji Jayanti, Independence Day, Republic Day, Women's Day, etc. are celebrated.
- Expert persons from different walk of the life are invited to deliver talk on social issues on the eve of Gandhi Jayanti and Dr. Ambedkar Jayanti.
- Dr. L.H. Khalsa is working on District Consumer Forum nominated by State Government.
- Prof. K.D. Hajare is additionally deputed as Nodal Officer for voter's enrollment.
- Organized voter's awareness campaign.
- Organizes rallies on some current burning issues.
- The college regularly organizes various activities under Road Safety campaign.

All these energetic programmes not only give students a platform to imbibe sterling qualities like selfless service and sense of responsibility towards community development, but also create a sense of awareness among rural people. These activities contribute to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The college strives to infuse civic responsibility in the young minds of students through various extension & outreach programmes so that they develop into sensitized, socially responsible citizen. Following mechanism is adopted by the college to track students' involvement in various social activities.

- Students are encouraged to participate in NSS, Adult Education, Women Empowerment Programmes and various extension activities.
- Through the effective functioning of NSS, Women Development Cell, Cultural Department, Adult Education, Environmental Study Committee, Science Association the Institution attempts to track students' involvement in various social movements.
- Incentive marks, rewards, felicitation of students participated and excelled in these activities.
- Students' attendance is compulsory at celebration of important days like Independence Day, Republic Day, etc.
- NSS volunteers maintain a diary in which they make entries of the work done.
- At the end of each academic year every portfolio committee/ department submits a report of the activities performed throughout the year.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

- The college collects feedbacks from stakeholders on curricular, co-curricular and extension activities and analyzes it.
- The parent–teacher–student meetings are organized regularly to take feedback of these stakeholders. The parents and students can directly put forth suggestions, complaints and grievances to the head of the institution, which are very well taken care of while implementing any new policy or reform.
- Alumni Association organizes meetings and has regular formal interaction wherein any alumnus is free to give their suggestions.
- Feedbacks also received orally while informal meeting with stakeholders and through e-mails.
- Feedback gives information about the overall performance and quality of the institution alongwith the activities undertaken by the college are useful or not.
- This has helped in planning and reorganizing the activities from time to time.
- Regular meetings with staff and HODs are conducted in order to keep every member updated about changes and developments in the college.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

- At the beginning of each academic year, portfolio of important committees/departments is prepared.
- A meeting of head of these portfolio committees, head of the departments, IQAC is held with the Principal to plan various co-curricular, extension and outreach programmes to be organized throughout the year.

- Various extension and outreach programmes are then organized by these committees sticking to this plan.
- The college makes use of its resources alongwith the funds of the NSS unit for conducting such activities.
- The annual budget for extension activities is Rs. 150 x number of students admitted. The expenditure of all extension activities is made from this budget.

- The college has a very proactive NSS unit with a membership of 200 students. Various programmes and special camps are organized by NSS unit with the focus on instilling social sensitivity and leadership qualities amongst students. Summary of some of the major activities of NSS is as follow:
- a) NSS special camp at nearby villages and adopted village KASVI. Various development programmes are organized under this camp like constructing approach roads, sanitation holes, awareness against superstition, AIDS, cleanliness drive, sanitation and other social issues through cultural programmes & rallies.
- b) Cleanliness drive on college campus and Armori village on the eve of Gandhi Jayanti.
- c) Other various extension activities like Anti Naxal rally, AIDS awareness rally, Road Safety campaign, etc. are also conducted through NSS. Students are motivated to participate in NSS activities by giving Best NSS volunteer award.
- Remuneration to NSS officials.
- Provides TA & DA for participation in other NSS camps.
- Special prizes and awards are given to students for their outstanding contribution to extension programmes with certificate of participation and merit.

- departments/committees viz. Women Empowerment Cell. Employment Guidance Bureau, Adult Education, Environmental Study Committee, and Science Association organized gender sensitization programmes, employment related programme, awareness programmes, rallies and science related activities.
- All teachers are assigned by various responsibilities to organize these activities ensuring students participation.

- Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?
 - Environmental Study Committee conducts a project, People's Biodiversity Register (PBR), which is a noble and unique activity of the college. Groups of all second year undergraduate students carry out this project every year under the guidance of teachers. PBR is documentation of folk knowledge & wisdom. The study includes collection of traditional knowledge the civilians have about the biodiversity, information of surrounding water resources & its analysis, soil testing, socio-economic survey, etc.

The PBR project helps to preserve traditional knowledge available with folks and may be useful in commercialization of this knowledge empowering students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society.

- Socio-economic survey is carried out every year by the Department of Geography and Economics in nearby villages.
- A survey in nearby industries was carried out by a committee exploring educational & skill requirement in these industries. This survey helps to develop necessary skills among the students empowering underprivileged students.
- The college has organized three days workshop on 'Empowerment of Girls' to empower girl students and promote gender equality.
- Department of Chemistry has carried out survey on water & soil sampling in Armori, Kasvi and nearby villages. The information gathered will help society to retain their lives healthy.
- NSS department has conducted survey on "Alcohol consumption in Gadchiroli District and Expenditure on it" in association with Gondwana University, Gadchiroli and SEARCH (NGO), Chatgaon, Dist. Gadchiroli during 2nd & 3rd Feb., 2015 and 27th to 29th March, 2015. This survey helps government to take necessary action to prevent civilians from alcoholism.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

- Objectives & expected outcomes of the extension activities:
- Extension activities organized by the college are integral part of educational programme of the college. The objectives of extension activities are to inculcate moral values, sense of social responsibility, equality, social justice among the students, Holistic development, awareness for human rights, eradication of superstitions, promotion of national integration, skill development and environmental awareness. Students participating in extension activities work with civic society help to link classroom learning with outside real world.
- The extension programmes harnesses the youth power for the feeling of national cooperation and nation's building.
- They get a key to the advantages of team work with realization of self-respect and self-confidence. Equality, fraternity and freedom are inculcated.
- Leadership skills, time management, manage conflicts, effective communication skills (oral, written, report writing), effective decision making, organizational skills from planning to execution to evaluation and research skills are the things students learn while participating and organizing various projects and programmes.
- The first important aspect is that students learn to think beyond themselves.
- Students get a chance to interact with one another and learn about culture, tradition and values of people.

The college believes that for the effective implementation of its outreach and extension activities involvement of community is must. People's participation is ensured at all levels of planning, implementation and follow-up of our activities. Programmes are worked out keeping in mind people's needs, concerns and their availability.

- NSS camps are held at nearby villages and *Kasvi*. Before organizing NSS camp, NSS officers interact with villagers, *Sarpanch* and Head Master of the school where the camp is to be held for the smooth and effective implementation of the camp. The college seeks the voluntary contribution of the natives regarding various awareness programmes, works related to health and hygiene, construction of approach roads, etc.
- The college has adopted a rural & tribal village *Kasvi* for the development over the five years. Various schemes & programmes are planned to organize with the help of villagers, students, staff, government agencies, private industries and NGOs. The college conducts regular meetings with representatives of villagers, NGOs, staff and private industries for planning and effective implementation of development programmes. Villagers and other partners also respond well to the college and with their contribution all activities have been conducting successfully.
- Health check-up camp and hematological tests for the students & community are conducted every year with the help of Sub-District Rural Hospital, Armori.

- Cleanliness drive in Armori is also conducted every year on 2nd October (*Gandhi Jayanti*) with the help of Gram Panchayat, Armori.
- Every year, the college planted trees on campus and its periphery. For this college seeks contribution from forest department to provide plants. In 2013-2014 college planted Sandal trees with the assistance of Shri Vijay Thaware.
- Workshop on 'Empowerment of Girls' was organized with the help of *Bhartiya Jain Sanghathan* (BJS). Parents were also participated in this workshop.
- Rallies on Road Safety, Anti Naxal, AIDS, Voters Awareness, etc. are organized in association with Police Station and Tehsil Office, Armori.
- Professionals like doctors, lawyers, social activists and representatives of NGO share their experiential knowledge about community service through invited lectures and workshops with our students.

Student Placement:



3.7.6 Detail on the systemic efforts of the institution in planning, establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages/ collaborations.

- The college has made systemic efforts to develop linkages/ collaborations and taken initiatives to facilitate interaction with academicians/scientists and experts from industries.
- The Principal of the college conducted meetings with the faculties of departments to discuss and develop linkage with corresponding industries. Initially, a detailed survey in nearby industries was conducted. After thorough interaction with industry personnel MoUs have been signed. Groups of students were sent for hands-on training in these industries.
- Strong initiatives are taken to promote inter-disciplinary learning. National and International conferences are attended to provide a platform for healthy exchange of ideas, luminaries from across the nation.



CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure is centered at effective execution of academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular and research activities.

- Our college campus is situated on main road of Armori town having an area of 14892.43 Sq. mtr. (3.68 acres) and a built up area of 8050.66 Sq. mtr. The management has taken keen interest and efforts to create and enhance physical facilities to provide quality education to rural students.
- Master plan has been prepared for the campus.
- The college building comprises of IQAC room, administrative wing, classrooms, language lab, various departments, library.
- A separate infrastructure committee, building committee and planning board consisting of college teachers is formed. These committees are working under the guidance of the Principal.
- The college has received development grant from UGC under XI and XII five year plans. Management of the college is providing adequate fund for development of the infrastructure. The said fund is utilized as per the decision taken in the infrastructure and building committee meeting.
- The feedback of the stakeholders regarding their needs is also taken into consideration
 while deciding the policy. As per their suggestions and needs of teaching and learning,
 infrastructure is created.

4.1.2 Details of the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities –

The College has 8050.66 Sq. mtr. built up area of which 3407 Sq. mtr. has been added in last four years.

Classrooms:

The college has well furnished, well ventilated, sufficient 28 modular classrooms with spacious seating arrangement. Some of these classrooms have a podium and equipped with modern ICT gadgets like LCD Projector, white board, KYAN interactive boards, etc.

Technology enabled learning spaces:

- A dedicated UGC Network Resource Center is established in Library with high speed internet facility.
- The college has a well-established state of art English Language Laboratory with modern software for enhancing communication skill in English.
- A modern Computer Lab with upgraded computers, high speed internet facility, LCD Projector, printer, and scanner for technology enabled learning.
- The college has a partially automated central library with OPAC, Master Software CMS and Lib-man Digital database. Library is provided with high speed internet facility and subscription to INFLIBNET which has huge number of online journals, e-

- books and learning resources. Central library has a well-furnished Reading Room and reprographic facility.
- **Seminar Halls:** The College has 02 Seminar halls out of which 01 is equipped with modern ICT gadgets and Audio-Video devices. Apart from this the college has a spacious and well-furnished IQAC office which also be used for conducting meeting time to time.
- Laboratories: All science, English, Geography, Home Science and Home Economics departments have spacious, well-equipped and well-furnished laboratories. There are 12 laboratories which are supported by ICT facilities. Major equipments and facilities available in these laboratories are as follows:

- **Library Building:** it is situated on the first floor. It contains NRC, reading hall, staff reading hall, Librarian Cabin and Book stacks.
- Vermicompost Unit: Zoology Department maintains Vermicompost Unit.
- Botanical Garden: The College has Botanical garden with various plant species. The
 college has constituted a Campus Beautification Committee which takes care of these
 plants.
- Animal House: Department of Zoology has Museum which contains rich collection of preserved animal specimens.
- Other Facilities: A new initiative by the staff and students of the Department of Botany resulted in starting of garden of medicinal plants. Every plant is properly identified and labeled giving their family, botanical and common names and medicinal uses. Also herbarium specimens are prepared as a permanent record for species occurring a particular time and place and providing basic biological materials for taxonomist, ecologists and other researchers.
- b) Extra-curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

The college has a rich culture of sports and extension activities. Various facilities are available to support these activities.

• **Sports:** The sport department arranges various sports competitions to motivate the students to opt sports as their career option. Sports kits for cricket, hockey, handball, volleyball, chess, etc. are available. The facilities available in the department of sports are as follows:

Indoor Sports: The college has a well-equipped huge indoor stadium with audio system to facilitate indoor games and sports activities like Badminton, Table-tennis, Chess, Carom, Yoga, Gymnasium and Taekwondo.

Outdoor Sports: A spacious area is earmarked for sports related activities in the campus. Following facilities are available:

- **Gymnasium:** The college has a well-equipped gymnasium with music system. The equipments available in gymnasium are as follows:
 - Eight station multi gym, adjustable bench, dumbbell stand, twister, incline and decline bench press, incline leg press, bar belt, abdominal board, weight plate, tread mill, etc. A qualified trainer is also available in gymnasium.

- Auditorium: Indoor stadium is also used as an auditorium to conduct various cocurricular and extra-curricular activities.
- NSS: NSS department has separate office room with all necessary equipments needed for carrying out manual labour, Kitchen utensils, green mats, etc. There is a separate store for NSS so that all the needed equipment can safely be stored in it. It is one of the famous NSS departments in the area with the accommodating capacity of 200 students.
- Cultural Activities & Public Speaking: The college has an active Cultural Committee. It conducts cultural activities successfully over the year. Cultural activities are conducted in auditorium, seminar hall as well as on open space of the college. Public Address System, LCD Projectors, Electric Generators, etc. are available for conducting cultural activities.
- Communication Skill Development: The college has a well furnished & well equipped Language Laboratory to develop communication skill in English. It has 10-Desktops with headphone & microphone, ETNL Language Lab Software.
- Yoga: The College organized Yoga camps every year in the campus. For this Yoga Guru Shri Chakinarpuwar was invited. Indoor Stadium is available for Yoga camp.
- **Health:** Department of Physical Education organizes health checkup camps every year for the students. Dr. Mrs. S.S. Supare & Dr. R.M. Kumbhare are invited for health checkup. Facilities available in Physical Education Department like weight balance, body mass index are used.
- Science Association of the college also conducts Heath checkup, Hematological Testing & Blood Donation camp every year. The facilities available in Department of Microbiology & Department of Zoology like TLC Blood Counter, Haemocytometer, Sphygmomanometer, Blood Testing kit, etc. are used. Three water coolers with water purifiers are installed on the campus to provide
 - purified healthy water.
- **Hygiene:** Compost vermiculture plant is constructed & successfully implemented on the campus to keep campus hygienic and waste free.

Dust bins are installed at various places on the campus to maintain campus hygienic. The area and quantity of available infrastructure is as follows:

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee is constituted in the college which looks after the maintenance/ upgradation of available infrastructure and need of new infrastructure to maintain it in line with academic growth. Principal of the college interacts with heads of the departments to seek their departmental demands. Recommendations from feedback analysis are also considered for infrastructure development.

The Principal plans and makes annual budget for maintenance and creation of infrastructure from the recommendations received form Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee & feedbacks.

- Playground and gymnasium made available from morning 5 am to 7 pm.
- The infrastructure facilities available at various departments are kept open for students and faculty during working hours and extended period of work.
- The college provides available infrastructure like classrooms to Government agencies for conducting various Government meetings, examinations, to house election booths during general elections, etc.
- It also provides Indoor Stadium and audio visual gadgets to District Education Department, police, revenue, and welfare departments to hold seminars, workshops and exhibitions. The same facility is extended to NGOs to hold programmes of general public interest.
- Yashvantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University Study Center (for its office, class rooms and library).
- Separate reading room facility is provided to students.
- After the regular classes, classroom and ICT gadgets are used for conducting Career Oriented Courses.

Planning for ensuring that the available infrastructure of the college is optimally utilized.

The college schedule is from 8.00 am. To 3.00 pm. The time table of the theory classes and practices is drawn in such a way that the classrooms and laboratories are made available to all the classes for effective teaching-learning process. The cocurricular activities and extra-curricular activities are conducted as per the schedule of yearly plan and health checkup camps are conducted on time.


The schedule of library and reading room is from 7.30 am to 3.30 pm. The students fully utilized the library facilities and the reading room is also kept open for students.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The college always ensures that the available infrastructure caters the need of differently abled students and their stay on campus becomes comfortable.

- Ramps are constructed to facilitate differently abled students.
- Classes of such students are shifted to the ground floor.
- During examination time seating arrangement of such students are made at the ground floor.
- Administrative office is also made available at the ground floor.
- 4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them: Hostel Facility, Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga centre, etc. Computer facility including access to internet in hostel, facilities for medical emergencies, Library facility in the hostels, Internet and Wi-Fi facility, Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments, Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy, constant supply of safe drinking water and Security.
 - The college has a modern hostel for girl students within the college campus. This ensures that the students have proximity to the academic facilities. It has five rooms for sleeping, a hall for recreation and a common study room with 18 girl students capacity.
 - Even after consistent efforts, girl students did not avail this facility due to family reason and social understanding.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

- The college has a health center. It is attended by the visiting doctors.
- Gymnasium on ground training for exercise and Yoga.
- Medical checkup for all students is conducted at the end of each semester.
- In case of serious medical emergency, help is provided by shifting the ward to the nearby hospital.
- Health awareness programmes and talks of experts are conducted regularly specially for girl students.
- Napkin vendor machine is installed on the campus.
- First aid box is kept in NSS department.

- Free hematological and health checkup camps are organizes regularly with the help of Sub District Rural Hospital, Armori.
- Students Life Insurance is available in the college.
- All the aided teaching and non-teaching staff members are covered under Maharashtra Government Medical Insurance Scheme and Group Life Insurance Scheme.
- Staff Welfare Fund is raised on regular basis to assist the staff member in emergency situation.
- College has taken group insurance for students and staff.
- Maternity and Paternity leave is provided as per Government & UGC regulations.

4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the Campus Spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

• IQAC:

A separate well-furnished office for IQAC is available of 11.5 x 20.5 feet in dimension. The basic furniture available in this office are cupboards, conference table, chairs and book shelf. ICT facilities include 02 computers with net connectivity, 02 Laptops, 01 colour printers, 01 LaserJet printer, scanner, 01 projector and an air cooler.

Women's Cell:

The college has Women Empowerment Cell with committee members Dr. Mrs. Vishakha Wanjari, Dr. Mrs. Amita Bannore and Mrs. Sima Nagdeve. A well furnished office is situated at Marathi Department with computer and internet facility.

Counselling and Career Guidance:

The college has a well functioning Employment Guidance Bureau and Placement Cell. A separate office with necessary facilities like LCD projector, Printer, cupboards, book shelf, computer, internet facility, etc. are provided to this cell.

• Canteen:

The college has a hygienic canteen with all necessary facilities for staff and students. College provides required infrastructure at nominal cost to the canteen owner. Canteen provides hygienic and fresh food at minimum cost to students and staff.

• Health Center:

The college has a health center located in NSS office. The institution arranges health services for staff and students through Public Health Center (Government Rural Hospital), which is a stone's throw away from the institution, where the services of doctors and nurses are available round the clock. For health checkup and treatment apart from the said hospital, the services of the private practising doctors (Dr R.N Kumbhare and Dr (Mrs) S.S Supare), who are in the neighbourhood of the institution, are also sought. First aid box, blood pressure measuring device is available in this center.

• Safe Drinking Water Facility:

The college always takes care of student's health. Three water coolers with RO water purifier are installed on the campus to provide safe drinking water to staff & students.

• Auditorium:

The college has a huge Indoor Stadium cum Auditorium with audio facility.

• Grievance Redressal Cell:

The grievance redressal unit does not have a separate room. The teacher's incharge of this unit use his spaces for this purpose.

• Girls Common Room:

Girls Common Room has dimension 8 ft. x 29 ft. having provision of toilet, bathroom and drinking water.

• NSS Room:

Separate NSS room is made available with all necessary instruments required.

• Recreational spaces:

Following recreational facilities are developed for staff and students:

- Gymnasium

On the campus:

- The college has well established UGC Network Resource Center in Library. Five computers with internet facility are available in it. Students and staff have access to this center.
- The college has a well furnished modern computer laboratory. It has 19 upgraded computers, mounted LCD projector, a printer and a scanner. These computers are provided with high speed 4G internet facility provided by Reliance Jio. After practical hours, students and staff can use these computers.
- English Language Laboratory has 09 computers with internet facility.
- All departments including Research Centers are provided with computers, BSNL Broad band/ Reliance Jio internet facility.

Off-campus:

• Laptops/ internet dongle purchased under Minor/ Major Research Projects are allowed to use by the corresponding faculty off the campus also.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

- The college has well established mechanism to plan and develop IT infrastructure on the campus. The college has Planning & Development Committee which looks into enhancing and developing facilities on the campus.
- For the better understanding of the subject and to enhance the knowledge of students and to boost research activities, IT infrastructure is planned to upgrade and deploy.
- Principal seeks the requirement/ upgradation of computers from the heads of the departments, Librarian & administrative staff and purchase/ upgrade the computers in line with their needs. Feedbacks from students and staff are also considered.

- Library Advisory Committee instructs Librarian to purchase more educational CDs/ DVDs.
- Infrastructure committee recommends the development of ICT enabled classrooms. Most of the classrooms have ICT Gadgets like LCD Projector installed in them. Remaining classrooms are planned to enable with ICT facility very soon.
- Upgrade IT infrastructure of the Dept. of Computer Science.
- To provide every teacher with basic computing facility and internet.
- All PG departments and research centers are provided high speed 4G Reliance internet.

- The college plan and develop/ upgrade ICT facility on the campus every year to facilitate extensive use of ICT resources by the staff and students.
- The college has developed most of the classrooms with ICT facility. LCD Projectors, Visualizer, Laptops, KYAN interactive computer with inbuilt projector, scanner, portable public address system, video recorder, etc. are also available as central facility.
- A seminar hall with audio and ICT facility is available on the campus.
- Every department is provided with computer having high speed internet connectivity.
- Computer laboratory has 19 computers with 4G Reliance Jio internet facility. Staff and students can use this facility after theory and practical hours for accessing e–resources and developing computer aided teaching/ learning materials.
- Well functioning Network Resource Center is established in library to access e-resources by the faculty and students and encouraging students for independent learning.
- Wi-Fi internet facility is provided on campus through Reliance Jio 4G internet service.
- Teaching/ Learning related audio-video CDs and DVDs are available in the library.
- Principal of the college encourages the faculty members at staff council meetings to develop and use Power Point Presentations of teaching material and teaching notes are provided to the students. Faculty members are also encouraged to access e-resources available on internet and show learning videos, simulations to the students. As a result every faculty member use Power Point Presentation for teaching.

- The college conducts training programme and provides technical hand to prepare computer aided teaching/ learning materials.
- Teaching—learning material prepared by the faculty and their teaching videos are uploaded on college website which is accessible to all students.
- Students are also encouraged by faculty to deliver seminars using Power Point Presentation. Faculty helps students for preparing PPTs.
- PG students use ICT facility available on the campus for preparing their project report.
- Editing microscopic pictures and observation of slides through microscope and computer.
- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching —learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

The college provides various ICT facilities to encourage staff and students to use computer aided materials in teaching—learning process. This helps students to get better understanding of the subject and promote them for independent learning.

- Teachers are oriented for preparing multimedia presentations and guided to make the presentations effective and learner oriented.
- Teachers have prepared teaching notes in the form of e-resources and power point presentations. These e-resources are available for students on college website.
- Students' seminars are organized on every Saturday. Students are encouraged to prepare power point presentation for their seminar.
- Teachers help students in accessing on-line teaching—learning resources and preparing power point presentations. This has put teachers in the role of a facilitator and students at the center of teaching-learning process.
- UGC Network Resource Center motivates the students to refer e-journals, e-books and other online study materials available on internet.
- Language Laboratory is used for improving English communication skills.

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4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- For maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment, the college submits proposal seeking financial assistance to UGC and other funding agencies under various schemes. Management Body also contributes to this.
- Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee has been constituted which looks into the requirement of equipment, furniture and infrastructure. It also monitors the maintenance of these facilities and report accordingly to the Principal.
- Head of the Department and Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee periodically make checking of instruments in their respective laboratories.
- The college makes plan and budgetary allocations for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure and various facilities as per the requirements and presented to Local Management Committee. The committee scrutinizes the budget and gives an approval after satisfactory explanations.
- After approval of budget, contracts are given to agencies for the construction/maintenance of infrastructure.
- The college invites quotations from equipment suppliers and purchases the equipment from suppliers who provide quality equipment at minimum cost.
- The college hires the experts from respective fields for the maintenance of infrastructure and equipment from time to time.
- The college has constituted committees like Campus Beautification Committee, Washroom and Girls Common Room Maintenance Inspection Committee and Cleanliness & Maintenance of Campus Committee to maintain cleanliness on campus. The college has appointed two personnel for maintaining cleanliness on campus and in washrooms.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

Equipments/ instruments in the college are well maintained and standard operating methods are followed whenever used.

In the beginning of each academic session, each department carries out precision measures for the equipment depending upon the requirement. The college takes up calibration and other precision measures for the equipments/ instruments whenever need arises. For this purpose, college gets the service of experts from the manufacturer of equipments/ instruments and service providers. The general instruments are calibrated by our experienced staff members as and when need arises, by going through manuals provided with new instruments.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- Placed Main Circuit Breaker (MCB) and Earth Leakage Circuit Breaker (ELCB) at prominent power supply units.
- Provided separate electricity connections for each buildings.
- Two electricity generators, one with 35 KVA and other 3 KVA, exist for providing uninterrupted power supply.

- Two inverters, one at Administrative office and other at Library, for constant power supply to computers and other necessary equipments.
- The college has two boar wells supplied with two water pumps for constant water supply.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for? Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

- Students from economically weaker sections are identified during the admission process. Such students are provided financial assistance at the time of admission.
- The college strictly follows the reservation policy of Government of Maharashtra & Gondwana University in the admission process to all Programmes as follow: SC 15 %, ST 7.5 %, OBC 19 %, SBC 2 %, NT / VJ 11 %, Women 33 %.
- Coaching classes for entry into the service, NET/ SET, Civil Services are conducted for these students.
- These students are given freeships/ scholarships as per State Government regulations.
- 33 students received scholarship under Central Scholarship Scheme whereas 08 students received scholarship under Minority Scholarship Scheme.
- The college conducts Career Oriented Programmes to develop skill among them.
- The college conducts remedial classes for such students.
- Career guidance programmes are organized.
- Book Bank facility is provided by the library to economically weaker students.
- Most of the students are from rural and tribal area belonging to economically weaker sections. To bring equality among the students, the college introduced dress code for students.
- The college trains the students under career oriented skill development programme and then these students are given opportunity to earn while learn by selling goods/articles in college campus every Wednessday.

Students with Physical Disabilities:

- We follow the government directives that reserves 3 % seats to such students.
- The college makes their stay in the campus comfortable by shifting their classes to the ground floor.
- Physically challenged persons are provided a number of textbooks required for complete academic year under special scheme.
- Ramps are constructed to support physically challenged students.
- Extra time is given to such students during examination and their seating arrangement is made at the ground floor.

The institution motivates the other fellow students to take care of differently abled students in their campus life.

Overseas Students:

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.:

- The college has established Health Center. The services of the private practising doctors (Dr. R.N. Kumbhare and Dr. Mrs. S.S. Supare) and Sub District Rural Hospital are also sought, whenever needed. The Department of Physical Education organizes health checkup camps every year for the students. Dr. Mrs. S.S. Supare & Dr. R.N. Kumbhare are invited for health checkup.
- Under student welfare scheme, health insurance of Rs. 20,000/- has been provided to students.
- Hematological testing & health checkup camps are organized every year with the assistance of Sub District Rural Hospital, Armori.
- Conducts health awareness programmes particularly for girl students.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

• The college has well established Employment & Guidance Bureau. It regularly conducts coaching classes for competitive exams like MPSC, UPSC, Staff Selection, NET/ SET, etc. In-house faculty and experts from other institutions engage sessions during this programme.

- Library has a large number of books for competitive examinations and a well furnished reading room. Ex-students can also become member to avail this facility by paying Rs. 100 annually.
- Apart from this, expert talks are also organized to guide students for competitive examinations. For details refer to point no. 2.3.7.
- Conducts a competitive exam *SPARDHARATNA* every year to motivate students to take up competitive exam.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.):

The college gives special emphasis on skill development of students. It runs following career oriented courses to develop skill.

- Certificate course in Spoken English Special classes are taken for communication skills taking into consideration the rural background of the students. Language Lab is created for developing communication skills in English.
- Certificate course in Herbal Medicine It deals with the study of medicinal plants and making of herbal medicine from these plants. It is knowledge sharing and knowledge mobilization related to medicinal plants.
- Certificate course in Tribal Tourism The college is located in tribal and rural region surrounded by very deep forest unaffected by the human activities. There is a lot of scope for tourism in this area. The course will help the students for self-employment.
- Certificate course in Maintenance of Domestic Home Appliances This course enables students to maintain electric home appliances and enable them for self-employment.
- Certificate Course in Office Automation This course creates computer literacy among the students.
- Certificate/ Diploma/ Advanced Diploma Course in Dress Designing under Community
 College To enable our students for self-employment and to enhance the potential for
 employment, the college has started a course in Dress Designing under Community
 College.
- Apart from this, the college also conducts *Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme* and *Enhancement of Employability Programme* by Commerce Department.
- The college has signed MOUs to establish Industry-Institute interaction with nearby industries like A.A. Industries, Ramdeobaba Solvent Industries, etc. which provides a platform for the students and industry experts to interact and share experiences.

Support for Entry-level students and Slow Learners:

- Teachers take initial classes at the beginning of the session towards further assessing and bridging the knowledge gap of the enrolled students by taking classes on the basics of the subject.
- The college has got the provision of well-structured UGC Sponsored Remedial Coaching Center for slow learners.
- Meritorious students are encouraged to help the slow learners.
- Teachers provide simplified notes, e-resources, teaching videos and recommended simplified version of books to slow learners or/and below average students.
- Students with inadequate language skills are asked to join Spoken English programme.

- To give hands on experience, industrial linkages are developed and industrial visits, study tours, field visits, etc. are organized.
- Special attention is given to the needy and deserving students by the individual teachers.
- There is a provision for tutorials in compulsory languages and some science subjects to help them cope with the difficulties.
- The progress is monitored through unit tests, home assignments, etc.

Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/ corporate/business houses etc.:

- The college has developed Industry-Institution linkage.
- Industry visits and hands on training are organized.
- Departments in college arrange study tours to various higher study centers, institutions, business houses, etc.

Publication of students' magazine:

- The college annually publishes students' magazine SHABDASHILP to encourage budding writers & poets.
- Students contribute to this magazine in terms of articles, stories, poems, etc. It also includes the information about successful alumni.
- Copies of magazine are distributed among the students.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The college has started a noble activity Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme. Under this activity students sell goods on college campus every Wednessday under the guidance of teachers. This gives hands on experience about the business to the students.

- Placement Cell invites entrepreneurs and alumni, who share their own experiences, interact with the students and motivate to be a successful entrepreneur. Career counselling programmes are also conducted.
- Recently, the college has established Industry-Institute interaction by signing MOUs with nearby industries like A.A. Industries, Ramdeobaba Solvent Industries, which provide a platform for students and industry experts to interact and share experiences.
- A Workshop on Retail Training was organized by the Department of Computer Science in December 2013.
- Expert talk of Mr. Krishna S. Bahadure, Manager, Bank of Maharashtra on *Prime Minister Mudra Yojana* was organized on 10/02/2016.
- These activities equip the students with the vocational skills that are helpful in setting up their own small entrepreneurships or working in small units.
- 5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution that promote participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, quiz competitions, debates and discussions, cultural activities etc.-additional academic support, flexibility in examinations, special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials, any other.

The college gives an emphasis on the overall development of students. Participation in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities contribute to overall development. To fulfill this, college adopted following strategies:

Additional Academic Support:

- The college promotes participation in sports through flexibility & priority in admission, fee concessions are given to outstanding sports persons and attendance concession. Special admission quota for such students.
- Special classes are taken to the students who participate in State, National and All India University matches round the year.

Flexibility in Examinations:

- The teachers encourage these students and see that they complete their term work/ academic assignments.
- Re-internal examinations are also conducted for these students.

Special Dietary Requirements:

- Director of Physical Education guides students about the diet they should take.
- They are also given healthy breakfast after practice before competitions.
- Travel and daily allowances are provided to students for their participation in intercollegiate, university, national and international tournaments/ competitions.

Sports Uniform and Materials:

- Sports kits are provided to the students participating in various sports events.
- During practice all required playing equipments are provided to the students.
- Enhance infrastructure for sports such as playground, volleyball court, sports kits, etc.

Other:

• The college has constructed Indoor Stadium cum Auditorium to facilitate extracurricular and co-curricular activities.

- Constitutes different committees and conducts activities such as health checkup, hematological tests, tree plantation, blood donation, cleanliness drive, road safety campaign, women empowerment programmes, cultural activities, awareness rallies, sports events, etc. to promote participation of students in extra-curricular & cocurricular activities.
- Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars, workshops, etc.
- The department trains the sports persons throughout the year to achieve desired levels of excellence.
- Students participating in quiz competitions, debate, cultural activities and other competitions are provided support and guidance by teachers.
- Director of Physical Education guides students about the diet they should take. They are also given healthy breakfast after practice before competitions.
- Outstanding students in sports and games are honored.
- The college also arranges coaches from different training centers to train the students and are paid honorarium.
- Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing 5.1.7 for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE / TOEFL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defence, Civil Services, etc.
 - Employment and Guidance Bureau conducts coaching classes for the preparation of competitive examinations like MPSC, UPSC, SSC, etc. Also classes were organized for preparation of NET/SET Examinations.
 - Expert's talk on preparing competitive examinations are organized (for details refer to point no. 2.3.7).
 - Faculty also provides information about various competitive exams in their classes.
 - Displays advertisement/ information related to competitive exams on notice board in library.
 - Library has a large number of books of competitive exams. These books are made available to the regular students as well as alumni of the college.
 - The college conducts a competitive exam SPARDHARATNA to motivate and prepare students for competitive exams.
 - Students are given free training to join the state police services.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

Academic & Career Counseling:

- Well-structured Remedial Coaching Classes are organized by the various departments. Some of the subjects have tutorials in which the academic difficulties are simplified.
- During admission process faculty members visit the students and their parents from nearby villages for the admission counseling. They provide academic advice right from the choice of the subjects to the various scholarships available.
- Employment & Guidance Bureau of the college provides academic and career counseling to the students. This cell helps students to chalk out their academic as well as career roadmap through various programmes.
- The college arranges motivational lectures of experts for students to take up preparation of competitive exams.

Personal and Psycho-Social Support:

- Care Taker Committee: A care taker committee is constituted to look after the problems facing by the outstation students.
- Admission Committee members also provide personal counseling solving their problems. Financially weaker students are provided financial support by the faculty and fee waive by the institution at the time of admission.
- The college has the cells like Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, well-functioning Women Development Cell, etc. These cells provide help to sort out the students' problems.
- A complaint box has been installed in the campus. The grievances or suggestions of the students are then taken up at the appropriate level and addressed accordingly.
- The Principal's address during the various occasions provides glimpses of distinctive characteristics of the college, infrastructure/facilities available, glorious traditions of the college and eminent alumni. During the academic year, academic and personal guidance is provided by the faculty members and the heads of the various departments.
- Faculty members mentor the students to get admission in Government Hostels.
- Free medical checkup camp by the expert Doctors.
- Motivating & psychological support talks organized for the girls students.
- Motivating parents of the girl students allow them to participate them in various activities.
- Providing financial assistance to the poor, needy bright students in academic/sports.

- Students' placement for teaching posts are done in the institutions belongs to our parent society.
- A mock/ practice competitive examination called *SPARDHARATNA* is conducted every year for testing general aptitude as well as technical aspects of students.
- The recently established Industry-Institute linkage has created a platform for sharing industrial experiences and needs.

a) Government Scholarships & Freeships:

Government of India provides scholarship to students belonging to SC, ST, NT, OBC, and Physically Disabled categories. Students whose parent's annual income exceeds Rs. 1,00,000.00 are offered freeships. For minorities 6,00,000. The college assists students to get such scholarships & freeships.

b) Earn and Learn Scheme:

The college has started noble activity *Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme*. Group of students sell daily needed goods on the campus every Wednessday earning some money.

c) Student Aid Fund:

The College collects Rs. 30 /- per students (as per university guidelines). A needy, economically backward student is provided with this fund.

d) Book Bank Facility:

Library issues text books to the needy and deserving students for the complete academic session under book bank facility.

e) Student Insurance:

An insurance scheme against accidents is run in the college. The insurance of Rs. 20,000/- is for one year and is renewed every year.

f) Women's Hostel:

Late Vastalabai Wanmali women's hostel provides modern amenities and healthy living condition. Total number of seats are 12. Preference is given to the students coming from far off places.

g) Internet Facility:

The college provides high speed Wi Fi internet facility to the students free of cost. The college has Network Resource Center to facilitate students.

h) Student Counseling & Support:

Employment & Guidance bureau of the college provides academic and career counseling to the students. This cell helps students to chalk out their academic as well

as career roadmap through various programmes. Teachers help the students to solve their personal and academic problems. The cell also conducts coaching classes for competitive exams.

The college arranges motivational lectures of experts for the students to take up preparation for competitive exams.

Women Empowerment Committee works towards welfare of the girl students.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate students progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The college always encourages its students to pursue higher education and makes every effort to progress students towards employment. The college facilitates the students to higher education and employment in following ways:

- The college has started 8 Masters Programmes in Mathematics, Chemistry, Geology, Zoology, Marathi, Economics, History and Sociology and 4 authorized Centers for Higher Learning & Research in Mathematics, Marathi, History and Sociology to provide higher education and research facilities to students.
- Guest lectures of eminent academicians/ experts in the field are arranged so that students get a chance to interact with them and get inspiration to pursue higher education.
- Besides regular classes, teachers interact with their students and orient them about the scope of that subject and avenues available for students after degree programme.
- P.G. students are further guided to pursue Ph.D.
- The college provides fee concession to economically backward students, helping them to progress further.
- The college is having a study center of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. Here, at UG level B.A. & B.Com., whereas at PG level M.A. Marathi & M.A. English programmes are offered.
- Organized national level seminars, conferences and workshops. Eminent academicians/ scientists were invited for these events. Students get a chance to closely see and interact with these personalities. This can also serve as a guiding light for students to pursue higher education in their field.
- Successful alumni of the college share their own experiences and guide the students how to be successful.
- Organized field visits and study tours. This helps the students to understand practical application of their subject and help them to progress further.
- The college has established linkages with nearby industries. Personnel from industries interact with the students giving hands on training. This enhances their potential for employment.
- Remedial classes are organized for weaker students which help them to complete their Degree course and progress for higher education.
- The college has active Employment & Guidance Bureau. It organizes career counseling programmes, personality development programmes, interview technique programme, coaching classes for competitive exams like MPSC, UPSC, SSC,

Banking, NET, SET, etc., model competitive exam *SPARDHARATNA*, etc. to progress students towards employment.

- Placement Cell conducts placement camps, helping students to get employment.
- Started career oriented programmes to develop skills and motivate for selfemployment.
- Started skill based initiative Certificate/ Diploma/ Advance Diploma course in Dress Designing under Community College.
- A noble activity named *Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme* is started to encourage the students for self-employment.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to the students who are at risk of failure and drop out.

The college has taken a number of measures to provide support to students who are at risk of failure and drop out.

- To those who are very poor, we give financial assistance. This is in addition to the government financial assistance they receive.
- We give other assistance such as study material free of cost under Book Bank Scheme and hostel facility for girl students.
- We give information about placement to students to encourage them to pursue the course.
- Our lady teachers interact with female students and try to solve their problems, particularly of married students who are likely to shift their residence.
- Teachers counsel students in academic and personal matters and try to make them see reason.
- To slow learners we give remedial teaching. Those who find it really hard to make it we suggest a change of course.
- Tutorial classes in some subjects and revision help such students to stay in the course.
- Parent-teacher-student meets are organized to discuss problems students are facing and problems are solved through mutual discussion.
- The Department of English helps students to overcome the fear of foreign language through their Spoken English classes.
- Conducts unit tests/ class tests so as to familiarize the students with the pattern and type of questions ask in University examination.
- Paper sets and paper solutions of University previous examinations are prepared and kept in the library for the accession of such students.

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

- The college has a feedback committee. This committee has made a written format of the feedback with the help of IQAC. This committee collects written feedback on every aspect of the college from the students at the end of every academic year. Library also takes feedback on library services from the students.
- A committee of the college visits perspective employers and takes feedback from them about their requirements for employment.
- Oral feedback is taken from the students through informal interaction of the Principal with the students.

- Feedback is also used to improve upon weaknesses and build upon its strengths.
- Industry–Institution linkage has been developed from such feedback taken from employers.
- Some career oriented courses are also started from the suggestions obtained from feedback.
- One day workshop on Role of Youth in Agriculture is organized by the college from the feedback received from one of the parents.
- 5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.
 - The college publishes a magazine named *SHABDASHILP* every year. It is comprising of different languages viz. Marathi, Hindi and English. Students are informed and encouraged to contribute their material like articles, stories, poems, etc. to this magazine.

• The institution has a presentation board meant for budding writers in the library. Selected items are displayed on the board for their satisfaction. It is known as *Sahitya Yatri*.

This gives them an opportunity to enhance their creativity and writing skills.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Students Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the institution has a student council constituted as per the university regulations/state government Universities Act 1994 Section 40 (2b). Every year selection of this body is done at the beginning of the academic year as per the norms set up by the said Act.

The composition of Students Council is as follow:

Principal, Student Welfare Officer, NSS Programme Officer, Cultural Department head, one student from each class with academic merit at the examinations held in the preceding year and engaged in fulltime studies in the college (nominated by the Principal), Director of Sports and Physical Education, one student each (nominated by the Principal) showing outstanding performance in Sports, NSS, Adult Education and Cultural Activity, two female students nominated by the Principal (SC/ST/NT/DT-NT/OBC).

Activities of the students council:

- Conveys the grievances of students to the Principal.
- Organizes sports/cultural meet every year.
- Gives suggestions regarding the development of the institution.
- Reports to the principal/disciplinary committee of any untoward incident in the campus.
- Organize the celebration of Teachers Day.
- They are the part of the quality circle and IQAC to plan various quality enhancement and quality sustenance programmes of the institution.

5.3.6 Give details of the various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

• Students Council:

The college Students Council is the representative of the students that helps in smooth running of the college and is involved in many activities ranging from organizing functions, maintaining cleanliness and listening to the problems of the students and resolving it with the help of the Principal.

• IQAC:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell is a very important and active cell which looks, suggests developmental activities and monitors the quality of available facilities in the college. Two students have representation in IQAC.

• All Departmental Associations:

Various departmental activities like students' seminars, field visits, etc. are conducted through departmental associations.

Annual Sports & Cultural Meet Organizing Committee:

YUVARANG - Sports and Cultural Meet is conducted every year. A committee is constituted before this event to plan and successfully implement this event. This committee contains students representatives.

Anti-Ragging Committee:

The committee helps to prevent ragging on the campus and resolves grievances related to ragging. Students representatives are taken on this committee.

- Tribal Tourism, Dress Designing courses (Community College) are started to uplift economic and social status of students, they are empowered by self-reliance through skill development and personality development. The college conducts career oriented programmes, coaching classes for competitive exams, career counseling programmes, entrepreneurship skill development programme, and extra-curricular activities enabling them to face modern world challenges.
- These students are made responsible citizens so as to enable them to play a vital role in the progress and development of the nation. The college has adapted a rural, backward and tribal village and conducts various developmental programmes through the partnership with staff, students, government agencies and civilians. The college promotes empowerment of girls by conducting empowerment activities. It also conducts number of extension programmes which imbibe the spirit of nationalism and commitment to community.
- To address the issues of climatic change on global context, the college conducts awareness programmes, tree plantation, etc. To make proper documentation of traditional and folk wisdom about biodiversity, the college has started a noble activity as People's Biodiversity Register (PBR).
- Character is the symbol of responsible citizens. The college strives to build the character of its students by infusing them with philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar by conducting activities through respective centers.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

- The college Executive Governing Body is a group of 21 members with Shri. Murlidhar Wanmali as its chairperson. They have regular working committee meetings with principal.
- It was the vision of the founder president late Wamanraoji Wanmali to make higher education accessible to the poor tribal youth. Taking inspiration from him the management and Principal prepares roadmap and guidelines for quality policy in order to create positive environment to maintain academic excellence.
- Local Managing Committee (LMC) consisting of representatives from management, teaching and non-teaching staff along with the Principal as ex-officio secretary is committed to effective governance. The LMC guides in planning, monitoring and evaluating mechanisms regarding administrative and academic processes as per Maharashtra Universities Act, 1994.
- Principal holds regular meetings with the staff to assess the situation and to inform the staff of the new directives/strategies and developments in the state /University/UGC policy on higher education.
- At the beginning of every academic year, a portfolio of different committees and their members is prepared.
- Principal and Planning & Development Committee prepares developmental & maintenance plan and annual budget and put in the LMC meeting for approval.

- Principal and IQAC conduct meeting with the heads of departments/different committees at the beginning of academic year to monitor, to brief them and to plan/discuss strategies or course of action on different curricular and co-curricular activities in the college.
- Principal involves the staff in the workings of the institution by entrusting them with various responsibilities such as the general discipline of the college, admission, starting of new courses, maintenance/ development of infrastructure, IQAC, Women Development Committee, etc.
- Head and members of the different committees organizes the programmes/ activities as per the plan prepared in concern with the Principal.
- Two faculty incharge and Vice-Principal monitors class daily as well as maintains discipline on the campus.
- IQAC provides facilitative and participative voluntary system for the sustenance of quality and enhancement measures. The Principal is chairman of IQAC and one of the faculty member is co-ordinator of IQAC and plays a significant role in ensuring proper communication and networking with the stakeholders. IQAC also provides Academic & Co-curricular Diary to every faculty member to plan and implement academic and co-curricular activities. These diaries are regularly assessed by IQAC.
- At the end of every academic year, every department/ portfolio committee submits their Annual Departmental/ Committee Activity Report to IQAC.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring

The policy statement and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission.

The management, Principal, LMC and IQAC prepares policy statement and action plans to fulfill the stated mission. Feedbacks from stakeholders are considered while making policies. The Principal regularly interacts with teachers and students, considering their suggestions at the time of policy formulation. The leadership (management and Principal) also communicate and review policies/ action plan to stakeholders through periodic meetings.

At the beginning of each academic year, the Principal and IQAC prepares portfolio assigning different responsibilities to faculty members. The Principal and IQAC conducts meeting with heads of portfolio department to chalk out action plan of curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities to be conducted throughout the year to fulfill the stated mission.

• Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan.

The leadership prepared institutional strategic plan for the period 2012 – 2017. While preparing the strategic plan, feedback from stakeholders and suggestions of NAAC peer team for second cycle are considered.

The annual budget of the proceeding academic year is presented in the managing committee meeting together with the proposed development plans for the succeeding year.

The Principal formulates action plan for each academic year to implement this strategic plan with the help of IQAC and heads of different committees. Each Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal | Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science and Late N. P. Commerce College, Armori

department is required to make annual departmental plan at the beginning of every academic year and submit it to the principal for suggestions and implementation.

Suggestions and recommendations received timely are considered for the review and revision of action plan. According changes are also made in institutional strategic plan in consultation with LMC.

• Interaction with stakeholders.

- The college maintains healthy relationship with its stakeholder viz. students, parents, alumni, teachers and prospective employers. The Principal and management interacts with stakeholders through periodic meetings like parent-student-teacher meeting, alumni meeting, staff council meetings, result improvement committee meeting, student council meeting, address at various occasions, etc.
- The principal takes teacher into confidence in the important decision making process. The Principal also interacts with stakeholders through feedbacks. IQAC collects feedbacks from stakeholders. These feedbacks are then analysed and report is submitted to the Principal.
- The college have Grievances Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell and Women Development Cell. Stakeholders can freely report their grievances which will be solved by the Principal and corresponding committee.
- The college considers its faculty team and the support staff as one of its strong pillars. Personal or professional needs or grievances of the staff members are addressed by the college administration in the best possible manner.
- Any stakeholder is free to come to the office of the Principal with grievances and constructive suggestions.
- This helps the college to ensure that its activities are as per the mission and vision of the college.
- The principal values the opinion of the public and makes specific efforts to reach out to the public and interact with the public wherever possible like Mahatma Gandhi/ Dr. Ambedkar Study & Research Centre programmes. Press meet is organized to make public any significant achievement made by the institution. The college flashes the upcoming events that are planned in the departments.

• Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders.

The Principal seeks the requirements of various departments through Maintenance and Infrastructure Committee. Also collects feedbacks from stakeholders to access their needs. These requirement and feedbacks are then analysed and considers for policy and planning making.

The Principal promote research culture among the faculty members. The college organized Seminars, Conferences, and Research Methodology Workshop and provides research instruments as per feasible need of the Faculty.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence.

Faculty development programme and workshops are organized with the guidance of the Principal, to keep the faculty abreast of the recent trends in teaching, learning and evaluation, and their specialized area of interest, thereby reinforcing a culture of excellence. Felicitate the faculty members who excelled in their academics to promote the culture of excellence.

• Champion organizational change.

The principal invites proposals for new programmes. Changes in the existing rules and regulations are brought about after a thorough discussion in managing committee, based on the needs of the present generation.

At the end of every semester and year, the Principal discusses with the H.O.Ds the proposed workload for the next semester, and appoints faculty members, if there is a need. A report of Maintainance & Infrastructure Committee about infrastructure requirements from departments is sent to the principal who after careful scrutiny includes it in the annual budget for implementation. Other adhoc urgent needs related to the infrastructure are met by the college immediately.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- The Principal constitutes committees for effective implementation of policies and plans. The Principal and IQAC conducts regular meetings with heads of these committees to monitor and evaluate the performance.
- Two faculty incharge and a Vice-Principal monitors classes daily as well as maintains discipline on the campus.
- IQAC collects feedbacks from stakeholders on policies/ plans of the institution.
 Feedbacks are also collected through college website. Oral feedbacks are also collected through periodic meetings with stakeholders. Analyse the information and evaluate the policy / plan. Analysis shows strong and weak scenario for each policy/ plan. This leads to identification of problem and develop action to revert/ minimize the weakness.
- The college has installed CMS administration software. It is used right from admission to administration.
- Every teacher is provided with academic and co-curricular activities diary to plan and maintain the record of activities performed. These diaries are regularly monitored by IQAC and the Principal gives necessary suggestions.
- Result improvement committee collects and analyse the results. It arranges interface meeting with faculty members of each department separately.
- Heads of the departments are asked to submit academic calendar of their departments.
- Heads of the departments and portfolio committees submit their annual report of activities to IQAC at the end of each academic year.
- IQAC prepares AQAR every year. This is also useful to take review of what was the plan and what we have achieved.
- At the end of each academic year, the Principal and IQAC conduct meeting with staff
 members to review the fulfillment of action plan prepared at the beginning of
 academic year. The information about syllabus taught is also collected regularly.
 All these procedures help to monitor and evaluate the policies and plans implemented
 and provides opportunity for improvements.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management has given free hand to the Principal to provide academic leadership to the faculty. The college believes in decentralization of the leadership by assigning different responsibilities to the faculty members.

- Appointed IQAC co-ordinator and members giving responsibility to assure quality sustenance and enhancement in all its parameters.
- The Principal and IQAC constitutes committees every year to effectively carry out curricular, co-curricular and extension activities assigning the responsibilities like head/co-ordinator and members to the faculty.
- Appointed two faculty members as faculty incharge and a Vice-Principal for monitoring course related work, evaluation, and development of the faculties.
- Delegate power to committees formed expressly to conduct/ hold conferences/ seminars/ workshops. The committees in consultation with the Principal execute it.
- All the heads of the departments are free to administer their respective departments, plan and execute academic programs.
- All the teachers are encouraged to contest the elections of Board of Studies (BOS), Senate and Management Council.
- Teachers can also work on various academic bodies in the university or government/nongovernment organizations.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- The college makes every effort to groom the leadership at various levels. As a result of this 08 faculty members of the college are working successfully as Principal in various colleges. The Principal of the college is one of them.
- The faculty members are encouraged to attain Refresher/ Orientation/ Short Term Courses conducted by UGC Human Resource Development Centers to keep them abreast of the latest information and knowledge in the area concerned and enables them to take the lead role in developing and implementing academic, cultural and sports programmes.
- The leadership is develop by decentralization of authority. The college constitutes different committees for the effective implementation of various activities throughout the year. Faculty members are assigned by the responsibilities of these committees considering their interest and providing freedom and necessary support for implementation. All committees are constituted with a judicious blend of junior members and senior members so that the younger members of the faculty imbibe the ethos and work culture of the college and get groomed for leadership. The Principal guides them for conducting activities and appreciate the innovative ideas and leadership qualities shown by members.
- Faculty members are sent for training programmes like NSS Officer Training, Disaster Management Training, etc.
- Training programmes are arranged for administrative and support staff to enhance their skills.
- The college grooms leadership among the students through Student's Council. A class representative is selected for every class. All class representatives are members of the

council. They elect one student as college representative for university representation. He also works in coordination with the Principal for planning and implementation of annual festivals and extra-curricular activities.

• Leadership of the students is also encouraged through annual social gathering and other programmes arranged by the college assigning responsible positions to students.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Decentralization of the administration is the key aspect of development in any governance system. The Principal is administrative head of the college. The college has decentralize the administration system by delegating authority and provide operational autonomy as follow:

- The college constitutes different committees like Admission Committee, Cultural Committee, NSS, Research & Development Committee, IQAC, Sports Committee, Adult Education Committee, Employment Guidance Bureau, Science Association, Students Welfare Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Maintenance and Infrastructure Committee, Alumni Association, Women Development Committee, Anti Ragging Cell, Care Taker Committee, Result Improvement Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, etc. Each committee has a co-ordinator. The coordinator is provided with operational autonomy to plan activities and distribute work among committee members.
- The administrative matters of the Arts, Science, Commerce and Home Science faculties are looked after by two incharge and a Vice-Principal.
- Delegation of power to sanction leave of the staff and monitoring smooth conduction of academic programmes is given to the Vice-Principal.
- The office superintendent is executive head of the administrative unit. The distribution of office administrative work and monitoring is handled by the superintendent.
- Authority is delegated to all the heads of the departments regarding academic matters
 of the respective departments. Academic planning like time table, conduction of
 internal assessment, seminar, assignment of workload to teachers and non-teaching
 staff are done at the departmental level by Heads of the department.
- Teachers are also given freedom to invite guest lecture, selection and purchase of books for library, arrange the field visits and study tours etc.
- The budget is allotted through the principal as per the need of the respective departments and according to the programs given by HOD's. Autonomy is given to the departments to utilize the allotted budget as per the requirement.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the college promote the culture of participative management in administrative, academic and extension activities of the college.

• Local Managing Committee (LMC) is the apex decision making body of the college. It has representatives from management, teaching as well as non-teaching staff. administration, enhancement of infrastructure, sanction of sabbatical/ study leave to faculty are marked in the meeting of LMC.

- The Principal, Vice-Principal, Superintendent and IQAC co-ordinator are responsible for the academic and administrative leadership of the college. They frequently meet to discuss and resolve academic and administrative issues.
- The principal constitutes various committees and hold meetings with heads of these committees to plan and implement curricular, co-curricular and extension activities.
- IQAC includes faculty members, student representative, members from society and management. It plans and monitors policies.
- Almost 100% of the staff participates in the management of the college through the membership of various committees.
- Stakeholders of the college participate in management through feedbacks and suggestions given to the Principal.



6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The organizational structure of the institution has four tiers:

- The Board of Trustees of *Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal*, Armori is an apex body (The College is the flagship of the *Mandal*). Deciding the general policy, the new courses to be started, development of the campus, development of common facilities and infrastructure for colleges, financial management of the parent body, etc. are the decisions made by this body.
- The Local Management Committee constituted according to the Maharashtra Universities Act of 1994. It consist of 6 representatives of trustee, three teaching staff and one non-teaching staff elected members from amongst themselves with the President of board of trustee as Chairman and the Principal as the ex-officio member secretary. The committee meets atleast twice a year or more times as per the need. Local level policies are decided by the committee. Appointments, confirmation of the staff, financial aspects, disciplines, evaluation of various activities in the college, etc. are the issues dealt with LMC.
- The Principal is the head of the institution and looks after the day today academic and administrative activities of the college.
- The Vice-Principal is appointed to assist the Principal in smooth functioning of the administrative system and smooth conduct of academic programs.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is a body to ensure that whatever is done in the institution for "education" is done efficiently and effectively with high standards. The co-ordinator of IQAC takes the decisions related to monitor the performance and taking remedial measures.
- Heads of the departments look into academic matters of the respective departments.
 Academic planning, assignment of workload to teachers and non-teaching staff are done at the departmental level by heads of the departments.
- The office superintendent is executive head of the administrative unit. The distribution of office administrative work and monitoring is handled by the superintendent.
- Staff Council looks and resolve the academic and professional issues of the faculty. Also, various academic developmental plans are made and discuss in the staff council meeting. The Principal of the college is the chairman and one of the faculty member is the secretary of the Staff Council.
- Various Academic & Administrative Committees appointed by the Principal, on which
 certain powers are delegated, assist the principal. The co-ordinators are free to take
 decisions at their will and need under the guidance of principal.
- Librarian maintains the library and makes available the books, journal and other study material needed for the teachers, students and the researchers is the prime responsibility of librarian and his staff.
- Sports director is the head of the department of sports. The responsibilities of the sport director include the functions and purchases related to sports activities and organizing events and deputing students for games at various levels.
- Student Council consists of the Principal as its chairman, one faculty member nominated by the Principal, one student from each class who has shown academic merit in UG and PG, one student representative each from NSS, Sports and cultural

field and a University representative who is elected from among the students representatives. Student Council put up the student's problems in front of the authority and participate in preparing development plan of the institute.



6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

***** Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning process is backbone of education system. Constant efforts has been taken by the college to make teaching-learning process more student centric. Initiatives to improve the quality of teaching and learning process are as follow:

- The teaching schedule (time table) is prepared at the beginning of every academic session and is implemented accordingly. The faculties are provided with all essential facilities for effective teaching.
- IQAC collects and analyze feedbacks frequently form students on teaching-learning process and give suggestions for improvement.

- Encourage faculty to attend orientation/ Refresher/ Short term courses sponsored by UGC as well as to attend seminars/ conferences/ workshops to develop skills and to be intacted with latest development in the subject.
- Develop and enhance ICT facility to boost teaching-learning process.
- Provide high speed internet facility.
- Arrange Guest lectures, seminars, and workshops for students.
- Increase the number of e-resources and books in central library.
- Integrate field visits/ study tours with learning process.
- Establish industry—institution linkage to facilitate with hands on training.
- Renovate Laboratories and purchase modern equipments.
- Organize academic activities to increase knowledge.
- Recruitment of qualified staff.
- Developing learning material, question bank and paper solutions of University previous examination.
- Conduct remedial classes for slow learners.
- Encouraging students to participate and manage events.
- Felicitating best achievers.
- Increase attendance in college by interacting with parents and sending SMS.
- Maintaining academic and co-curricular diary with teachers.
- Taken feedback from other stakeholders.
- Organize Alumni and parent meets.

Research and Development

- Establishment of four authorized Centers for Higher Learning and Research by Gondwana University viz. Mathematics, History, Marathi and Sociology to facilitate research students.
- Seven staff members of our college are research guides for Ph.D. in science faculty.
- Constitute Research and Development Committee to look after matters related to research.
- Encourage faculty to apply for Major/ Minor Research Projects of various funding agencies.
- Carried out course work for Ph.D. scholars at college.
- Organized Seminars/ Conferences/ Workshops.
- Encourage faculty to register for Ph.D. and Ph.D. supervisor.
- Felicitate Ph.D. Awardee.
- Financial Support of Rs. 1,00,000/- to the faculties and Students for research.
- Sanction duty leave to the faculty for attaining and presenting papers in seminars/ conferences.
- The staff and students are informed about various fellowships and schemes available under UGC and they are encouraged to apply for them.
- Encourage and help faculty to publish their research work in reputed national/international research journals.

- Relevant books, e-books, reputed national and international journals, computer hardware and software are added to the library to facilitate the students and faculties to take up research activities.
- Provide necessary infrastructure facilities to develop research culture.
- PG students of M.Sc.II are encouraged to involve themselves in active research through project works as a part of curriculum of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

***** Community Engagement

The mission of the college prompts teachers and students to serve for community. The college encourages teachers and students to participate in community services and other extension activities. Following initiatives of the college reflects community engagement.

- Adopted a rural & tribal village Kasvi and conducting developmental activities such as
 English classes for village school children, Yoga classes, awareness programmes,
 water & soil testing, health checkup camps, cleanliness drive, agriculture guidance,
 awareness about different schemes of government, etc. with the involvement of
 students, teachers, civilians and government & private agencies.
- Successfully organized award winning Road Safety Campaign.
- Implemented award winning Jagar Janivancha (Women Empowerment Campaign).
- Carrying out PBR work every year to formulate people's traditional & folk knowledge about biodiversity.
- NSS activities and NSS special camps held at neighboring and adopted village.
- Financial assistance to needy and poor students.
- Auditorium is given free of cost to NGO's and government agencies for conducting social welfare programmes.
- Conducted extension activities like blood donation camp, health checkup camp, hematological test camp, cleanliness drive, socio-economic survey, water & soil testing, awareness rallies, street plays, tree plantation, etc.
- Organized one day *Vaidu Sammelan* (Vaidu Convention) to share Ayurvedic medicinal knowledge.
- Every year college organized annual cultural and sport meet, *YUVARANG*, and invite the parents in this gathering. Various social issues are addressed through cultural programmes in these events.
- Library resources are provided to community on the permission of the Principal.

***** Human Resource Management

- Recruitment of qualified staff as per UGC and government norms.
- Organized intensive training on personality development, skill-oriented programmes, workshops, seminars, and campus interviews for students helped them to achieve high placement ratio.
- Mahatma Gandhi College Employees Co-operative Credit Society provides long and short term loans to teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Staff welfare fund is created under the credit co-operative society for emergency non-refundable assistant.
- Achievements of the staff are recognized & they are properly felicitated.

- The Principal takes oral feedbacks from students on teachers and gives suggestions to the corresponding teacher for improvement.
- As per UGC norms faculty members are facilitated to undergo Orientation Course, Refresher and Short Term Courses conducted by UGC-Human Resource Development Centers to update the knowledge base and pedagogical skills of teachers.
- Effective system of Annual Performance Indicator (Performanance Based Apprisal System) of Faculty members exists.
- Total functional freedom is given to all the head of the departments for smooth functioning of the departments.
- All the staff members have been entrusted with responsibilities as a part of human resource management by the Principal

! Industry Interaction

- Industry-institute linkage has been developed to bridge the gap between theoretical and practical knowledge. PG and research departments established the collaboration with industry for the exchange of information over research and for providing training to the students.
- Organized on-site visit to industries to understand the process follow in the industry.
- Industries are invited for placement of students.
- Guest lectures of experts from industries are arranged to share their experiences.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

- The Principal ensures that adequate information is available for top management and the stakeholders to review activities of the college. IQAC collects information generated from feedbacks regarding to the teaching quality, curriculum, extracurricular activities and infrastructural requirement and same is conveyed to the Principal.
- The Principal also collects information about various activities of the institute through meetings with IQAC, Heads of the Departments, portfolio committees, staff council meeting and personal interaction with faculty and students.
- The information of activities is also collected from the minutes of meetings of different committees and Annual Report submitted to IQAC by each department.
- Maintenance and Infrastructure Committee takes review of requirements of each department and gives a feedback to the Principal.
- The Principal shares the information collected with the management through a regular oral as well as written communication. The Principal also presents this information to the LMC for appropriate action.
- Developments in the college are also communicated to the parents and alumni during their meetings.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

- The management supports participative management. Therefore, it involves staff in decision making and policy making process by conducting meeting with the help of IQAC and seeking suggestions from the staff time to time. Local Management Committee has representative from teaching and non-teaching staff which plays a significant role in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the college process.
- The staff is entrusted the responsibility for different tasks such as college admissions, examinations and document verifications by constituting committees. In addition to the involvement of faculty members in the various academic and administrative committees with required authority, there is always a representation and support of the non-teaching staff for all these activities.
- Special achievement of teaching and non-teaching staff is always felicitated by management in staff meetings and programmes.
- For improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the staff they are encouraged to participate in Orientation & Refresher Courses, to enhance their knowledge.
- Duty leave granted for academic work to the staff as and when need arises.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for awarding the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, the parent university, in its statute, has the provision of granting autonomy to the college. The institution has put it in the perspective plan of the institution.

- 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances/ complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?
 - A Grievance Redressal Cell is in place to look after the grievances/ complaints received from faculty and students and resolve effectively. Suggestions/ complaints box has been installed in the college campus, in which student can put their grievances in writing. The aggrieved members of the staff and students approach the cell for relief. The cell analyze the nature of grievance. The cell, through the Principal, forwards it to the LMC if needed. Generally, grievances are redressed at the initial node and disputes, if any, settled speedily.

Apart from this, Anti Ragging Cell, Care Taker Committee and Women Development
 & Security Committee is also constituted to resolve the complaints received particularly from students regarding ragging, ladies staff & girl students respectively.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

The Writ petition No. 383 of 2013 filed by Dr. S.B. Rewatkar, Associate Professor in Chemistry seeking lien for a period of five years. Judgment of Hon'ble High Court is in favour of Dr. S. B. Rewatkar and the Writ petition is disposed of on 09/10/2013.

As per the order of Hon'ble High Court Nagpur we grant him lien for the period of five year.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, a strong feedback mechanism is in place in the college. A Feedback Analyzing Committee is constituted for collecting and analyzing feedbacks collected from stakeholders.

- Formats have been designed by the IQAC (based on NAAC recommendations) for the feedback from stakeholders on institutional performance. The College Feedback Analyzing Committee collects feedback from students at the end of the each academic year for all the programmes and analyze it. The corresponding report is submitted to the Principal for further action.
- In informal feedback, the teachers always interact with students through the Student Council meeting, meetings of departmental associations, and farewells. Students also give feedback through suggestion box.
- These feedbacks then analyzed, and suggestions communicated to the Principal and the Management.
- Some of the programmes introduced from the suggestions given in the feedback are as follow:
- Career oriented courses introduced from the suggestions given in the feedback.
- Earn while learn scheme (Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme) has been started.
- Arranged Girl's Common Room.
- Extension of drinking water facility.
- Dress code for students.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

As a matter of policy, the institution encourages and supports activities that aim at faculty improvement.

• The institution uses its meager resources to partially fund such activities.

- The college grants study leave to pursue Ph.D. under FDP. Mr. S.B. Gedam, Department of Physics, availed this facility during 2013-2014.
- The college grants special study leave for teachers who wish to avail training programmes at various institutions/ centers/ universities and research laboratories. It also grants leave for Faculty Exchange Programme.
- The college sanctions duty leave for attaining Seminars/ conferences/ workshops/ refresher/ orientation courses.
- The college conducts in-house training programmes for teachers as well as for non-teaching staff.
- The college encourage and help faculty to apply for Minor/ Major Research Projects.
- Gives logistic support to teachers in organizing seminars/ conferences/ workshops.
- The institute encourages and permits the non-teaching staff, in particular, to acquire higher educational qualification/skill/ICT training.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college always makes constant efforts to achieve excellence. This is done by empowerment of faculty through training, retraining and motivating the employees. The college has adopted following strategies for training, retraining and motivating the employees:

- Accessing the need of development programme for employees.
- Conduct training/ retraining programme.
- Sanction duty leave to attain refresher/ orientation/ training programmes conducted by other institutions.
- Motivate the employees to perform their best.
- Felicitate the best achiever.

Following training/retraining programmes are conducted by the college:

- Computer training programme for teachers.
- Software training programmes for non-teaching staff.
- Organized six days workshop on Research Methodology and Computer Application in Research.
- Sent employee for NSS Officer training.
- Sent employees for online payment and online examination training.
- Sanctioned duty leave to attain refresher/ orientation/ short term courses.
- Established Industry-Institute linkage to give hands-on training to teachers and students.

- 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.
 - The college has adopted Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) of UGC prescribed in June 2009 regulation. The college assess the performance of the staff using Academic Performance Indicator System (API) developed by University which is based on PBAS developed by UGC. Weightage to multiple activities performed inside & outside the campus in various fields are filled by the teaching faculties.

The API is divided into three categories:

Category I: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation related activities: Minimum score required 75

Category II: Co-curricular, Extension and Professional Development related activities: Minimum score required 15

Category III: Research, Publications and Academic Contributions: Minimum score as per UGC regulation 2010.

- IQAC guides and collects filled API forms with necessary documents from the faculty at the end of each academic year. API forms are analysed, assigns scores and then submitted to the Principal for further action.
- Apart from this, every teacher is provided with Academic & Co-curricular Activities
 Diary at the beginning of session. It gives clear information of all academic, cocurricular and extra-curricular contributions of a teacher. These diaries are checked on
 every Saturday by a committee appointed by IQAC and submitted to the Principal at the
 end of each session.
- Feedback taken from students and oral feedback from Head of the Department is also considered for teacher's appraisal.
- Performance evaluation of non-teaching staff is evaluated through the proforma issued by the Principal which are later communicated to the management for necessary action.
- 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports (API) for all teachers is that it appraises their academic performance as well as involvement in curricular, co-curricular and administrative activity of the college. It contributes to understand

- The role of a teacher to the development of the college.
- The quality of the teacher and use of modern techniques in teaching-learning process by the teacher.
- The research caliber of the teacher through quality of research publications, books published, types & number of research projects carried out.

- IQAC assess these reports and assign scores based on the information provided and submit to the Principal with remarks. The Principal authenticates the reports and forward it for necessary action in case of poor performance.
- The Principal and the Management takes joint decision on whether the case has to be forwarded to the University or withheld under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

We have a slew of welfare measures for the staff (both teaching and non-teaching):

- Credit Co-operative Society (a registered body) is the first. The staff can avail of loans, including emergency loan from the society meeting the financial needs. Till date, 45 staff members are the members of co-operative society. All members have availed financial assistance.
- The staff raises a fund through the college and Credit Co-operative Society for an employee in distress to tide over the situation through Staff Welfare Fund.
- The college is also providing group insurance scheme GSLI to its staff.
- Medical reimbursement is done for employees. A non-teaching staff member Shri Kishor Kuthe has got medical reimbursement of Rs. 25,138.00 under this scheme and three faculty members have applied for medical reimbursement.
- Facilitating staff for getting loan against their GPF.
- The staff may apply for home-loan/ consumer loans to different banks with the guarantee by the Principal that the refund will be done by installments from the salary payment.
- Availing UGC/ Govt. schemes.
- The staff enjoys leave travel concession.
- Teachers on achiving some degree/recognition are felicitated in public functions held in the college.
- Birth day greetings through SMS which are reciprocated with a treat mark the healthy relationship among the staff.
- Spiritual discourse/ *bhajans* on commemorating the birth-day of Tukdoji Maharaj to instill moral/ spiritual values in the staff.
- Occasional *Yoga* sessions for the staff.
- Study leave under Faculty Development Programme. One faculty member availed this facility.
- Admissions are given to the wards of teaching and non-teaching staff on priority basis.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Excellent academic reputation of the institute in the University is the major source for attracting prospective faculty members. The college has to follow a procedure as laid down by university act to recruit the faculty as follow:

 To attract the right candidates the institution follows a transparent selection process by advertising the post in a national and a regional newspapers apart from posting it on the website.

- In the advertisement and selection process, the institution follows UGC/ government/ Gondwana University norms.
- All due rights and facilities are offered to them to complete their tasks and to improve the achievement.
- All possible opportunities of self-development are offered. Required autonomy is offered which helps them to work with required zeal and spirit.

To retain the qualified staff

- The college give full benefit of all government/UGC schemes.
- The college encourage them to apply for various schemes to enhance their qualification and skills by offering duty leave.
- Medical leave and other leave are given to the employees during his/her job period.
- Felicitate staff members whenever they achieve new degrees/ awards/ honours.
- On completion of the probation, the services of those teachers are confirmed if found satisfactory.

6.4 Financial Management And Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

- Every year the Principal, superintendent and head clerk prepares a comprehensive budget taking into consideration the financial needs of every departments. The funds are allocated for developing infrastructure, procurement of lab equipments, books and journals, sports goods, computers, stationery items, office equipments, etc. Income/ expenditure is closely monitored by the accounts section of the college.
- The budget is submitted to Management and LMC for approval.
- The LMC work on the requirements and decides the priorities while allotting financial resources. Funds are allocated on priority basis for various purposes.
- Quotations are obtained from the suppliers to find out the competitive prices.
- The lowest bidder is given the order without compromising the quality.
- For construction of buildings and other structures, the permission is sought from the Managing Board.
- The Building Committee monitors the construction work.
- Necessary formalities are carried out after the receipt of items like physical verification of the items by ascertaining the authenticity of the items indicated in the tender, preparation of voucher, stock entry and issue of cheques to the concerned parties/suppliers and maintenance of record.
- Periodic stock verification by a committee constituted by the Principal.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal and external auditing is done at the end of the academic year.

Internal auditing:

An internal audit is done by the Management and the Principal and an internal auditor is appointed by the LMC. Deshmukh, Shende & Co. Chartered Accountant, Nagpur is the auditing firm for the institution. Every year the following documents are submitted to the auditor- cash book, ledgers, vouchers, fees register, bank pass books, grant sanctioned letters, and any other relevant documents like stock registers, quotations files and salary register. The auditor does the annual auditing and gives the audit statement.

The last audit was done in July 2016 for the period 01.04.2015 to 31.03.2016. No major audit objections were found in last audit and no compliance is pending.

External auditing:

Joint Director, Higher Education, Nagpur (Government of Maharashtra) verifies the internal audit done by the institution and finally the Accountant General Office does the audit periodically.

Latest periodical audit by the J. D. Office has been done on 3rd June 2015.

- What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit 6.4.3 managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.
 - The major source of institutional receipts is the grant in aid received from the State Government of Maharashtra for salary and non-salary expenditure of grantable section.
 - The college also receives UGC plan development grants for several co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and instruments, books and journals purchase for UG and Infrastructure development.
 - Conference Grants received from U.G.C.
 - For self-financed courses the major source of receipt is Students' Educational Fees.
 - The deficit is managed by Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Armori. Audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years is as follow:

- **6.5.1** Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The policy of the college is to take the college nearer to its goal and objectives, focusing on the core values identified by the NAAC.

Some of the quality assurance processes followed by the IQAC are as follow:

- Reviewing the existing programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.
- Promoting the use of technology to enhance teaching-learning, imparting value based education, consolidating the feed-back responses from students, parent and other stakeholders.
- Promoting research and creative atmosphere conducive to research.
- Documentation of various programmes of the college.
- Conducting training programmes & workshops on quality related themes and staff enrichment programmes.
- Suggesting measures for the improving quality of teaching-learning process, research, extension activities, library services, use of modern technology, e-resources, etc.
- Suggesting the renovation of existing infrastructure and development of new infrastructure to achieve the said objectives of the college.

IQAC meets to plan for the next session and meets after regular intervals to take review of the events took place in the college. Various issues are discussed and communicated to the concern authority for implementation.

The present students give direct feedback, in an informal way, on the academic and infrastructural needs. This feedback is shared with the Principal and Management and has helped in enhancing their standard.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

- IQAC have 11 teacher representatives including co-ordinator, 02 administration representatives, 01 technical staff representative and the Principal as Chairman of IQAC. All these representatives are from staff are involved in IQAC functioning. They communicate major decisions of IQAC to staff.
- The IQAC formulates academic and extra-curricular Plans.
- Every teaching staff member is nominated on different college committees.
- The decisions are also discriminated to the staff and the students by means of the notices circulated and displayed on the notice board.
- IQAC conducts meetings with the staff and committees, whenever needed, giving suggestions and evaluate their performance.
- The members of teaching and non-teaching staff can freely visit and inquire about the IOAC and its decisions.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalization.

Yes, the institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. Internal coordination of various activities of the college is done through the Principal and IQAC.

- Heads of various Committees and Departments plans, conducts and monitors the quality of academic and administrative activities under the guidance of the IQAC & the Principal.
- The Principal permits the committees and departments to put their plan into actual implementation and monitors these activities very closely. The Principal takes periodic review of Administrative department to ensure the quality sustenance in all the areas related to Admission, Scholarship, Examination, and Accounts & Records.
- The IQAC is responsible for monitoring all the institutional processes. IQAC conducts regular meetings to suggest new activities, takes review of performance of these activities and suggest measures to enhance the quality.
 - The IQAC conducts academic audit to provide quality education and participatory administration.
 - The IQAC reviews the requirements for the library resources for enriching this important knowledge dissemination centre.
- Local Managing Committee (LMC) guides in planning, monitoring and evaluation mechanisms regarding academic and administrative processes.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, the college provides training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures. Some of these training activities are:

Computer and ICT gadgets training to teaching staff.

Impact:

- Training provided by the college helped the staff using modern academic and administrative gadgets & software.
- All teaching staff have been using modern ICT gadgets & software like LCD projector, Power Point Presentation, etc. in teaching-learning process.
- As a result of software training administrative office is automated. It helps staff to store and retrieve information easily.
- Use of modern gadgets in teaching helps students get better understanding of the subject.
- All these steps taken by the college has helped the teachers in marching towards excellence in education, enhancing their academic growth as well as growth of the college.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes, the college undertakes academic audit by analyzing results of semester examinations conducted by Gondwana University. The Result Analysis & Improvement Committee discuss the performance and gives suggestions for improvements. The college also makes assessment of its academic infrastructural facilities on regular interval.

External academic audits are done by agencies like LEC of University and NAAC peer team.

The outcome in the form of suggestions and remarks are discussed in IQAC & LMC meetings. The shortcomings are addressed in systematic manner and includes in planning for improving the institutional academic and administrative activities such as teachers' appraisal, students activities, addition of equipments, books and journals, infrastructure, etc.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies / regulatory authorities?

The college and IQAC follows the norms laid down by UGC, NAAC, Gondwana University, Director of Higher Education, Joint Director Office, etc. The college IQAC updates itself accordance with the changes made by the external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities to meet the quality assurance through their notifications, circulars and website.

The quality assurance measures undertaken by the IQAC to align with the requirement of these agencies are discussed with the Principal and staff and then implemented. Some of the outcomes are as follow:

- Prepared time table in such a manner that teacher stay in college as per the UGC norms.
- Development of course materials and e-resources for the use of teaching-learning process.
- Introduction of skill enhancing programmes and career oriented courses.
- Promote use of ICT in teaching-learning process.
- Promote research activities through organizing seminars, conferences and workshops.
- Adopted village *Kasvi* for development as a part of Institutional Social Responsibility.
- Formation of committees for proper implementation of specific tasks.
- Establishment of Industry-Institution Linkage.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- The time table is prepared at the beginning of the session and is approved which is then communicated to the students and the staff. Faculty Incharge and Vice-Principal assure that the classes are taken as per time table.
- The teaching plan is prepared by individual teachers and is implemented accordingly. The Head of the Department takes timely review of syllabus taught by the departmental faculty.
- IQAC and the Principal takes periodic review of syllabus taught.
- The daily diary and attendance record is maintained by all the teachers and monitored by a committee constituted by IQAC.
- The student performance is assessed on a regular basis through oral tests, unit tests and seminars as a part of the internal assessment pattern as prescribed by the Gondwana University.
- The measures are taken to improve the slow learners by conducting remedial coaching classes and additional classes by respective teachers.
- Course is completed by respective teachers within the given time schedule which is monitored by the Principal.
- NAAC based criteria wise proforma for collecting feedback from stakeholders i.e. students, parents, alumni.
- Arrangement of guest lectures for courses in emerging areas.
- Scrutiny and assigning of API scores at the end of each academic year.
- CCTV cameras are used and the campus is under constant vigilance.

Outcomes:

- 1. Syllabi are completed as per plan.
- 2. Better quality of teaching and learning.
- 3. Better service to the slow & advanced learners.
- 4. Enhancement of work culture and academic discipline on the campus.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Till date no green audit has been conducted by our institution of its campus, through external agencies.

- Botany department highly involve in Campus Beautification Committee, Science Association in tree plantation, Vermiculture by department of Zoology took care of environment, and take certain protective measures inside the college campus.
- A Campus Beautification Committee has been constituted which takes care of
 maintaining greenery on the campus by adding potted plants and growing plants. This
 committee has reported number of plants and their types and submits suggestions to
 the Principal to increase environment friendly practices on the campus.
- A study of the same was carried out by the students of Botany Department for identification & scientific naming of the plants.
- NSS, Science Association and Campus Beautification Committee plants trees on the campus and on its periphery. Environmental study is a part of our curriculum to inculcate the values of Environment.
- Students prepare People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) as a part of Environmental study.
- The college takes up steps to minimize the energy consumption.
- Regularly organized cleanliness drive on and outside of the campus.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college makes constant efforts to make campus eco-friendly. It conducts various activities like celebration of Ozone Day, Geography Day, Global Earth Hour, and Poster Presentation on environmental issues, tree plantation, cleanliness drive, etc. The initiatives taken by the college to make campus eco-friendly are as follow:

Energy Conservation

- Most of the classrooms and laboratories are adequately ventilated and well lighted and so do not require artificial lighting during day time.
- Students are instructed to switch off lights and fans when they are not in use.
- LCD/LED monitors are provided to office, departments and computer laboratory to reduce energy consumption.
- Infrastructure Committee monitors in the evening that classrooms & Departmental lights are switched off.
- Teachers and laboratory attendants ensure that all electrical equipments in the laboratory are switched off when not in use.
- Using electronic chokes in place of conventional copper chokes.
- Replacing the conventional regulators with electronic regulators for the ceiling fans.
- Preferring air conditioners having automatic temperature cut off. Keeping regulators at low cool position. Sealing the doors and windows properly.
- Using appliances with three pin plugs and connect them to three pin sockets.

• Providing proper earthing for the buildings.

Water Conservation

• Water pipes and taps are regularly checked to avoid leakage and waste of water.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

- Science Association & NSS Unit of the college undertakes tree plantation on college campus and in the vicinity of the college every year to maintain oxygen in the atmosphere and offsetting carbon.
- Every year the college conducts Ozone Day programme informing students the ways of reducing carbon emission.
- LPG which is carbon neutral is used in Chemistry and Home Economics Laboratories.
- Storage of documents has been done with Google Drive and Cloud facility by some departments.

Tree Plantation

• The college is surrounded by green trees with colorful flowers. The trees like Shivam, Karanji, Ashoka, Gulmohar, Saptparni, Sheesham, Krismus tree, Cycas, Gulab, Palam, Croton, Dracena, Lily, Mogra, Ratrani, Necha, Money Plant, Royal Palm, Raktachandan, Chapha, Ficus, Swastik attract one and all. The plants found in the campus include medicinal plants like Tulsi and Aloe Vera, and also flowering ornamental plants. The N.S.S. unit of the college, Science association undertakes plantation programmes every year in the college, nearby areas and in the adopted village Kasvi.

Hazardous Waste Management

- Vermicomposting Plant is constructed on the college campus for collecting organic waste, especially dried fallen leaves and converting it into manure to be used for planted trees.
- Sufficient number of dustbins are kept at every nook and corner of the college for deposition of hazardous waste and final disposal of the hazardous waste is carried out by Nagar Panchyat, Armori.
- All stationary waste from the office, library and departments is disposed of by open auction.
- To optimize the use of paper, printout papers are reused.

E-waste management

• Monitors, keyboards, mouse, and other instruments are reused after repairing and proper care of instruments is taken.

Cleanliness Drive

• NSS unit organizes cleanliness drive on the campus to make it neat & clean. It also organizes cleanliness drive in Armori town on the eve of *Gandhi Jayanti* (2nd October) every year and adopted village *Kasvi* during NSS special camp.

Observing/Celebrating Days

• Celebrated days like Ozone Day, Global Earth Hour Day, Geography Day, Environment Day, etc. to create awareness about environment among the students.

Clean India Campaign

Effective implication of various programmes under 'Clean India Campaign' (Swachha Bharat Abhiyan) i.e. Elocution contest, Campus Cleaning, Debate, Slogan contest, Poster exhibition, Rally, external lectures, street play, etc.

People's Biodiversity Register (PBR)

Creation of environmental awareness is the mission of the institution. Being the mission of the institution, the college takes every effort to create environmental awareness among the students. Our PBR is a major activity. B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. II year students prepared People's Biodiversity Register based on their survey of nearby locality, ecological study, flora and fauna found in nearby villages, water sampling survey, domestic animals, their diseases, germs, pests found in nearby crops, etc.

Vaidu Sammelan

- Organized one day 'Vaidu Sammelan' by Botany Department aiming at assembling Vaidus of the District and getting community oriented with traditional knowledge of Vaidus about ethno medicinal plants & their use on various human diseases.
- Organization of 'Swachhata Mitra' Elocution Contest in the college to spread the awareness of clean environment among the students.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Conscious and continuous efforts are undertaken by the college for effective teaching-learning process, nurturing & nourishing research talent and smooth functioning of the college. Some of the innovations are:

Formation of feedback analysis committee.

Dress code has been implemented for students, teaching and non-teaching staff. To promote uniformity, equality and identity among students and staff, the management issued a dress code so that an inferiority complex may not sprout among the poor students.

• **Implication of biometric system** for attendance of the teaching and the non-teaching staff. It brings transparency in administration. It is also installed in central library.

Holistic development of students

The college is committed for holistic development of students. It is done through various Cultural, NSS, Sports, Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Center, Dr. Ambedkar Study and Research Centre activities.

Innovative teaching methods

- Adoption of modern ICT gadgets in classroom teaching.
- Prepared paper solutions of University previous exams and provided to students.
- Class Room Students Seminars.
- Teaching through syllabus related video clips.
- Assignments on a topic from syllabus.
- Teaching videos.

Constitution of various Committees for decentralization

Various committees like Admission, Cultural, NSS, Sports, Library Advisory Committee, Research Development Committee, Maintenance & Infrastructure Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, etc. are constituted at the beginning of the academic year for smooth functioning of various activities of the college.

Indoor Stadium cum Auditorium

Establishment of multipurpose Indoor Stadium has created positive impact on the functioning of the college. Various sports events as well as co-curricular and extension programmes have been conducting very smoothly.

Entrepreneurship Skill Development Programme

It is an Earn While Learn Scheme through which the college gives platform to the students to earn money and learn business techniques. Under this programme students sell goods & handmade crafts on college campus for which the college provides necessary facilities.

• Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams and Career Counseling

The college aims to help students to choose their career path through career counseling as well as providing coaching for competitive exams like MPSC, UPSC, Staff Selection, Banking, etc. For this external experts are invited. Employment & Guidance Bureau also arranged classes for NET/ SET exams with the assistance of teachers.

- Sending birthday wishes via SMS to teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Every morning plays National Anthem *Jan Gan Man* to create national integrity among students & staff and positive atmosphere on the campus.
- Giving the faculty and administrative staff opportunity to undergo meditation camp. Spiritual discourse programme by *Ratnasundarsurishwarji Jain Muni Maharaj* on the mental stability and the role of the teacher for peace and development of society.

7.3 Best Practices

Best Practice I:

Title of the Practice: Fostering Social Responsibility

a) Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization programme as a brainstorming activity for students and staff.

Goal

Women empowerment and gender sensitization are the activities of our special privilege and pride. For this, our college regularly organizes women empowerment programmes throughout each academic session. Its our aim and objective to sensitize students and staff regarding women empowerment and gender sensitization. The college is proud that these women empowerment activities have been deeply rooted in our institution as we are in the fourth year of this practice.

The Context

There is an alarming rise in violence against women. The society cannot be developed if half its populace is deprived of a dignified existence. As citizens of India it is our primary duty to uphold the values of equality, liberty, justice and fraternity enshrined in our constitution. For this, the college formed Women Development Cell. This cell prepared their annual plan which has its focus on girl students, their empowerment, and their curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular development.

The Practice

The practice 'Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization' has been introduced since four years. Therefore it is in its mature stage. In order to sensitize students, staff and society the college organized a variety of activities. Programmes held during the last four years were:

- Formation of Women Development Cell.
- *Jagar Janivancha* a Women empowerment activity aware girl students about their rights through various activities.
- Women Governance Day (*Mahil Raj*).
- *Savitribai Phule* Birth and Death anniversary programmes.
- Three days' workshop on 'Empowerment of Girls (EOG)'.
- To sensitize the students regarding gender equality the college has successfully organised a variety of programmes under '*Jagar Janivancha*' (Maharashtra Government sponsored Inter Collegiate Competition for Gender Sensitization) throughout the year 2012-13 & 2013-2014.
- Under 'Jagar Janivancha' the college organized various activities like elocution, essay, singing, debate competitions, self defence programme, Retail training camps, personality development camp, Karate classes, Mahil Raj, Communicative skills, Legal Awareness camps, sickle cell detection & awareness camp, Thalassemia test, value education programme, workshop on interview techniques, road safety rally etc.

- Women Development Cell organized 'Mahila Raj (Women's Governance Day) where the girl students conducted the teaching and administrative work the whole day.
- Empowerment of Girls (EOG) a three days' workshop was organized in association with *Bhartiya Jain Sanghatan*, Pune where more than 50 girl students of college actively participated and benefited from the workshop.
- A great Social reformer *Savitribai Phule's* birth and death anniversary programmes were organized by the women development cell.

Evidence of Success

- It is our special privilege that in the year 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 our college was awarded by Maharashtra Government for the effective implementation of *Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan* (Campaign for Women Empowerment). The college was awarded by the District Level First Award (Rs. 1,00,000 cash, momento and certificate of appreciation) and University Level Second Award (Rs. 1,00,000 cash, momento and certificate of appreciation) in *Jagar Janivancha* competition in 2013-2014.
- The award is also received in 2012-2013 from the Government of Maharashtra. It includes Rs. 50,000/- (Rs. Fifty Thousand), Certificate of appreciation and momento.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

• As no innovative or best practices can be without difficulties and obstacles we had certain problems in implementing women empowerment gender sensitization programmes. To lift up girl students of tribal and rural area is a challenging task. Firstly, the women empowerment cell of college sensitized girl students for their personality development. By organizing some holistic development activities this committee succeeded in gaining girl students' confidence. Our EOG (Empowerment of Girl's) workshop clearly indicates how our girl students got empowered and gained sufficient confidence to face the general problems of life.

b) Road Safety Campaign as a routine activity for students and staff Goal

To sensitize the students and staff regarding road safety, the college organized a variety of activities under 'Road Safety and Traffic Awareness Campaign' throughout the academic years 2013-2016. The college feels proud that the activity has struck a deep root as we are in the fourth year of the practice.

The Context

Developed Roads is the prime need of the development of any country. As the roads developed traffic on it also increased significantly. A number of cases of accidents are also increased because of negligence of traffic rules by the civilians. One way to minimize such cases is to make aware civilians about road safety. The college has taken initiative in this regard. The Principal appointed a Road Safety Co-ordinator Prof. N. N. Meshram emphasizing on creating road safety awareness among students, staff and civilians. Brainstorming was done and the planning was finalized in the meeting.

The Practice

Under 'Road Safety Campaign', the college organized a variety of activities. Road Safety Programmes held during last four years are:

- Road Safety Oath Taking Ceremony
- Accident Assistance Team formation.
- Distribution of road safety handbooks among taxi drivers.
- Road repairing by NSS volunteers.
- Accidental Insurance Guidance camp.
- License survey of students & staff
- Professor's motor Cycle rally for traffic awareness.
- Blood Donation camp.
- Poster Exhibition Competition.
- Essay Competition.
- Debate Competition.
- Public Address.
- Learning License Camp.
- Elocution Contest.
- Road safety Rally
- Slogan contest.
- Street Play.
- Legal Traffic Awareness Camp.
- Road Safety Workshop.
- Traffic Poster Exhibition, etc.

Evidence of Success

- For effective implication of Road Safety Campaign the college was awarded by Government of Maharashtra in 2013-2014 by awarding cash prize Rs. 25,000/- (Rs. Twenty Five Thousand), momento and certificate of appreciation at the hands of Hon'ble Devendraji Fadanvis, Chief Minister of Maharashtra.
- Also the campaign was awarded by Government of Maharashtra in 2012-2013. The award includes cash prize Rs. 12,500/- (Rs. Twelve Thousand Five Hundred), momento and certificate of appreciation. This campaign was also appreciated by District Police Office, Chandrapur by awarding Rs. 10,000/- and certificate.

Problems, Resources

The first problem we visualized was the time slot for activity. Our main stakeholders are our students and our enthusiastic staff were engaged in teaching learning, but in vacant time they managed many road safety activities and tried to create road safety awareness among students and society.

c) Adoption of Tribal Village Kasvi

Goal

To instill a sense of social responsibility among the students.

To engage the students in meaningful service that meet community needs.

To equip the students with skills, attitude and knowledge to work with the disadvantaged sections of society.

The Context

The college is located in tribal and backward area. People of this area are lacking in health awareness, they believe on superstitions, not aware about development schemes. The trend of alcoholism is also increasing in the society, destroying their personal and social health. The purpose of education is to make student good citizens and good human being who can serve society. Values of caring and sharing with the less privileged are one of the important elements of such education. Our college is committed to community service and has adopted a rural, tribal and backward village *Kasvi* for development.

The Practice

- To bring a part of less privileged class of the society in the main stream of development, the college has adopted a rural, tribal and poor village *Kasvi*.
- The Principal deputed one faculty member, Mr. S.B. Gedam, with the responsibility of Nodal Officer of the adopted village *Kasvi*.
- The college conducted meeting with villagers and has prepared a development plan for five years (2015 2019) through the partnership with students, staff, alumni, local people, government agencies and NGOs.
- As per the plan the college students and staff conducted Socio-economic survey to assess the social and economic status of the people of the village.
- Department of Geology and Chemistry conducted water and soil testing of the village.
- Special NSS camps were held in the village. NSS volunteers conducted various developmental activities like tree plantation, health awareness programmes, health checkup camps, blood donation, development work, awareness activities, road safety activities, women empowerment workshop, evil effects of liquor, tobacco and other psychotropic substances upon the general health of the society, *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*, guiding about animal care, etc. In such programmes, guest speakers are invited from outside to impact the villagers. It has facilitated roads and sanitation.
- Classes on communicative English & Computer education for school children of the village are conducted by Department of English and Computer Science respectively.
- Second year UG students participate in PBR activity collecting biodiversity information, water resources information, etc. from the village and nearby jungle.
- Department of Marathi has conducted survey on local languages spoken by the villagers and folk songs known to the villagers.

Evidence of Success

• The press has given coverage to the work done by the college. Also several NGOs and government agencies approach us for volunteers. The villagers are enthusiastically supporting and contributing to development activities. The students have benefited a great deal. It has given them confidence in working with the community.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

- While collecting the information from the old people there is a chance of getting wrong information due to unavailability of reference literature.
- Sometimes the people do not cooperate properly.
- The rules of the forest department also creates obstacles while collecting information from forest.

d) Other Activities

- To create social awareness among the youth and women the Sociology Department of the college organized special awareness camps in the remote areas of Armori tehsil.
- These camps were held at Dongarsawangi, Deulgaon and Injewari. College students organized economic/social survey of the villages. They organized street plays, cultural programmes to make people aware about social issues. Students threw light on various useless customs and traditions and tried to create awareness among the villagers. The villagers served food for our students.
- To create neighbourhood relationship and promote social responsibility among students we do take special efforts and give priority to organize various types of activities according to plan as regular activities of the institution.
- Community orientation activities of Mahatma Gandhi Study & Research Centre and Dr. Ambedkar Study & Research Centre such as organizing seminars/ conferences to spread values of thoughts of Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. Ambedkar and Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj among the society; conducting Essay competition, Competitive exams, Book Donation in the society, distribution of Sharbat, etc.
- The college conducts other activities like Health Check-up Camp, PBR (People Biodiversity Register), Gram Safai (Cleanliness drive), Literacy Rally, campaign against terrorism, AIDS rally, Blood Donation Camp, tree plantation, conducting various surveys by Adult Education and PBR department.
 - Through these activities the students raised rapport with the community and fulfil their social responsibility.
- The college has conducted survey on alcohol consumption in Gadchiroli district in collaboration with NGO – SEARCH. NSS volunteers took part in it. The report of the survey will be submitted to government which will be beneficial in making policies to reduce alcohol consumption.
- A one day conference on 'Role of Youth in Agriculture' was organized by the college in 2015 to aware farmers and students about changes taking place in agriculture sector. Farmers from nearby villages participated in this conference.

Best Practice II:

Title of the Practice: Environment Consciousness through People's **Biodiversity Register (PBR)**

Goal

Creation of environmental awareness and to develop research attitude among students.

Documentation of traditional Knowledge related to biodiversity. Preparation of Biodiversity Register is an attempt to realize the biodiversity at Local Self Government level, states and the whole country.

The Context

India is a signatory to the International Biodiversity Convention and is bound to document and preserve biological diversity of the country. Besides this, creating awareness about environment and develop research attitude among the students is the need of the time.

The Practice

The programme of PBR is an attempt to promote folk ecological knowledge and wisdom

- People who are directly dependent on local biological resources have through their keen sense of observation, practices and experimentation developed and established a body of knowledge that is passed on from generation to generation.
- Some have widespread traditional knowledge like cultivation practices; other are highly specialized such as bone setting or jaundice, which are generally passed only to close member of the family, PBR is to be undertaken in participatory mode involving varying sections of the village society.
- While documenting, the knowledge and views of both genders are to be recorded. Information provided by the people need to be collected, analysed and crosschecked by the members of Technical Support Group (TSG) before documentation.
- Special attention should be given to elderly persons who can also provide information on the Biodiversity which was available in the past but no longer seen at present.
- The college has adopted a village *KASVI* for overall study and integrated development. There were groups formed by the students and they visited adopted village on Sundays. An agenda was chosen which covered environment awareness, writing flora and fauna of villages, energy crisis issues, water and soil testing, preparing map of Kasvi village, socio-economic and health survey.
- Water and soil testing was done by Chemistry Department through which it was found that 80% of villages do not have potable water.

Evidence of Success

- PBR helped to identify rare and endangered species of plants and animals.
- Provisions and various benefits of Biological Diversity Act 2004 was brought to the notice of the people of the society belonging this region.
- Awareness about environment among students and society is created.
- The institution become one of the important and pioneering center in this region for the study of various environmental problems and to solve them using PBR methodology.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

- Lack of science background of the students from Arts and Commerce faculty while collecting scientific information about biodiversity.
- Sometimes people from the study area do not cooperate properly. Therefore, there may be a chance of collection of misleading information.
- There is lack of availability of authentic reference data/literature.

Mahatma Gandhi Arts, Science and Late N.P. Commerce College, Armori, Dist. Gadchiroli stands tall among premier academic institutions of the east Vidharbha region of Maharashtra. Inspired and founded by Late Wamanraoji Wanmali, 'Dalit Mitra', it is a beam of light for thousands of students in and around the tribal and backward area of Gadchiroli, Chandrapur and Bhandara districts. The College is known as much for its academic standing and leadership building as it is for social commitment. The College was established in 1981 under the flagship of Manoharbhai Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Armori. Presently it is affiliated to the Gondwana University Gadchiroli belongs to most backward and naxal affected area of Maharashtra with humble start but with a great mission to cater to the higher education among the students belonging to SC/ST/OBC and economically deprived classes. From humble beginning it has grown into an impressive edifice in a short span of time.

We have been through two rounds of accreditation and earned 'B' grade with CGPA of 2.88 in the second cycle.

To sensitize the students regarding gender equality the college has successfully organized a variety of programmes under 'Jagar Janivancha' (Maharashtra Government sponsored Inter Collegiate Competition for Gender Sensitization). 2. Feedback system needs to be strengthened.

• Formats have been designed by the IQAC for the feedback from stakeholders. It contains some questions related to the curriculum. 2. Teachers by and large use conventional method of teaching; Modern teaching aids may be strengthened.

Initiatives taken by the institution

- Use of ICT enabled teaching through the use of gadgets like LCD projector, KYAN interactive projector, image viewer, OHP, Audio system, DVD Player, Computers and Language lab.
- Reliance JIO provides dedicated high speed 4G Wi-Fi internet services.
- Teachers use subject videos, topic related simulations, use of models and charts prepared by the students, short films to make learning more interesting and effective.
- Emphasis on laboratory experiments to verify theoretical study.
- Conduct study tours and field visits for giving the pupils first-hand experience in their respective disciplines.
- Students' seminars are organized on every Saturday to give them experience and explorative methods and presentation skills.
- Tutorial classes for students for simplifying their difficulties.
- Remedial classes are held for the slow learners.

- Sharing of experiences of experts in the form of guest lectures and practical demonstration.
- PBR is regular activity for all second year students.
- Sharing of video recordings of the lectures.
- Interactive classroom teaching to make it more students friendly.
- Sharing of teaching videos delivered by eminent personalities.
- Paper solutions of the previous examinations are prepared by the students under the guidance of teacher and are kept in the library for the students' accession.
- The detailed layout of the teaching plan is offered in the academic calendar.
- The college made 5 regular appointments to provide competent faculty to the students as per the demands of respective courses.
- We are proud as girls constitute 60% of our student profile. We have undertaken a wide range of activities to ensure that our premises are gender friendly and to increase easy access to girl students.
- MOU's with industries to promote linkages and collaborations
- Number of computers increased from 27 to 76 as compared to the second cycle of NAAC. Licensed software are purchased. Campus is now Wi Fi enabled.
- The career guidance and placement cell mediates and ensures that we are a preferred campus for conducting interviews and arranges lectures, seminars, workshops, etc. for competitive examinations as well as personality development.
- Detailed information about the evaluation methods and the examination schedule is given in the Prospectus from the time of their admission in a course and also in the academic calendar at the beginning of a session.

The measures taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance of the course are:

- Employment & Guidance bureau conducts coaching classes for competitive examinations like UPSC, MPSC. It guides the students for the preparation of NET and SET examinations.



4. Collaboration needs to be taken care of

The college has made systematic efforts to develop linkages/ collaborations and taken initiatives to facilitate interaction with academicians/scientists and experts from industries.

After 2nd cycle of NAAC the college has emphasized on collaborative research along with specializations. This is reflected in our research publications and Major as well as Minor Research Projects.

Some more measures taken up by the institution to enhance collaborative research work.

 MOUs are signed & linkages are developed with Sanjivani Pathology Lab, Rural Hospital, IMA, and nearby industries like A.A. Energies Desaiganj, Ramdeobaba Solvent Bramhapuri, etc. are signed by the college for establishing institute-industry interface.

Measures taken up by the institution to enhance <u>Extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)</u>

- The institution has adopted a rural & tribal village *Kasvi*. Development of the village is planned to be done over five years (2015 2019) by the participation of students, staff, alumni association, government agencies, private firms, civilians and NGOs. NSS special residential camps have been organized in this village. It has facilitated roads and sanitation. Various activities through NSS camps like blood testing & blood donation, development work, etc., socio-economic survey, computer literacy, PBR, soil & water testing, awareness activities, health camp, *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*, guiding about animal care, tree plantation, road safety activities, women empowerment workshop, evil effects of liquor, tobacco and other psychotropic substances upon the general health of the society, etc. are organized for the development of the village. In such programmes, guest speakers are invited from outside to impact the villagers. Students' participation in these activities are ensured.
- The college has started documentation of folk knowledge & wisdom through People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) with the help of villagers. Second year UG students participate in this activity collecting biodiversity information, water resources information, etc. from nearby villages and jungle.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Observation made by the Peer Team:

1. Reorganization and modernization of Library facilities.

Significant Initiatives by the institution:

After second accreditation 2,792 books, 26 Journals, Periodicals and e-resources 143 are added in Library. Total Library Books now stands at 17,497 and journals & Periodicals at 48, e-resources (CDs & DVDs) 143. Library has subscription to NLIST (INFLIBNET) consortia to provide E-journals & E-books to the faculty and students. For promoting the use of E- Journals & E-Books, Network Resource Centre with 10 computers and other ICT tools has been established in the Library.

Following facilities are available in the Library:

- Open access to researchers, staff and students.
- Book bank scheme to needy students.
- Automation of the library.
- OPAC and Lib-man software are installed in the library.
- Bar coding of books.
- Subscription to INFLIBNET allowing the access to large number of e journals and ebooks.
- Suggestion box is installed inside the library to improve library services.
- Computers with internet facility.
- Well-furnished reading room.
- Inter library loan service is available.
- Numbers of books for competitive examinations are available.
- Organizes book exhibition every year.
- Best Reader Award is given every year by the library.

2. Up gradating and maintaining classrooms and laboratories infrastructure

Significant Initiatives by the institution:

- The college has well furnished, well ventilated, sufficient (28) modular classrooms with spacious seating arrangement. Many of these classrooms are equipped with modern ICT gadgets like LCD Projector, white board, etc.
- English Language Laboratory with modern software for enhancing communication skills in English.
- A modern Computer Lab with upgraded computers, high speed internet facility, LCD Projector, printer, and scanner for technology enabled learning.
- The College has 02 Seminar halls out of which 01 are equipped with modern ICT gadgets and Audio-Video devices, There are 12 laboratories which are supported by ICT facilities.

3. Ensure proper utilization of ICT facilities

Significant Initiatives by the institution:

- Computers in Computer Laboratory, English Language Laboratory and Administrative section are connected separately with Local Area Network (LAN).
- All the Departments/buildings are Wi-Fi enabled through indoor routers.

- All computers are provided with internet facility.
- Number of computers increased from 27 to 75 as compared to the second cycle of NAAC. Licensed software is purchased.
- Campus is now Wi Fi enabled with 4G internet by reliance Jio.
- Purchased & upgraded Library Management Software Lib-man and OPAC.
- Administrative section is provided with AMS software.
- The college has developed most of the classrooms with ICT facility. LCD Projectors, Visualizer, Laptops, KYan interactive computer with inbuilt projector, scanner, portable public address system, video recorder, etc. are also available as central facility.
- Teachers are oriented for preparing multimedia presentations and guided to make the presentations effective and learner oriented.
- Teachers have prepared teaching notes in the form of e-resources and power point presentations. These e-resources are available for students on college website.
- Student's seminars are organized on every Saturday. Students are encouraged to prepare power point presentation for their seminar.
- Teachers help students in accessing on-line teaching learning resources and preparing power point presentations. This has put teachers in the role of a facilitator and students at the center of teaching-learning process.

4. Staff room, separate common rooms for boys and girls with proper amenities required.

Significant Initiatives by the institution:

Common Rooms for boys and girls and all toilets for students and staff have been renovated. One new toilet for students, two for staff has been constructed.

5. Development of auditorium with modern facilities.

Significant Initiatives by the institution:

- A huge 1200 seating capacity indoor stadium cum auditorium is in place in the campus.
 Various events such as Symposiums, Seminars, Workshops, National and International conferences, etc. are conducted here. Indoor sports such as Basketball, Badminton, etc. are also conducted in the premises. The auditorium is well equipped with good audio system, Wi Fi enabled, well illuminated and ventilated.
- In addition to complying with all the recommendations of the NAAC Peer team members the college has taken the following initiatives
- Infrastructure augmentation includes up gradation of computers, purchase of new and additional equipment in keeping with the requirement of the curriculum, safety and security by installation of CCTV at strategic locations, procuring additional audio visual aids like TV, LCD projects, visualizers to make promote ICT enabled teaching.
- Built-up area of 4,319.6 Sq. mtr has been expanded in the building by constructing new classrooms, computer laboratory, microbiology laboratory, Home economics Lab, Community college.
- Automation of all college financial accounting systems, computerization of college office work leading to e-governance. Information to students through website, what's App, Facebook, and SMS.
- The College also has back-up facilities with 30 KV generator and UPS for uninterrupted power supply.

- One photocopier and printing facility is available in library.
- Installed 3 computers for Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is made available to the users to identify the status of availability of documents in the library.

- Placement Cell offers placement assistance to students and prepares them to face interviews. Companies like *Bhartiya Suraksha Dakshata Parishad* New Delhi, S.I.S. - A mock/ practice competitive exam called *Spardharatna* is conducted every year for testing general aptitude as well as technical aspects of students.
- The recently-established Industry-Institute linkage has created a platform for sharing industrial experiences and needs.





- The institution should maintain an inventory of permanent or semi-permanent assets 6. created/acquired mainly out of the grant given by the UGC. The inventory should be kept upto date and a certificate to this effect should be furnished along with the utilization certificate. A register of the assets acquired wholly or substantially out of the grant shall be maintained by the university/ college in the prescribed form.
- 7. The university/college shall follow strictly all the instructions issued by the Government of India from time to time with regard to reservation of posts for SC/ST/OBC(creamy layer).
- The university/college shall fully implement the Official Language Policy of the Union Government and comply with the Official Language Act, 1963 and Official Languages (use for official purposes of the Union) Rules, 1976 etc.
- Interest earned by the college/institution against UGC grants, if any, will be treated as an additional grant and must be specifically incorporated in the statement of expenditure while submitting it to UGC (WRO).
- 10. The sanction issues in exercise of the delegation of powers vide Commission office order No. 25/92 dated May 01, 1992.
- 11. An amount of Rs. out of the grant of Rs. sanctioned vide letter of even no. dated has been utilised by the college for the purpose for which it was sanctioned and noted in Grant-in-Aid Register at page No.
- 12. Simple interest will be levied wherever grants remain unutilized.
- 13. The funds to the extent are available under the scheme. The grantee institution is requested to spend 15% for SC & 7.5% ST students & teachers from this grants.






